BUSINESS SESSION #1

Thursday 2:00 - 5:30 p.m. (Break @ 3:30a)

The Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery met for its annual Spring meeting on Thursday March 1, 2018 at 2:00 p.m. at the Second Reformed Presbyterian Church of Indianapolis, Indiana.

1. CALL TO ORDER

The moderator, Mr. Stan McKenzie, called the meeting to order at 2:04 p.m.

The presbytery sang Psalm 139A to the praise of God, after which Mr. McKenzie read Psalm 119:65-72, preached from verse 66 on the Psalmist's prayer for spiritual discernment, and constituted the court by calling upon the Lord in prayer.

2. ATTENDANCE

The assistant clerk pro tem, Mr. Morton, called the roll and confirmed that a quorum was present.

3. CLERK'S REPORT

Mr. Kuehner presented the clerk's report, calling for papers, urged sessions and TGBs to submit their minute books at the clerks' table for review, reminded the court of the upcoming Presbytery Report to Synod, and issued a call for papers, after which none were received.

Recommendation 1 was seconded and passed.1

Recommendation 2 was seconded and passed.²

Recommendation 3 was seconded and passed.³

Recommendation 4 was seconded⁴, after which a substitute motion was offered and seconded. Mr. Kuehner then withdrew his motion and the substitute motion was passed.⁵

Recommendation 5 was seconded and passed.6

Recommendation 6 was seconded and passed.7

Recommendation 7 was seconded and passed.8

Recommendation 8 was seconded and passed.9

Mr. Anderson was nominated to succeed Mr. McKenzie as moderator. It was moved, seconded, and passed to close the nominations, after which Mr. Anderson was elected by the court and took the chair.

Mr. Kuehner was nominated to continue as clerk. It was moved, seconded, and passed to close nominations, after which Mr. Kuehner was elected by the court.

Mr. Morton was nominated to serve as assistant clerk for this meeting. It was moved, seconded, and passed to close the nominations, after which Mr. Morton was elected by the court.

It was moved, seconded and passed that a three-man committee, appointed by the moderator, bring a recommendation concerning the dividing of the Assistant Clerk's current job description into two separate positions: one during presbytery meetings, and the other in between meetings.

5. SPECIAL PRAYER REQUEST

Mr. Pockras shared a prayer request for Mr. Larry Bump, a retired ruling elder with significant health problems, who has recently contracted the flu.

Mr. Anderson appointed Mr. Kuehner to pray for Mr. Bump during the intercessory prayer time at the end of the session.

6. AD INTERIM COMMISSION REPORT

Mr. Andy McCracken presented the Ad Interim Commission Report. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the report, adopt the minutes, and spread them on the minutes of presbytery.

7. TREASURER'S REPORT

Mr. Magill presented the treasurer's report in Mr. Bishop's absence. It was moved, seconded, and passed to receive the report.

8. INTER-CHURCH LIAISON REPORT

Mr. Pockras made an explanatory comment upon the written report, in Mr. Cassell's absence. Recommendation 1 was forwarded to the nominating committee.¹¹ It was moved, seconded, and passed to receive the report.

9. REPORT ON GUIDELINES FOR THE DELEGATES EMAIL LIST

Mr. Keith Evans presented his report on guidelines for the delegates email list. Recommendation 1 passed.¹² It was moved, seconded, and passed to receive the report.

10. CANDIDATES AND CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE REPORT

Mr. Olivetti presented the Candidates and Credentials Committee Report.

Recommendation 1 passed.¹³

Mr. Olivetti provided delegates with a letter to the Midwest Presbytery concerning Mr. Brian Schwertley written by his committee, seeking presbytery's endorsement.

11. MID-AFTERNOON BREAK

Mr. Kuehner called upon God's name in prayer for Elder Larry Bump, recessing the court for its mid-afternoon break at 3:29 p.m.

Mr. Anderson called the meeting to order at 3:46 p.m., after which the court sang Psalm 1A to the praise of God.

12. SPECIAL PRAYER REQUEST

Mr. Koons shared a prayer request for Mr. LeFebvre, who is absent, conducting his aunt's funeral this week in the Chicago area.

13. CANDIDATES AND CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE REPORT — CONTINUED

Mr. Olivetti introduced a time of feedback for Mr. McNamee's sermon, after which comments were made from the floor.

Mr. Battiato called upon God's name in prayer, read Romans 6:5-14, preached from the text on "Christ's and the Believer's Death unto Sin and Life unto God", and concluded in prayer, after which the presbytery sang Psalm 31B to the praise of God.

It was moved, seconded, and passed to grant ten minutes for members of the Home Missions Committee of the Presbytery of the Alleghenies to speak on behalf of their written proposal (Communication 18-03) concerning a potential church planting opportunity in Birmingham, Alabama.

Mr. Bruce Backensto and Mr. Paul Martin addressed the court and answered questions from the floor. Discussion ensued concerning Recommendation 1¹⁸, including comments from members of the Presbytery of the Alleghenies.

36. MID-MORNING BREAK

The court took its mid-morning break at 10:31a.m.

Mr. Anderson called the meeting to order at 10:48a.m., after which the court sang Psalm 136A (Stanzas 1-2) to the praise of God.

Mr. Scott introduced two visitors from Grand Rapids: RPCNA ministers, Rev. Namsik Yang and theological student, Mr. Hakryang Seo of Grace Presbyterian Church, Seoul, South Korea.

Mr. Holdeman introduced new delegate, Elder C.J. Davis of Bloomington RPC.

47. LAST CALL FOR PAPERS

Mr. Kuehner issued the last call for papers, at which time no papers were submitted.

48. CANDIDATES & CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE REPORT — CONTINUED

Mr. Olivetti introduced a time of feedback for Mr. Hart's sermon, after which comments were made from the floor. Mr. Hart's Expository II preaching exam was unanimously sustained by a roll call vote.

Mr. Olivetti invited Mr. McNamee forward to receive his Systematics and Distinctives I exam from Mr. Mann. Mr. McNamee answered questions from Mr. Mann and then from the floor of presbytery, after which further comments were received from the floor.

Mr. McNamee's Systematics and Distinctives I exam was unanimously sustained by a roll call vote.

The court recessed for its mid-afternoon break at 3:17p.m. and resumed the meeting at 3:33 p.m. with the singing of Psalm 145C to the praise of God.

Mr. Olivetti invited Mr. Hart forward to receive his Systematics and Distinctives II exam from Mr. Keith Evans. Mr. Hart answered questions from Mr. Evans and then from the floor of presbytery, after which further comments were received from the floor.

Mr. Hart's Systematics and Distinctives II exam was unanimously sustained by a roll call vote.

Mr. Hart's licensure to receive a call was then unanimously sustained by a roll call vote, after which he was invited forward to affirm and sign the queries.

Mr. Prutow called upon God's name in prayer, solemnly licensing Mr. Hart to receive a call in the name of Jesus Christ, the only Head and King of His Church.

Mr. Faris issued a brief charge to Mr. Hart, after which Mr. Andy McCracken indicated his committee's recommendation that presbytery pass the call from Second RPC of Indianapolis to Mr. Hart.

The call was approved by a unanimous voice vote, after which it was given to Mr. Hart, who indicated his intention to accept the call.

Since my last report in June of 2017, I have performed the following tasks as the clerk of this presbytery:

- Signed and mailed an inquiry into the membership status of Carl and Kathy Donath to Perimeter Church (PCA) in John's Creek, Georgia, resulting in written confirmation of their family's current membership there.
- Signed and mailed a "certificate of transfer of membership" to Open Door Community Church in Alpharetta, Georgia for Mr. Alex Kim, who had previously been listed on the roll of presbytery.
- · Signed and mailed a "certificate of transfer of membership" to Dayspring Presbyterian Church in Forsyth, Georgia for Mrs. Dee Dee Shaw and her children, previously listed on the roll of presbytery.
- Forwarded photocopies of past minutes to the clerk of the Pacific Coast Presbytery (RPCNA), at his request, to confirm the official exam progress of Mr. Sam Ketcham while a student under care of our presbytery.
- · Forwarded various communications from the Clerk of Synod to the GLG delegates email list.
- Prepared the agenda for this meeting and sent out various related communications to the presbytery via email.

Delegate Certificates

Each session is presently required to mail a hard copy of their delegate certificate to Mr. Morton, our assistant clerk pro tem. As indicated in Recommendation #3 (below), I believe we should begin accepting signed delegate certificates in scanned electronic format as well. Our Synod clerks already do this. - 8. That presbytery grant all RPCNA elders present, including all non-certified delegates from this presbytery, the privilege of the floor during the remainder of this meeting.²

Complaint to Great Lakes Gulf Coast Presbytery

To the Presbytery:

A. Introduction

My wife (Janna) and I have been believers for over 20 years. We are former members of First RP in Grand Rapids, having left in 2011 ultimately to join the Free Reformed Church also in Grand Rapids. We have a heartfelt faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and desire to be part of the bride of Christ. Unfortunately we have been denied our right to be part of the body for at least a period of six months by the First RP of Grand Rapids Session, which is the basis for this complaint.

B. Statement of Facts

As previously stated we left First RP in 2011 for reasons that are not relevant here. We briefly joined a church in Wisconsin so we could be under the authority of elders while we searched for a new church. Ultimately we joined the Free Reformed Church (FRC) in Grand Rapids in 2012. We remained there until July 2017, with our papers being delivered to us in September 2017. At that time we handed our papers to First RP, which we had been visiting since March, with a request to join.

On December 14, 2017 Rev. Scott met with us in our home. He and the Session apparently had gone to the FRC to ask why we had left. At no time prior to this meeting had anyone in the First RP Session asked why we left that church. Rev. Scott informed me that at least some of the FRC Consistory believed I was "argumentative" and that we had left over "disagreements." Additionally we were informed that we would not be allowed to join First RP unless we attended both morning and evening services. We were told that the Session would review their decision in six months.

I vigorously deny being "argumentative." It is true that we disagreed with the Grand Rapids FRC Consistory on a divorce matter. I'm an attorney by trade and was hired to represent a friend and FRC member in a "separate maintenance" lawsuit filed by his wife. (In Michigan "separate maintenance" is a divorce without the right to re-marry) For the record, this is the first and only divorce case I've ever taken in 14 years of practicing law. I didn't formally represent my client in church court, though my client had been placed under discipline by the Consistory, in my view unjustly. That decision is under appeal. The long and the short of it is that I stood for marriage and argued that absent adultery or physical abandonment scripture doesn't allow for divorce. The Consistory disagreed.

In February 2017 we were visited by Dr. David Murray, then a pastor at the Grand Rapids FRC. I had invited Rev. Ray Lanning to join this meeting. During the course of the meeting Dr. Murray accused me of being a "miserable person" who "makes everyone around me miserable." He then invited me to leave the FRC. Dr. Murray scheduled this meeting without the knowledge of the Consistory, though he later told them what had happened and apparently they approved. In any event, I felt that if the pastor didn't want me around, no matter how unjust or outrageous his demand, we should leave the FRC. If the Presbytery would like to confirm this story, I would invite you to contact Rev. Ray Lanning as he witnessed it.

C. Law and Argument

We are appealing the decision of the First RP Session to deny us membership for at least a period of 6 months, if not ultimately altogether. As previously stated both my wife and I are long time believers in our Lord Jesus Christ. We believe in the Westminster Confession of Faith and the distinctives of the RPCNA. We desire to serve the Lord by being part of His church. We are being unjustly denied that right which belongs to all believers. We desire to be under the Biblical authority of the church and elders. Indeed, we need to be under the authority of the church and elders just like every other believer. We are being denied this right under scripture by the Session of the Grand Rapids Church.

The nature and task of the church is to gather, not scatter the sheep of Christ. Confession of Faith, XXV.I (p. A-86): "The catholic of universal church which is visible, consists of the whole number of the elect, that have been, are, or shall be gathered into one, under Christ the head thereof." Testimony, 25:2 (p. A-86): "It is the mission of the Church ... to gather into her fellowship those of every race and people who accept Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord." Confession of Faith, XXV.III: "Unto this catholic visible Church Christ hath given the ministry, oracles, and ordinances of God; for the gathering and perfecting of the saints, in this life, to the end of the world." Larger Catechism, Q. 63: "The visible Church hath the privilege ... of enjoying the communion of saints, the ordinary means of salvation, and offers of grace by Christ to all the members of it in the ministry of the gospel, testifying, that whosoever believes in him shall be saved, and excluding none that will come unto him." Janna and I are sheep, we are followers of Christ. To deny us membership in the Church is to scatter us, even if that denial is only for a period of time.

Strength of personal faith or degree of personal sanctification cannot be tests or requirements of church membership, since the faith of sincere Christians may be weak but genuine faith, the sanctification of all Christians is imperfect in this life, and both are, like assurance of grace and salvation, subject to change and variation. If these factors were made tests of church membership, then the requirements for church membership would be different in every case, and never the same for any two candidates for membership. Confession of Faith, XIV:III (p. A-45): "This faith is different in degrees, weak or strong; may be often and many ways assailed, and weakened ... " Confession of Faith, XIII.II: "This sanctification is throughout, in the whole man; yet imperfect in this life, there abiding still some remnants of corruption in every part."

In other words, to require me to prove that I'm not "argumentative" is a test of personal sanctification that cannot be used to determine whether I am allowed to be a church member. My argumentativeness or lack thereof furthermore cannot be used as a test concerning my wife, who wasn't involved in the at issue divorce case nor was she invited to leave the FRC by David Murray. Her membership stands on its own and has been denied her due to a personal sanctification test on her husband that isn't allowed by the Confession.

Candidates for communicant membership should be examined by the session in constituted court. By implication, private inquiries or "background checks," and hearsay testimony from

private individuals cannot be made the basis for admitting or refusing to admit a candidate for church membership. Directory for Church Government, 1.4 (p. D-2): Candidates for communicant membership shall be examined by the session in constituted court. Any information attained by speaking to individual members of the FRC Consistory constitutes little more than hearsay.

The requirements of church membership must be based on Scripture, and they must be the same for all members. Testimony 21.15 (page A-89): "The Church must have membership requirements based on Scripture, to which every member gives his assent. Those who give such assent and their children are church members." The only requirement for church attendance is regularity. Attending Morning Worship each week is certainly a regular pattern of church attendance. Covenant of Communicant or Church Membership ("Queries," p. G-1): "To the end that you may grow in the Christian life, do you promise that you will diligently ... keep the Lord's Day, regularly attend the worship services, ...?" We would submit that we already keep the Lord's Day and regularly attend worship services each Sabbath. There is no scriptural basis upon which membership in the bride of Christ may be denied someone who does not come to two Sunday services, especially one who comes once each Sabbath. Scripture is silent on the number of services to be held on the Sabbath, as is the RPCNA Constitution and the Westminster Confession. This shouldn't be much of a surprise as there are numerous churches in the denomination which hold only one service on Sunday. To add a requirement that potential members attend two services also violates the principles of sola scriptura as scripture is silent on the matter.

To impose an unscriptural requirement for membership on anyone is a sin against that liberty of conscience granted to us in the gospel. Confession of Faith, XX.II (p. A-59): God alone is Lord of the conscience, and hath left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men, which are in any thing contrary to His Word, or beside it, if matters of faith or worship.

D. Conclusion

All my wife and I want is to be communicant members of the church. We are grieved by this denial as it means we aren't under the authority of the church which we so desire. Frankly all believers need to be under the authority of the church, myself especially included. One might say I'm opinionated but that's all the more reason why I should be subject to the authority of the church. The denial is unjust and that the six month waiting period is also unjust. Especially so for someone who has been a long time faithful member of the church who is furthermore not under discipline. To deny my wife membership because her husband is perceived as something negative based on hearsay is arguably more unjust. I respectfully ask the Presbytery to overturn the decision made by First RP and receive us into membership.

Addendum to Complaint to Presbytery

To the Presbytery:

I am filing this addendum to my family's Complaint due to a January 16, 2018 letter received from the Grand Rapids Session denying us access to the means of grace via communion. (a copy of the letter is attached to this addendum) Their allegation is that Janna and I are not members of the visible church. However, the Westminster Confession Chapter 25, Article II states "The visible Church, which is also catholic or universal under the gospel (not confined to one nation as before under the law), consists of all those throughout the world that profess the true religion, together with their children; and is the Kingdom of the Lord Jesus Christ; the house and family of God, through which men are ordinarily saved and union with which is essential to their best growth and service." As the Presbytery is aware we are seeking to transfer our membership from the Free Reformed Church to the Grand Rapids RP Church.

We were specifically denied a seat at the table on January 21st 2018. Because our transfer is not yet complete, we are still technically members of the FRC and thus members of the visible church. We were therefore unjusty denied a seat at the table. We are not under discipline at any church nor have we committed any offense that is worthy of church discipline. Please note that the FRC transfer papers declare my wife and I "sound in the faith and upright in walk." It was particularly troubling to see numerous visitors be allowed to participate while we were unjustly fenced off by the Session. I must note it was also troubling to see only 6 or 7 actual members of First RPC participate out of a total of around 15 participants.

The decision by the Grand Rapids church to deny my wife and I communion is an effective excommunication. That was never the intent of the FRC when they transferred our membership. Historically in the RPCNA people in the process of transferring from one church to another have been allowed to participate in communion, having made profession of faith and otherwise not being under discipline. The Confession itself speaks of the visible church being all those who profess the true religion. Certainly that would apply to people who have been members of this denomination in the past and who have never ceased being part of the visible church and are not under discipline. To suggest that we aren't members of the visible church is to deny our prior profession of faith both within the RPCNA and in other churches, to say nothing of the fact that we are technically still members of the FRC.¹

It isn't just Janna and I who are being denied, it is our four covenant children as well. The covenant applies just as much to them as it does to us and they are being denied the covenant when their parents are being effectively excommunicated and kept out of church membership and communion. While obviously children don't participate in communion, they get to witness their parents participating in communion and in that they get to witness part of the covenant

¹ It should be noted that at the December 2017 meeting with Rev. Scott he told my wife and I that our FRC papers indicated that we left over a "disagreement." As the Presbytery can see the papers say no such thing. I hadn't reviewed the FRC papers before the meeting, assuming that they were boilerplate because we were not under church discipline. I didn't have an opportunity to review the papers January. I have asked for clarification from First RPC but haven't received one. It is my view that their investigation was out of order in light what is clearly stated in the FRC papers and the fact that both denominations are NAPARC members. What is not clear is whether Rev. Scott was speaking on behalf of himself or the Session.

made between the Lord and themselves. This makes it all the more imperative that the Session's decision be reversed. It's bad enough denying membership to professing believers, it's even worse to deny the covenant children of those believers.

There is one final point in the Session's letter that I would like to address to the Presbytery. They wrote that this six month "initial period" was so we could "get to know you and you us." The letter was the first that I heard their arbitrary period defined in this way. I began attending First RPC when I moved to Grand Rapids in 2003 when the church was ARP, my wife began attending with her brother the following year. Janna and I were married in this church in 2006, three of our covenant children were baptized in this church in 2007, 2009 and 2010. It is a church that even after we left we never stopped praying for and loving. We have enjoyed rekindling old friendships and making new ones in the last 10 months. We believe in the distinctives of the RPCNA, specifically a capella psalm singing. We believe in the Westminster Confession. In short, we are back home where we belong.

If it is the contention that the Session doesn't know us it isn't for lack of trying on our part. Rev. Rhoda is obviously not going to get to know anyone in Grand Rapids because he lives in Chicagoland. However, Rev. Scott has my cell phone number, my email address and we're friends on Facebook. By the time the Presbytery meets we will have attended the Grand Rapids Church for nearly a year, having started attending in March 2017. I can tell the Presbytery that with the exception of two interactions involving our membership, every communication I have had with Rev. Scott has been upon my initiation. If Rev. Scott feels he doesn't know Janna or I very well, it's because of his own lack of effort.

With a Congregation as small as the Grand Rapids Church there's really no excuse for a pastor not to take the time to get to know people who are attending. Especially those people who desire to join. I would submit that one year is more than enough time for a pastor to get to know potential members. We handed our transfer papers to the Grand Rapids church in September 2017. I would submit the Church has already had six months by the time of the Presbytery meeting to get to know us since we declared our intention to join with our Covenant children. Om fact. six months is more than enough time to get to know someone however I can tell you that I can count my interactions with Rev. Scott during this period on one hand.

10. The Lord's Supper is to be observed regularly, as often as the Session may decide. The elements are bread and wine, representing the body and blood of Christ, and the sacramental actions performed by the pastor signify His incarnation, His consecration to His saving work, His suffering and death upon the cross, and His offer of Himself as Savior. The actions of the communicants signify their acceptance of Christ, and their feeding upon Him, who is the Bread of Life, to their spiritual nourishment and growth in grace.

11. Only those who have been baptized and are communicant members in good standing in a true branch of Christ's visible church are to partake of the Lord's Supper. Persons whose manner of life is notably inconsistent with their Christian profession, or who are unknown to the Session in charge of the Table, are not to be invited to commune. Those who desire to commune, who are not members of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, are to be interviewed by the elders as to their personal faith and commitment to Christ, their church membership and their Baptism. The church's practice of session-controlled Communion should be clearly explained to visitors, preferably by a carefully worded written statement, given out as people enter the service.

12. It is the privilege and duty of every member to partake of the Lord's Supper regularly and with careful preparation. The Session may appoint one or more preparatory services to assist the people in their preparation. Such Communion seasons are appropriate occasions for pastors from other congregations to be invited to preach the Word. The Covenant of Communicant Membership may be read and explained at one of the preparatory services.

13. In the observance of the Lord's Supper, the pastor should read the Scriptural basis for the sacrament from one of the Gospels, or I Corinthians 11. He should follow the general pattern in the following sections, although he may employ different language.

14. The pastor shall give instruction as to the institution, nature, and purpose of the Lord's Supper, drawing attention to the words of institution in I Corinthians 11:23-26.

The Lord's Supper is an ordinance instituted by our Lord Jesus Christ. It is to be observed until He comes again, in remembrance of the sacrifice of Himself which He offered upon the cross. The physical elements of bread and wine represent the body and blood of the Savior, and are received by true believers as signs and seals of all the benefits of His sacrifice. The Supper signifies and seals remission of sins, and nourishes our souls to grow in Christ, and is a bond and pledge of our union and communion with Him and with each other as members of His body, the church. It assures us that God is faithful to fulfill the promises of the Covenant of Grace, and it calls us to renewed commitment to obey and serve the Lord in gratitude for His salvation. Christ Himself is present by His Spirit in the Supper, to make it truly a means of grace to those who receive it in faith. Those who partake of the Supper do so in thankful remembrance that the body of Christ was given, and His blood shed, for them. They rejoice in hope as they anticipate the completion of their redemption in that day when they will share in the marriage supper of the Lamb.

Dear Fathers & Brothers,

This letter is a brief explanation of our decision not to receive the Birn family immediately into membership at First Reformed Presbyterian Church, Grand Rapids.

The Birn's were members of First RP seven years ago. Those members of Session who were present during that time expressed concerns over Mr Birn's behavior. They recalled an attitude of being unsubmissive and argumentative. In 2011 a disagreement arose between Mr Birn and session. Session informed Mr Birn of their decision, which Mr Birn did not accept, behaving in such a way that resulted in an admonishment. The Birn family then immediately transferred to Westminster Presbyterian Church in Wisconsin (WPCUS).

During 2017 the Birn's began to attend the morning services of First RP. In September 2017 the Birn's applied for membership and handed in their membership papers from the Free Reformed Churches (Grand Rapids) to the session. The session enquired to the FRC concerning 1) the nature of the membership paper and 2) their assessment of the Birn's. The session of FRC appointed Pastor Macleod to communicate verbally with a member of session regarding this enquiry. Mr Macleod informed us that Mr Birn had asked for his membership papers, requesting that they be sent to his home, which request the elders granted. Mr Macleod also informed us of an ongoing marital case involving members of the congregation. In this case friction had arisen between the elders and Mr Birn. Mr Macleod stated that while Mr Birn can at times be friendly; yet is often the source of contention when he is in disagreement with others.

With the above concerns about Mr Birn's past and present behavior the session made the decision not to receive the family immediately into membership. The session appointed Mr Scott to visit the Birn family to relay this decision and also query about the session's concerns. Mr Birn responded that while he does disagree with the FRC elders, he is not argumentative. Mr Scott encouraged the Birn's that if they still desired to pursue membership at First RP, then the session would review their decision in 6 months. In the meantime, he encouraged them to be more active in the life of the congregation. Three days later Mr Birn emailed a complaint to presbytery, handing a copy to Mr Scott at church just minutes prior to the start of the worship service.

Since the complaint the session has experienced further issues for concern. While we have endeavored to answer any request from Mr Birn, in each case he has shown little evidence that he is willing to submit and accept the counsel of the session. Regarding the Lord's Supper, we believe that Mr Birn is presently not a member of the visible church. This was confirmed by Mr Macleod. If, however, we are mistaken then all we needed was contact from the FRC elders to correct us. No communication was ever received. In light of this we informed Mr Birn that it is the RPCNA's position that admittance upon the Lord's Supper is not up to individual Christians, but by session controlled communion. Mr Birn then placed an addendum to his original complaint.

In conclusion, despite Mr Birn's claim that he desires to be under the authority of the local church, we see little evidence that he is willing to accept that authority or the counsel of elders as the vows of membership require. We believe Mr Birn needs to demonstrate that he both understands and is willing to accept the authority and counsel of elders before we would consider receiving him into membership. We would ask Presbytery to support our decision and our current course of ministry to the Birn family.

Greetings Co-Laborers,

Recently, Paul Martin, the Regional Home Missionary (RHM) of the Presbytery of the Alleghenies (POA), visited Birmingham on two occasions, where he met with the families which had gathered monthly with Sam Ketcham for Bible study. Since his departure, the group has continued to meet and made special arrangements to enjoy Paul's ministry. Paul visited with the permission of SOCHEX on each occasion. Paul was also following up particularly with two families in the group, one he knew when ministering in the Pacific Coast Presbytery years ago and another led by a former member of Grace and Truth Mission Church in Harrisonburg, Virginia.

The POA desires to see an RPCNA presbytery develop in the southeast, with congregations from Trinity in Maryland to Orlando in Florida, drawn from both the POA and the Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery (GL-G). At present, four RPCNA congregations exist in this region, plus three mission churches and one preaching station. Thus, if the POA worked in Birmingham through its RHM and Home Missions Committee (HMC), we would be taking a constructive step toward the creation of a new presbytery out of parts of the two existing presbyteries.

Part of Paul's job description, approved by the POA in 2016, includes helping the presbyteries adjacent to us in church planting. As a result, the HMC of the POA, which has oversight of Paul's work, was also involved in pre-approving his ministry in Birmingham. We encouraged Paul to meet with the Birmingham people to assess where they are with respect to the RPCNA. He is impressed by the quality of the families there and believes that there is real potential there, if God would be pleased to bless the efforts of helpers like Paul. Therefore, the Home Missions Committee of the POA at our most recent meeting unanimously encouraged Paul to talk with members of the Birmingham group to see if they would welcome the following initial plan for a viable ministry there. We present the plan to SOCHEX for your consideration, and for the committee to present it to Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery's approval.

- 1) The HMC of the POA will oversee the work in Birmingham, in order to relieve the heavy burden presently carried by the Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery in helping scattered groups of Reformed Presbyterians in the southeast.
- 2) RHM Paul Martin will be particularly responsible for the development of the work in Birmingham.

3) The HMC will work with the group in Birmingham to establish a bank account, to permit those in Birmingham who wish to contribute to the ministry expenses of a church plant in Birmingham to send their tithes to a central place.

4) Paul will go to Birmingham for nine days each month, from a Saturday through a Monday, so that he will be there for two consecutive Lord's Days.

5) Paul will work during his week in Birmingham to cultivate community among the families invested in seeing an RPC established. During his first trip to Birmingham, he will contact NAPARC denominations active there in keeping with the Comity Agreement.

6) The RHM will coordinate sending teaching elders who will lead worship on the Lord's Days when Paul is not on site. We will be glad for elders of the GL-G to join in this ministry. (For instance, the group has used Gordon Keddie's studies in their meetings and would welcome his ministry among them.)

7) The HMC will keep SOCHEX informed regularly about the development of the ministry in Birmingham.

8) In a year's time, a careful assessment of the ministry will be made by the HMC of the POA and plans made or adjusted accordingly.

9) If a congregation is eventually organized in Birmingham, it will be a member of the GL-G Presbytery, because it is within the usual boundaries of GL-G, unless a southern presbytery has been organized by that time.

A Comity Agreement regarding the "taking of exceptions" for Ordination Vows

Whereas significant disagreement arose at our last presbytery meeting, regarding the nonpassage of candidate Sam Ketcham, because of disagreement over his stipulated "exceptions" involving differences between the original Westminster Standards and our current Standards, including our current Testimony – with Mr. Ketcham's exceptions aligning with the original Westminster positions; and,

Whereas testimony was given at that time by current members in good standing, that they had been allowed such exceptions, and that the peace and unity of the church had not been disturbed by those exceptions, and that they still held to those positions; and,

Whereas the failed vote on Mr. Ketcham might signal great future disruption for both our Presbytery and Synod, on account of such disagreements, and

Whereas the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America (RPCNA) has been involved in formal efforts to bring about a closer working relationship with its sister denominations around the world, and,

Whereas many of these churches hold to either originalist Westminster Standard positions, and/or differences with our RPCNA Testimony, which would imperil these ecumenical efforts,

Therefore, this paper would propose that Great Lakes – Gulf Presbytery consider a "comity agreement" which would stipulate that the Presbytery would grant rising Candidates/Ordinands, and transferring Elders, automatic "exception/s," should they be requested – to any and all constitutional disputations that *involving originalist Westminster Standard positions* subscribed by the Reformed Presbyterian Churches in earlier days – so that we might defend ourselves against all unnecessary sectarian disagreements and divisions, and show ourselves irenic to the minor constitutional changes we have adopted (in good faith in either the Westminster Standards or our Testimony) in our American branch of the church.

Dear brothers of Great Lakes - Gulf Presbytery, RPCNA:

I request that this paper be forwarded to Synod, and it is my hope that it will receive Presbytery's endorsement. It concerns a matter from over forty-five years ago, but it remains an injustice that Synod needs to recognize and repent of. I am, brothers, with the highest respect, yours

Dear brothers of the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America:

It is with the deepest respect and with the glory of God and the blessing upon this Synod that I submit this petition. In consultation with my son, Nathaniel, and relying upon research that he is doing, it has come to our attention that a grave injustice was done against the Rev. G. I. Williamson, Ruling Elder John Leland, and the Session of the former Park City (Wichita), Kansas RP Church in 1972. As well, the Synod of the RPCNA defied its own *Constitution* in these actions. We seek justice in this matter. First, some history:

The Synod of 1968 issued a statement of union upon which merger with the Associate Presbyterian Church of North America was undertaken, being consummated in 1969. One of its provisions (*Minutes of Synod* 1968, page 39) exempted incoming ordained officers of the Associate Presbyterian Church from the RPCNA's prohibitions on tobacco use, although individuals ordained after the merger were not to be exempted.

Paper 1972-1 to the Synod of 1972 (Minutes of 1972, pages 94-97) discussed the issue of tobacco use. This paper originated in the Session of the Park City congregation, of which Mr. Williamson was the pastor, because one of the ruling elders (unnamed in the report to Synod, although named as Mr. John Leland on page 107 of the Park City Session Minutes) found himself unable to break a tobacco habit. Observing that Synod had permitted an exception to church law for former Associate Presbyterians, the paper denounced this exception as unbiblical (reference to Exodus 12:49) and as creating a double standard. After petitioning Midwest Presbytery and being informed of the impossibility of relief, Presbytery being unable to overturn a Synodical decision, the Session appealed to Synod for relief. In conclusion, the paper requested that Synod declare either (1. that tobacco use by church officers is sinful and prohibit it entirely, even for the former Associate Presbyterian church officers, or (2. that it be declared not sinful and thus permitted to all officers and licentiates; the petitioners asserting their willingness to abide by "a consistent single standard". The Judicial Committee holding (pages 99-101) that this exemption was a proper recognition of human weakness that ought to be continued, and this report being accepted by Synod, Mr. Williamson presented his intention (page 101) to leave the communion of the Church: he could submit to a no-tobacco standard that he personally believed to be an improper interpretation of the Bible, but seeing the committee-informed prohibition of tobacco as a manmade law from which the church could grant dispensation, he denounced this as a departure from a position of the Bible being the only rule of faith and practice, and an invasion of Christ's rights as the only King and Head of His Church. In response (page 102), Synod failed to address his concerns entirely and merely asked Mr. Williamson to reconsider his departure, exempted him from a requirement of the committee's response, and asked Midwest Presbytery to "allow him sufficient time to make necessary provision for his and his family's needs" should he "still fee[1] the same" following reconsideration.

Aside from notes on his departure, Mr. Williamson's only further appearance in the *Minutes* occurred in 1993 (page 62), in which the Pension Trustees were instructed to consider refunding him the money he had paid into the pension fund. Ultimately, this prohibition on tobacco remained until 1998. The Synod of 1997 (page 120) removed abstinence from "habit-forming narcotics" (a class that the Synod of 1940, pages 26-27, had deemed to include tobacco) from the ordination queries, and the Synod of 1998 (page 58) recognized the passage of these queries in overture.

For these reasons, we ask this Synod to take the following steps:

- 1. Synod recognize the correctness of the argument made by the Rev. Gerald Irvin Williamson and others of the Park City Reformed Presbyterian Church in deeming unbiblical a total prohibition of tobacco to all ordained officers.
- 2. Synod acknowledge that its acts of 1968 and 1972 created a double standard, imposing one law on some members of the church and another on other members, in violation of Exodus 12:49, "one law shall be to him that is homeborn, and unto the stranger that sojourneth among you."
- 3. Synod acknowledge having sinned against (1) God in maintaining a double standard, (2) Mr. John Leland for penalizing his inability to comply with this double standard, and (3) Mr. Williamson for failing to address his arguments biblically and deeming them merely a feeling, rather than an argument from the Church's only rule for faith and practice.
- 4. Synod seek forgiveness from God, from Mr. Williamson, and from Mr. Leland for these sins;
- 5. Synod direct the Clerk to forward a copy of this resolution to Mr. Williamson, and to Mr. Leland or his descendants, should reasonable inquiry ascertain his address.

ON "TAKING EXCEPTIONS" AND THE ORDINATION VOWS

Fathers and Brothers of the GLGP,

I want to suggest an alternative to the "Comity Agreement" proposed to this meeting of presbytery by Mr. Knodel. His recommendation has several attractive features. After all, who can argue with the goal to improve "comity" among reformed churches? But his proposal is, I believe, addressed to the wrong court.

We are required to interpret the *WCF* by the *RPT* at all points where they differ (*RPT*, intro, §12). Mr. Knodel's recommendation is that the GLGP—*at the presbytery level*—grant automatic exceptions where the *RPT* disputes the *WCF*. But presbytery does not have the authority to reverse the order of priority established by synod. If RP distinctives are to be suspended in ordination exams, synod must grant that authority. Mr. Knodel's proposal is, it seems to me, out of order—at least in its present form.

As an alternate approach to the matter of "acceptable exceptions," I propose the following:

That presbytery appoint a five-man study committee: (a) to study the phrase "the system of doctrine and the manner of worship" in ordination query four, ¹ and the phrase "no divisive courses from the doctrine and order which the church has solemnly recognized and adopted" in ordination query nine;² and (b) to provide guidelines for upholding these standards in both the examination of candidates and the exercise of personal exceptions as ordained officers.

With regard to ordination query four: we need to clarify which doctrines are "systemic" to our Reformed Presbyterian witness. This is not a new question, in principle. There is a long history of discussion about the phrase "system of doctrine" in presbyterian vows. A helpful summary of the issue was compiled from the writings of Charles Hodge into a 1936 article called, "What is the 'System of Doctrine'?"³ In that article, Hodge explains the phrase and lists nineteen heads of theology which he regarded as constituting "the system of doctrine" of the *WCF*. We could learn from that kind of study, but we need further to apply it in the context of the RPCNA and her confessional standards.

After all, we are not enforcing the system of doctrine of the *WCF* alone. We vow to uphold "the system of doctrine and manner of worship set forth" in the *WCF* and the *RPT*, with the latter holding priority at points where the two documents differ. For example, some of us

voted against Mr. Ketcham's theology exam last spring because he took exception to a key tenet of the RP witness on civil government (*RPT* 23.18)—a position deemed important enough by the church to reject a statement in the *WCF* (a portion of *WCF* 23.3). Is it correct to regard the distinctive RP witness on civil government as "systemic" to our *Testimony*? I would hope that a study committee could develop guidance to help presbyters wrestle with which exceptions are, indeed, "systemic" to the RP witness and which are "acceptable" to contradict. Such guidance could draw upon past material, like that from Charles Hodge, but with particular application to the RPCNA standards. (Again, unless a proposal like Mr. Knodel's is adopted *by synod*, the duty of presbytery is to ordain *WCF*-and-*RPT*-subscribing ministers, not *WCF*-subscribing ministers.)

Furthermore, query nine imposes protections for the church once men are ordained with "acceptable exceptions." While query four only requires an officer to accept *system-level* doctrines in order *to be* ordained, query nine restricts him from "divisive courses" in *any* point of exception to "the doctrine and order which the church has solemnly recognized and adopted." That latter phrase is much broader than system-level doctrines.

What would constitute a "divisive course" of action in how "acceptable exceptions" are exercised? Is a minister only "divisive" when division and conflict actually occur? Or are there certain settings (e.g., preaching and sabbath school) where an ordained officer must not teach his idiosyncratic views, while in other settings (e.g., home studies and personal conversation) he might express them? Or is it primarily a matter of intention, so that as long as a minister *desires* the unity of the church as he preaches contrarian views, is he free from "divisiveness"? When an elder or pastor is ordained with "acceptable exceptions," how is he to hold those exceptions without dividing congregants from the church's "solemnly adopted" teachings?

I share keenly Mr. Knodel's interest that the RPCNA more closely align with our reformed and presbyterian brethren. But setting aside our distinctives—especially by the unilateral action of one presbytery—is not a viable way to pursue that end. I therefore submit this alternative in hopes that it might help us address the matter of exceptions more fruitfully.

Paper for Synod 2018 Repentance for actions regarding the appeal by Bruce Hemphill

Inasmuch as Synod 2017 did not settle the appeal of Bruce Hemphill regarding his trial in the Presbytery of the Alleghenies, the following response is offered. It consists of an outline of the history of this issue and an exposition of some of the errors and the consequences of Synod's actions, and a recommendation for Synod to respond to the situation.

I request that Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery appoint a committee to review, and modify where necessary, this paper for Presbytery endorsement and submission to the 2018 meeting of Synod.

Historical Outline

- Bruce Hemphill (BH) presented his paper to Presbytery of the Alleghenies (PoA)
- PoA subsequently counseled BH, and conducted a trial resulting in a conviction and discipline
- BH appealed the conviction to Synod 2016
- Appeal was assigned to Judicial Committee to Consider Communication 16-4
- Synod 2017 deliberated on this issue for approximately 6 hours.
- "It was moved and seconded, that Bruce Hemphill's appeal, together with all records and papers of the case, be presented to the of Synod 2018 for adjudication according to the Book of Discipline 4.14(E-18). ... The motion carried." <u>Minutes of Synod 2017</u>, pg. 20
- "A motion was made and seconded: that the moderator appoint a five-man committee to clearly outline the procedural steps in consultation with the parties- for the 2018 Synod to follow in hearing the appeal and to gather and distribute the records and papers in the case with sufficient time for Synod to review. The motion carried." <u>Minutes</u>, pg. 21
- "It was moved and seconded: that Synod confess our failure to the parties involved (Mr. Bruce Hemphill, PoA, Judicial Committee) to follow the proper procedure that we have agreed to in our Book of Discipline for hearing an appeal, and we publicly express our repentance and seek their forgiveness. The motion carried. "<u>Minutes</u>, pg. 21
- "The moderator expressed our repentance. Rev. Kyle Sims (visiting from Associate RPC), asked to pray for this Court; we were glad for him to do so." <u>Minutes</u>, pg. 21
- "Personal privilege was granted to Chairman Dennis Olson to formally grant forgiveness to the Court on behalf of the Judicial Committee on Communication 16-4." <u>Minutes</u>, pg. 28

Substantive Procedural Errors

Because the grounds for the appeal by Bruce Hemphill have not been clearly stated and defended, the judicial process is being conducted on uncertain grounds. This is likely to produce an unjust verdict, which would leave a root of bitterness that would be difficult to extirpate.

Acceptable grounds for an appeal are: "irregularity in the proceedings; injustice or undue severity in the censure imposed; manifest prejudice or unfairness to the party on trial; admission of improper testimony or refusal to hear testimony that is important; or undue haste in reaching a decision before all the testimony has been heard." (<u>RPCNA Constitution, Book of Discipline</u>, page E-17) In a normal appeal process, one or more of the acceptable grounds for an appeal would be claimed and evidence cited from the record of the trial. The grounds for the appeal, not primarily the facts of the case, would be argued in the appellate court, which would then either sustain or invalidate the decision of the lower court. If this protocol had been followed, the appeal would have been processed in either Synod 2016 or 2017 and the matter settled.

The Book of Discipline also states: "If the decision of the lower court appears unjust and unwarranted, the higher court may itself try the case." (Paragraph 15, E-18) This is the course that Synod has decided to pursue, without this specific rationale.

Synod can act as an appellate court or a court of original jurisdiction. It should be self-consciously clear about its role in this case. If Synod wanted to act as an appellate court, it would have insisted on proper form and procedure for an appeal. Since Synod has decided to judge the case as the original jurisdiction, it is setting aside the work of Presbytery of the Alleghenies. This is an unnecessary centralization of judicial power in the highest court of the Church, which Presbyterians should reserve for only the most extraordinary cases. In this case, PoA has the duty and responsibility to shepherd the people and flocks in its purview. That presbytery knows its constituency and how best to care for and protect them. Not having an intimate, personal knowledge of the people affected by this case, Synod is likely to unintentionally disturb the peace and prosperity of PoA.

However, at this juncture, all that Synod can do is to proceed with the trial at its next meeting. It must be careful to defend the truth of the Scripture, the validity of the subordinate standards of the RPCNA, and the harmony and unity of the Church. The LORD can show us how to accomplish all those objectives, if we seek Him with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength.

Spiritual Consequences

My response to the actions of Synod 2017 is organized in the categories of Micah 6: 8, taken in the order as given in Scripture.

He has shown you, O man, what is good; and what does the LORD require of you but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?

<u>Justice</u>

Proverbs 3: 27, 28: Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due, when it is in the power of your hand to do so. Do not say to your neighbor, "Go, and come back, and tomorrow I will give it," when you have it with you.

Justice to the parties of the original litigation was denied to the parties of the original litigation (BH and PoA) by the delay for one year. It was in the power of Synod to adjudicate and complete the process, based on the work of Synod's committee which was given the task of outlining the process for completing the case.

Mercy

•

Mercy was denied to multiple parties by the manner in which the issue was handled at Synod 2017 and the consequences of its postponement until 2018. Towards the members of Synod, the lack of mercy mostly is visible in the diversion of time and energy from pastoral ministry to administrative functions and also wasted effort.

Mercy lacking towards Synod members

- Effort expended that was discarded:
 - Judicial Committee to Consider Communication 16-4
 - Effort expended that should have been used more productively:
 - Synod 2017 deliberations should have been completed promptly and time made available for shepherding the Church.
- Additional effort required because of the inaction of Synod 2017:
 - o Administrative Committee for 2018 Judicial Appeal
 - All Synod delegates required to study trial documents preparing for Synod 2018
 - Synod 2018 deliberations

Mercy lacking towards Bruce Hemphill

- o Temporary disqualification from ministry in RPCNA extended another year
- o Disciplinary status makes transfer to another denomination difficult

<u>Humility</u>

In the confession of failure after Synod concluded its deliberations on this matter, the reason appended to the confession and request for forgiveness is, "our failure to the parties involved ... to follow the proper procedure..." Synod is bound by the Word of God and the Scriptural principle of doing its work decently and in order. Instead of completing the work that it set out to do, as authorized by the King and Head of the Church, Synod spent most of its time wrangling over procedural issues and neglected the weightier matters of justice and mercy. God is not honored when the technicalities are correct but the heart of the matter is neglected. Not only is this offensive to the Lord, but it dishonors Him before the watching world, both within and outside the Visible Church.

Genuine repentance should include 1) an acknowledgement of the specific offense to God and man, 2) an acknowledgement of the evil consequences to the offended party, 3) a resolve to not repeat the offense, and 4) a plea for mercy and forgiveness (cf. Luke 15:21). Essential elements of thorough repentance (points 2 & 3) are missing in Synod's action, showing its inadequacy. Instead of forsaking the erroneous handling of the case, the errors were compounded by the delay and the unnecessary burden placed on all Synod delegates.

Recommendation

The Lord is merciful and gracious to all who will acknowledge and forsake sin, casting all the burden of sin on the Savior who paid all the penalty on the Cross. And He will also guide us, individually and corporately, in the paths of righteousness, for His Name's sake.

Recommendation: That before Synod takes up the Bruce Hemphill appeal this year, Synod devote a half-day to public humiliation, prayer, and fasting, for these purposes:

- a. Seeking forgiveness of God for not fulfilling our responsibility, to Him and the parties of the case, as a Court of His house
- b. Seeking forgiveness from God and men for wasted and misspent time, energy, and resources
- c. Seeking forgiveness of God for not accomplishing justice and mercy toward all the parties involved: Bruce Hemphill, PoA, Synod committees, delegates, and fraternal delegates
- d. Asking the Lord to give wisdom to handle the case properly

Dear Fathers and Brethren,

This paper addresses the issue of confessional subscription as discussed in Papers 18-04 and 18-06, with the goal of providing some additional background to the discussion and of reinforcing the *relative adequacy* of our existing policy as a presbytery.

In 1993, Elder Ray Stevenson of the Southfield congregation submitted a paper to presbytery (93-7) claiming that at least one member of his session had advocated a male-only diaconate in his public teaching. On April 15, 1994, Presbytery approved the following recommendations, as brought by committee chairman, Rev. Robert Henning: (1) That Presbytery direct the pastor and members of the session, who have taught doctrine contrary to the law and order of the church in regard to women deacons, to repent of such teaching; (2) That the pastor and elders cease teaching such doctrine; (3) That, if they desire to pursue examination of the church's position on the matter of women deacons, they should do so through the courts of the church.

Later that year, the Southfield session submitted another paper (94-3), in which two members of session sought to "appeal to Synod to exhonerate us and to rebuke Presbytery for indulging in such Romanism." After Synod's decision to return the paper (94-5) to the lower court, a judicial commission of presbytery was appointed, once again chaired by Rev. Henning. According to the commission minutes, two members of the Southfield session essentially acknowledged that, *prior to the presbytery's ruling*, they had publicly taught against women deacons, including at least one remark by the pastor from the pulpit, and another by an elder during a congregational election. Mr. Stevenson then "related that members of the Southfield Session, since the stated Spring meeting of Presbytery in 1993, had had opportunity, and even invitations to speak their opinions publicly on women in the diaconate, and that they had declined to do so." In other words, the men had ceased teaching contrary to the standards.

On December 9, 1995, the judicial commission approved the following conclusions: (1) That we repent, as a Commission on behalf of Presbytery, of the action toward members of the Southfield RP Church Session in adopting the report of the Committee to Deal with Paper 93-7, due to its haste and perceived discipline without trial. (2) That we commend the Southfield Session for responding positively to brotherly counsel by avoiding any appearance of divisiveness in their public teaching (3) That we remind the Presbytery and Southfield Session of the need always to deal strictly in order, openness, truth, and love with one another, in order to dispel suspicions, unedifying church politics, and perceived "hidden agenda." (4) That we encourage, again, the Southfield Session to pursue changes in the qualifications for the diaconate through proper means, as defined in the Directory for Church Government, if they still believe this warranted by Scripture. (5) That Presbytery petition Synod to clarify the extent and scope of membership Query 4 and ordination Query 9, when members or officers dissent from the doctrine and order of the church. We desire guidance on what constitutes a divisive course. (6) Upon agreement in regards to the foregoing conclusions, the Southfield Session has acceded to drop all charges preferred against Presbytery in this matter.

It is unclear (at least to this author) why the commission felt the need to express repentance toward the Southfield session. Was there some deficiency in the tone of the original report addressing Paper 93-7? Did the report imply that the elders in question must repent of their *actual beliefs* and not merely of their *public teaching*? It is hard to say. In any event, the commission clearly reaffirms every elder's duty to refrain from publicly teaching against the standards of the church. It also indicates a desire for further clarification from Synod regarding the extent to which elders must adhere to the church's doctrinal standards. In 1997, the presbytery's petition to Synod for this judicial interpretation (97-5) was returned to the lower court on the following grounds: (1) Synod has requested that study on issues brought before Synod be completed as much as possible by the lower courts. This does not seem to be the case with this paper; and (2) There is no specific issue in this paper with which Synod may deal.

Over the next ten years (1998-2008), our presbytery went on to spend hundreds of man-hours wading through a host of position papers, proposals, committee reports, heated dialogues, and divided votes. Notwithstanding this flood of controversy, our ark finally settled upon the existing policy of this presbytery, which essentially consists of <u>The Three D's</u>:

1. **<u>DISCLOSURE</u>**: Students under care *must* inform the court of any personal exceptions to the standards of the church at each of the three phases of examination by presbytery (Licensure, Eligibility, Ordination).

- <u>DELIBERATION</u>: Delegates must evaluate and determine whether or not a student's personal exceptions are sufficiently contrary to the RPCNA's "system of doctrine" as to prevent him from fulfilling his ordination vows in good conscience; and, on this basis, vote to 'sustain' or 'not sustain' his exam(s).
- **3. DEFERENCE**: Ordained officers in the RPCNA must *never* publicly teach or preach against the standards of the church, even in areas where they may personally disagree. While they, at times, inform members of their personal adherence to an opposing view, they should not seek to draw inordinate attention to it. When preaching on a text related to their exception, they may describe common arguments for alternative viewpoints, but should always winsomely state the arguments for the church's position. At no point may they use their teaching ministry (pulpit, Bible studies, blog, etc.) to refute the church's position. Rather, they should respectfully defer to the standards of the church, reinforcing their solidarity with the denomination as a whole, regardless of disagreement on certain points.

This paper represents a peaceable plea to maintain the *status quo*, at least for the time being. Admittedly, our current system is not perfect. It sometimes leaves us with a sour taste in our mouths, or an acute sense of injustice. We all agree that it should be improved. Unfortunately, we often have very different ideas concerning *how* to improve it. After ten years (1998-2008) of wrangling over this issue, the current system remains our best option, unless or until we see evidence of greater unity on these matters. Surely we have more pressing issues to address between now and 2028!

To my fathers and brethren who are concerned about the growing number of exceptions to our standards, I say this: The current system preserves your right to vote against men who take exceptions which you deem contrary to the RPCNA's "system of doctrine". In the case of Mr. Ketcham, it enabled your voice to be heard loud and clear.

To my fathers and brethren seeking a formal "comity agreement" for men who affirm the original Westminster Standards, I say this: The current system is far from broken. DCG 3:II.D.4b (D-18) states that "Teaching elders who are members in good standing in denominations with whom we have <u>fraternal relations</u> who have expressed commitment to <u>the position of the Reformed Presbyterian Church</u> and who have been examined by a presbytery in the denomination may be candidates for a call." Rightly or wrongly, it would appear that many RPCNA elders define "the Reformed Presbyterian Church" more broadly, entertaining a strong sense of fraternal unity with our sister churches who share our name. At present, RPCNA congregations regularly call ministers and licentiates from Scotland and Ireland without any objection from their presbyteries. Examples could be multiplied. While the current system does not *guarantee* acceptance for men holding these views, it is *extremely rare* for them to be refused ordination in the RPCNA. Even Mr. Ketcham, whose experiences in our presbytery seem to have sparked much of the present controversy, was peaceably ordained and installed as pastor at Fresno RPC just last month. Additional examples, once again, could be multiplied. Given this trend, is a formal "comity agreement" really necessary?

<u>To all my fathers and brethren</u>: Our current policy and practice of confessional subscription took ten years to formulate. While imperfect, it has succeeded in preserving the rights of delegates with differing perspectives on subscription to make their voices heard. There is no compelling evidence that the current system is fundamentally broken. Updating a subscription policy is like replacing a roof. If you try to do it every other decade, you are eventually going to run out of resources. Ask yourself, honestly, "Do we really need to re-open this can of worms?"

Recommendation: That presbytery return Papers 18-04, 18-06, and 18-08 to their authors with gratitude for their labors.

Report of Fraternal Delegate to the OPC Ohio Presbytery

Dear brothers:

At the request of our Interchurch Liaison man, RE Donald Cassell, I again attended the March 10, 2017, meeting of the OPC Ohio Presbytery, held at the Good Shepherd OPC meetinghouse in Fairfield, OH, near Cincinnati. I conveyed the greetings of our Presbytery to these brothers, and I bring back fond and fraternal greetings to you from them.

Ohio Presbytery of the OPC geographically covers the western third of Pennsylvania, much of West Virginia, all of Ohio, and all but the northern third of Indiana. The OPC General Assembly has clearly defined Presbytery boundaries. The Presbytery has one congregation in WV, in Morgantown; one in IN, in Sheridan; and numerous ones in both OH and western PA. Within their bounds are both Geneva College and RPTS, with which their men are all very familiar. Several of the elders, ruling and teaching, were alumni of one or both institutions. At least one RE is on Geneva's faculty.

It was within the OPC Ohio Presbytery that I had two internships while a student at Westminster Seminary in Philadelphia in the late 1970s. Both times I served at the Covenant OPC in Grove City, PA. I know, rather well, the western PA congregations. Several of the men in the Presbytery I have known since seminary days, including TEs who were in school with me. I have been delegated there three times, now, so I'm getting to know and be known by many or most of the others. Each time has been a delight to me, but this time was the most, since I was able to stay the entire meeting.

Ohio Presbytery has two stated meetings annually, in March and in October. Normally the spring meeting is in Ohio and the fall meeting in Pennsylvania. Their business is divided between the two meetings.

The brothers convened at approximately 10 AM. Prior to convening, each Session had distributed prayer sheets to all the commissioners (what we call delegates). The Presbytery spent all the forenoon in prayer. Like us, each congregation would have a man assigned to lead the Presbytery in prayer for it. The Moderator would name three men at a time. When the third one of a group concluded, the Moderator announced the next group of three men. The prayer time concluded very close to the order of the day for the noon meal. I have sent all the prayer sheets to Mr. Cassell.

The afternoon and evening were taken up with normal committee reports and the examination of students. I have sent the docket for the meeting, again, to Mr. Cassell. There are three matters that I found interesting in the business that I thought you brothers would want to note. The first is that there is one committee of Presbytery charged with doing all visitation and review of Session Minutes. Sessions do not report to Presbytery directly; only through this committee. Men are placed on it for at least a year. It seems to me that this would be a very burdensome responsibility, but one in which a member of the committee would become expert at this in a "sink or swim" sort of way. The second is that I continue to be very impressed with the level of the OPC licensure and ordination examinations for ministers/TEs. The theology exam, in particular, goes into much more depth than ours. This may reflect historical context, but these young men, and older men in change of calling, are *thoroughly* examined. Each man coming in, even from another OPC Presbytery to an OPC Presbytery must have a similar examination. The third observation is that Ohio Presbytery runs committees and commissions very tightly through a set of Presbytery Bylaws. No one has any excuse for not knowing their committee

responsibilities or limits. I don't know that we'd want to proceed in this way, but it seems to work rather well for them.

I was one of several fraternal delegates welcomed and given floor privileges for the entire meeting, as well as a docketed five minutes in which to bring greetings. Men from the PCA and the URC were there.

Late in the afternoon and into the dinner hour, there was an excited buzz that it appeared that business could be concluded by that evening, and a projected Saturday morning session could be avoided. It happened! The meeting was adjourned a little past 9 PM, with a slight time extension.

I conclude with a couple of observations. The first is that these are precious brothers, and we need to see if we can't encourage them further to send delegates to our stated meetings. They are doing much and are quite active in church extension. They would love to have further contact with us. They have always been very brotherly. The second is that I delight in taking on this appointment, whenever Presbytery, through the Interchurch Liaison, desires. Dr. Knodel could be another natural for this delegation, since he is a former OPC minister. However, as often as Presbytery desires, I am very eager to serve in this way. Thanks to Presbytery and to Mr. Cassell for this blessed opportunity.

DELEGATES EMAIL LIST: GUIDELINES

"That Presbytery instruct Mr. Evans to develop a list of basic guidelines for proper usage of the delegates email list and submit them for approval at our Spring 2018 meeting." Following the 2017 Spring Meeting of Presbytery, the Great Lakes/Gulf email distribution list (<u>delegates@glgpresbytery.org</u>) received several informal email correspondences, voicing concerns, reflections, and complaints about the happenings at the then most recent meeting of Presbytery. Therefore, in June 2017, when the GLG Presbytery met briefly during Synod week, the motion was made and carried, that guidelines for proper usage of the delegates email list be created. It is in response to that successful motion made on the floor of Presbytery, that this report is being presented.

The immediate concern that led to this report, then, was the "informal" usage of the email distribution list. Additionally, questions such as: "Can general announcements be made regarding presbytery matters?", "Are prayer requests acceptable to send to the list?", "Can the list simply be used as a means to 'get a hold of' all the Presbyters at once?", were on the minds of the delegates.

In light of the above, and according to the original intention of <u>delegates@glgpresbytery.org</u>, I propose the adoption of the following guidelines to regulate the usage of the official GLG Presbytery email list (see <u>**Recommendation 1**</u> below):

1. Only official Presbytery communication may be sent to <u>delegates@glgpresbytery.org</u>.

<u>Rationale</u>: The original recommendation approved at the 2013 Spring Meeting of Presbytery, established <u>delegates@glgpresbytery.org</u> as the "official means of distributing presbytery documents"; therefore, the above guideline seems to be most in line with the original intention of the email list.

2. Official communications include the distribution of Presbytery documents, and announcements about Presbytery and Presbytery-related events.

<u>Rationale</u>: The primary purpose of the list is to distribute the reports and other documents for the meetings of Presbytery itself. However, there are announcements associated with Presbytery that are perfectly fitting for email distribution. For instance, the CYPU events are directly overseen and supported by Presbytery, and should be announced via the "delegates" list.

3. It is not the intention of the "delegates" list to distribute prayer requests and other unofficial announcements that the GLG teaching and ruling elders may be interested in receiving.

<u>Rationale</u>: I like prayer. Prayer is good. Our Presbytery obviously believes prayer is good. And while it is perfectly fitting to ask for prayer for Presbytery, Presbytery-related events, and in the official Presbytery communications, there are other appropriate and sufficient avenues for distributing prayer requests, freeing up the "delegates" list for official communication of our Presbytery. Additionally, while general and unofficial communication may be conveniently distributed over a single master list, ensuring the focused use of the list will preserve its longterm effectiveness.

It is my hope that the above guidelines are unobtrusive and to the point, and that the Presbytery will see the benefit of restricting the only official means of presbytery communication to official communication only.

(By way of reminder: Any ordained teaching or ruling elder is able to email <u>delegates@glgpresbytery.org</u> directly, and you do not need to email the Clerk to have your communication distributed to the Presbytery. If you are not receiving emails, or are unable to send to the list, please notify me and I will gladly correct the problem.)

Finally, and while not immediately within the scope of this report's directive, it is worthy to keep before our Presbytery that this present year (the remainder of 2018 into the beginning of 2019) is the final year I will be serving as the "Internet Maintenance" administrator. This means it is incumbent to choose my replacement, so that he can begin to learn the process, ensuring a smooth transition at the completion of the 2019 Spring Meeting of Presbytery. At the June 2017 meeting of Presbytery, our Clerk informed us that he cannot take on these additional tasks. A replacement should be identified, or a volunteer step forward, so that the <u>GLGPresbytery.org</u> website will continue to be used, a "docket and digest" will continue to be prepared and distributed, and the <u>delegates@glgpresbytery.org</u> email list will be maintained. If you have the ability to take on these responsibilities, or a willingness and availability to learn, please talk to me at this meeting of Presbytery.

2. Students to be taken under care

Allen Blackwood From the RPC of Lafayette session: "Allen is a member of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of Lafayette, is married to Eleni, and they have a son, Henry. Allen is the son of Pastor Ed Blackwood, and has been raised in church planting contexts and in crosscultural mission work, thereby being exposed to various expressions of full-time ministry from a young age. Although Allen has prayerfully considered the possibility of pursuing Gospel Ministry since high school, it is only within the past few years that he has more fully wrestled with this possible calling and direction for his life, and therefore has been brought under the care of the Lafayette Session in 2017. While under care, he has served as an intern in Lafayette and has taught and labored in many different contexts, and continues to faithfully do so. Allen is presently working for the Tippecanoe School Corporation full-time, assisting in the management of the school district's transportation." (see recommendation 2-3)

3. Student aid - the following students are receiving aid from the presbytery (\$300/mo)

Joel Hart - ending approximately May 2018

Zach Smith & Andrew Battiato - ending approximately May 2019

Gary McNamee - ending date not yet known

4. Seminary-level classes

Dr. Prutow has taught two classes over the year. He taught eschatology in the spring of 2017 (24 total students; 6 credit and 18 audit) and hermeneutics in the fall of 2017 (14 total students; 5 credit and 9 audit). A class on the ministry of worship taught by Dr. Prutow is planned for spring of 2018.

5. Selma RPC

The Selma congregation has been without a pastor for six years and are grateful to report that they have called Andre Pickens as their next pastor. Most of the presbytery does not know Andre, so we're glad he is able to attend this meeting. Andre became known to the Selma session through his friendship with Frank Smith. As they got to know him, they introduced him to our committee. Jared Olivetti traveled to Detroit to meet Andre and his wife, Katherine, and begin discussing the process of bringing him into our presbytery. After the congregation called

Andre, Katherine found a good job in Alabama, so they moved. Andre has been preaching as stated supply in the Selma RPC since the move.

Because Andre has served for many years as a pastor in the National Baptist Convention, we are recommending he be brought into the RPCNA following a series of exams similar to ones we've used in the past in similar circumstances. Please see Appendix C for a letter from Andre as well as his C.V. and reading list.

6. Request from South Asia Commission

Please see Appendix D for communication from the South Asia Commission regarding Jay Dharan and the potential of our presbytery aiding the commission by overseeing his coming exams. Appendix E includes Jay's C.V.

See recommendations 5 and 6.

7. Communication regarding Brian Schwertley

Our committee received a communication from Pastor Mark Koller of the Midwest Presbytery regarding Brian Schwertley. It was a request to clarify Mr. Schwertley's relationship to our presbytery in advance of his being brought before the Midwest Presbytery for possible reception. We are not aware of any personal issues or specific charges for which Mr. Schwertley would need to answer our presbytery, so we declined to invite him. However, our committee has strong concerns about Mr. Schwertley being received as a teaching elder into our denomination. We have written a letter to the Candidates and Credentials Committee of the Midwest Presbytery which we hope will reflect the feelings of our presbytery and plan to bring that letter to this meeting of presbytery (for obvious reasons, we chose not to distribute it electronically). If presbytery approves the letter of counsel, we will forward it onto the C&CC of the MWP.

8. Subscription issues

Introduction Over recent meetings of presbytery, the issue of confessional subscriptionism and taking exceptions has come up several times. Since it is a "live issue" and one that bears directly on our work as a committee, we have hope that expressing our understanding and practices to the presbytery will aid in both clarity and cooperation. We currently have no recommendations or motions to make concerning these matters, but do hope that this section of our paper may serve as a helpful reference for our presbytery moving forward.

Student Handbook The student handbook continues to serve us well on many fronts, including our section on theological preparation and subscribing to our standards. Though it is somewhat lengthy, we think it is valuable enough to reprint in total here. Here you'll find the essence of the counsel we give to students wrestling with questions about our Confession and Testimony.

An important note on theological preparation

The examinations a student will complete during the course of his formal education are described in later sections of this Handbook (§§9–10). At three points in the course of those examinations, the student will be asked the "Queries for Ordination, Installation, and Licensure" (pp. G–2 and G–3 in The Constitution of the RPCNA). Students should acquaint themselves with these vows early in the course of their studies, and be prepared to affirm them.

Special notice should be given to the fourth query: "Do you believe in and accept the system of doctrine and the manner of worship set forth in the Westminster Confession of Faith, the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, and the Testimony of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, as being agreeable to, and founded upon, the Scriptures?"

A great deal of the student's theological education is aimed at preparing him to take that vow. He should therefore have that query in view so that all his theological studies—being studies of "the system of doctrine and the manner of worship set forth" in the aforementioned standards —might be pursued with the conscientious goal of becoming a co-confessor of the church's received faith.

Abraham Kuyper explained the importance of ministers subscribing to the church's received confession, saying, "One man must supplement another [in the exposition of doctrine]... As in social life one ploughs, a second spins, and a third sails the seas, and out of the interaction of these divided labors the full rich life is born; even so it is in the world of thought." ("Calvinism and Confessional Revision," p. 484.)

The creeds and confessions of the church are not infallible (WCF 31.4); nevertheless, Jesus promised that the Holy Spirit would assist the church in her understanding of the Word (Jn 16:13; cf., WCF 31.3). It is, therefore, with confidence that what Jesus promised is true that ministers receive with a spirit of trust rather than skepticism, the conclusions of the church's Spirit-assisted wrestlings to understand the Scriptures. These conclusions are passed down to us in the ecumenical creeds and reformed confessions of the Church. The Westminster Standards are a full and authoritative expression of the doctrines contained in those earlier creeds and confessions.

In the Reformed Presbyterian Church, we confess that it is due to sin that the church has divided into the many distinct denominations that exist, today (RPT 25.14). It ought to be our

earnest prayer and endeavor to see the church grow in holy unity. This must not be sought through mere organizational union, but through a growing unity of faith. Therefore, as distinct bodies within the confessing church have unique doctrinal insights to contribute to the broader church, those denominational testimonies ought to be held forth for the edification of congregations within that branch of the church as well as that of the broader church. The Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America has collected the doctrinal gains of her heritage into the Testimony of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America Students preparing for ministry in this branch of the church should become familiar with the doctrinal testimony which, by seeking ordination in the RPCNA, they will be promoting.

If, in the course of the student's theological education, he has doubts about any doctrinal position in either the Westminster Standards or the Reformed Presbyterian Testimony, he ought to seek help understanding the reasoning behind the doctrine. This help can be pursued from a professor at seminary, a pastor in the church, or the Candidates and Credentials Committee. Such questions ought not be regarded as cause for shame or embarrassment, either by the student or by those who discuss these questions with him. It is an important part of theological study to examine and to seek answers. However, as all such confessional documents are the result of godly men together studying the Scriptures in prayer, doubts about their conclusions should be examined with a teachable spirit and not a presupposition of error.

The spirit of the age in which we live is one that promotes individual opinion and skepticism of authority; even theological students and ministers need to guard their hearts from the influence of such attitudes. Therefore, students who encounter doubts about certain doctrinal conclusions ought to give themselves to a careful and thorough understanding of the reasoning behind the position in dispute before taking a personal exception to it. Furthermore, he must not satisfy himself that he has adequately studied the matter until he has spoken about the matter with a professor or a minister who is well-equipped to explain the position. In a good faith spirit of trust, a student should give every effort to be taught the doctrine he initially found doubtful.

If, through the course of such study, a student concludes that the corporate testimony of the church is in error, his personal conviction to the contrary ought to be made known to presbytery in one of the oral theology exams that are part of his public examination. The first and second oral theology exams are the setting in which the student's specific views on various aspects of the church's confession and testimony are examined by presbytery. And it is in those examinations that presbytery is to determine whether the student's views are in keeping with subscription to the church's testimony and sustain or not sustain the exam accordingly.

Unlike typical exams at seminary where a student receives a passing grade based on the percentage of questions answered correctly, a presbytery ought "not sustain" an exam if even one point is found to be in opposition to "the system of doctrine and the manner of worship set

forth" in the denominational standards. At the points of certification, licensure, or ordination when the queries are administered—the student should prepare to answer the queries "in the plain and common sense of the words, without equivocation, or mental reservation" (WCF 22.4), guided in part by presbytery's determination to sustain his theological exams. The practice of stating exceptions at the point of the queries, however, is imprudent and ought not take place.

Therefore, in anticipation of the queries, a student should take the initiative to resolve any uncertainties well beforehand. Also, rather than avoiding difficult questions in theology exams, a student should discuss doctrinal doubts with the Candidates and Credentials Committee prior to taking theology exams. The Committee will work with the student and with the assigned examiner to ensure that the doctrinal dispute is raised in as honest and as respectful a manner as possible to grant the student the best opportunity to express himself. It will then be possible for the entire presbytery to come alongside the student and to offer any added perspective that may have been previously overlooked in his study of the issue.

Furthermore, if an issue of doubt is raised in the first theology exam (i.e., prior to certification to preach), it is within the prerogatives of presbytery to sustain the exam on the understanding that the student is still teachable and that he will not preach contrary to the denominational testimony, since a second opportunity to take up the student's views is afforded in the second theology exam.

It must be kept in mind that the purpose of confessional instruments is to preserve and promote the unity of the church. Therefore, all individual exceptions to the united testimony of the church ought to be resolved in a manner that seeks the peace and unity of the church. The teachableness of the individual student and the semper reformanda teachableness of the whole church are important features of confessional fidelity.

Two final words of counsel to students should be given. First, not every question about a doctrinal position is necessarily a point of doubt or exception. Students should be careful to discern the difference between a matter about which he has questions and a position with which he disagrees. In the spirit of confessional ecclesiology, a student ought to be willing to trust the painstakingly and prayerfully developed testimony of the church and to stand in a presumed position of accepting the confessed stance while exploring his questions. A student with questions (but not yet disagreement) should, in good conscience, be able to affirm the queries during his certification to preach as he continues to examine his questions.

Second, while theology is a discipline that requires precision with words, it must be admitted that creeds and confessions often contain clumsy or awkward expressions. The unfortunate confusion that has long attended the fifth article of the Apostle's Creed—"he descended into hell"—is a prime example. As illustrated by Calvin's exposition of that line of the Creed (Institutes 2.16.8–12), we ought to take difficult wording in the best light one can honestly take it. Seminary is a time when students are developing alertness to the fine points of theological

expression, but care needs to be given not to let unfortunate word choices stir a sense of opposition to the faith confessed by the brethren.

Carl Trueman offers this apt counsel from his own preparation for ordination vows, "We need to understand that subscribing to a creed or confession does not mean that we believe every phrase in the document was as well expressed as it could have been or that if we wrote it today we would use exactly the same vocabulary and phrasing... As I read the Standards in preparation for ordination, I did not make the mistake of confusing the awkwardness or deficiencies of some of the phrasing with fundamental deviations from biblical teaching." (The Creedal Imperative, p. 192.) Students should be careful to distinguish between perceived inadequacies in how a doctrine is framed and "fundamental deviations from biblical teaching."

Subscription to the church's standards does not necessitate a conviction to their inerrancy. The Confession itself admits that "all synods and councils, since the Apostles' times,... may err; and many have erred..." (31.4). But it does require a good faith confession that they accurately summarize the true teaching of Scripture to the best of our understanding at this stage in the continuing reformation and growth of the church's faith.

Presbytery History In the writing of this report, we took time to remind ourselves of our own presbytery's history of debate regarding subscriptionism, especially in understanding and applying ordination vow #4, hoping to both find more light and also avoid retreading paths already walked. Here are some of the highlights.

- The subscription debate in the Great Lakes/Gulf Presbytery lasted from 1998-2008.
- In April, 2000, presbytery appointed a study committee to Paper 2000-1 from the Triangle (Durham) session regarding subscriptionism. This paper was in response to previous papers taken to synod regarding our worship distinctives. A study committee was appointed.
- That study committee asked presbytery to approve the paper's requests and went further to suggest an amendment to Ordination Vow #4, requiring the stating of an exception to the ordaining body whenever such an exception should arise in the conscience of an ordained man. Presbytery approved the recommendation. This recommendation was reviewed in 2001 due to a request from a session within our presbytery. Presbytery did reconsider the paper and passed a report that denied any presumption of guilt among those who appealed the paper. The committee was extended with the goal of reviewing the paper further.

- That committee presented in April 2002. That committee's paper and the minority report which accompanied it, both contain thoughtful dialogue on a thorny topic. After various motions and discussions, especially concerning the motion of charging ministers to declare exceptions, the matter was referred to the November 2002 meeting, where it was referred to the following spring meeting of presbytery. Over the course of that year, these matters became more pertinent due to concerns about men receiving calls from other congregations. Despite debate among the AIC, the calls were all forwarded.
- At the April 2003 meeting of presbytery, the following motions were passed:
 - That presbytery charge all officers within its bounds to declare to their overseeing body any exceptions they make take to the system of doctrine and manner of worship set forth in the Westminster Confession of Faith, the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, and the Testimony of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, and that such exceptions be recorded in the minutes.
 - That the overseeing body, when they deem it necessary, appoint a special committee to counsel those who have declared their exception, in order to seek to persuade them of our system of doctrine and manner of worship, and to report back on the progress or lack thereof that is being made.
 - That the presbytery send the four recommendations to Synod with the further recommendation that they be enacted in all the Presbyteries of the RPCNA, and that the Triangle Paper and the body of this report be sent as well for reference.
- The Synod of 2003 declined to take any of the actions requested by our presbytery except adopting an amended substitute of the first motion above: *That Synod remind all officers of the church that if they find themselves out of accord with the Confessional Standards of the church, their beliefs and commitments having changed, it is their duty to declare their scruples and differences with the Westminster Confession of Faith, the Larger and Shorter Catechisms, or the Testimony of the Reformed Presbyterian Church <i>to their presbytery if a Teaching Elder, or to their Session if a Ruling Elder or Deacon.*
- At the November 2003 meeting of presbytery, it was noted that the actions of synod didn't nullify presbytery's actions, so all teaching elders were (by motion) called to report their exceptions to the Clerk of Presbytery by the Spring 2004 meeting. Three men brought exceptions to the meeting.
- At the November 2004 meeting, presbytery considered and declined to act on an recommendation that their previous action (requiring statements of written exceptions) and interpretation of Vow #4 be rescinded.

 In Spring 2005, a paper asking for another rescinding of presbytery's actions and interpretation of Vow #4. Some presbytery minutes from the following are unavailable, but the committee continued through 2006, with a change in the study committee. In Spring of 2007 it was again deferred until the summer meeting. Their report to the summer meeting (2007) was returned to the committee. The committee brought their work again to the 2008 spring meeting. The discussion mostly affirmed the need for elders to conscientiously make their exceptions known. It ended with a tie-breaking vote which left presbytery's exact interpretation of Vow #4 less than clear.

Summary thoughts on our recent history: Our presbytery's previous work on these issues contains a large amount of helpful resources and thinking. The most clear result of presbytery's previous work is emphasizing (1) the importance of confessionalism and (2) the need for elders to be conscientious in handling their exceptions.

We hope this information is helpful, at the least to understand how our committee operates.

Credential & status changes in 2017

1. Licentiates

S. McC. The McC's are part of the Marion congregation and S. is making contact with students involved or interested in missions. S. also serves on the Global Mission Board and the Pakistan committee of the board. As part of that work, he participates in training for a Pakistani pastoral candidate. He also teaches the Theology and Methods of Missions course at RPTS. He preaches occasionally in Marion and elsewhere in Indiana, usually 5-6 times/year. (license extended 6/15 to 6/20)

Donald Cassell Last year, presbytery granted a one-year extension to Donald's licensure to receive a call. We hope to meet with Donald during this meeting of presbytery and to bring a recommendation concerning his licensure to presbytery.

Sam Ketcham Upon his graduation from Greenville Seminary, Sam and Dorsey and their children were transferred by the Pageland TGB to the membership of the First RPC of Fresno, California. There Sam accepted a year-long internship with the session and Nathan Eshelman, the interim moderator. Before the internship was completed, the congregation voted to call Sam as their pastor and Sam accepted the call after passing his final exam before the Pacific Coast Presbytery. His ordination was set for the 2nd of February.

2. Students taken under care, or removed from under care

Gary McNamee was received as a student under at the spring 2017 meeting of presbytery.

Sam Ketcham's "under care" status was transferred to the Pacific Coast Presbytery.

3. Licensures, ordinations & installations

Adam Niess was installed as the pastor of the RPC of Lafayette on February 2, 2018.

4. Resignations & transfers

Keith Evans - The RPC of Lafayette will be recommending to presbytery that Pastor Evans' pastoral relationship be dissolved at the end of May so he can pursue his calling to the professorship at RPTS.

Rich Johnston - Rich Johnston's retirement from the pastorate of 2nd RPC took effect on June 30, 2017.

Adam Niess - Adam's resignation from the Bloomington RPC pastorate was approved by the Ad Interim Commission and the dissolution took effect on December 18, 2017.

Men under care

Andrew Battiatio "My wife (Laura) and I celebrated the birth of our daugher (Eliana Joy) on April 14, 2017. Our family moved to Pittsburgh in September to begin my second year of seminary, after completing the first online. Our entire family has adjusted well to the new community and are regular attenders of Covenant Fellowship RPC. I am progressing well with my studies and am thankful for the whole-person equipping that I am receiving. My favorite class so far has been Spiritual Development with Dr. Jerry O'Neil. As a family, we are praying and preparing for future mission work to an unengaged unreached people group. We are considering spending this upcoming summer in South Sudan for further mission preparation."

Joel Hart "I am presently pressing through to the finish of the winter quarter of my final year at seminary. Relationships in the seminary community, preaching opportunities around the denomination, and studies at seminary have kept me busy - and provided a rich environment for growth in Christ. I am excited about what the future holds as I anticipate graduation. Orlena has enjoyed life in Pittsburgh. She has a PRN job at the RP Home, which has been a good outlet for her to use her gifts and minister to the saints there. David (4), Jenny (2), and Elisha (11 months) bring much joy to the family."

Gary McNamee Gary is currently in his second quarter of studies at RPTS. He continues to serve as a ruling elder at Columbus RPC. There his duties include establishing new ministries of outreach to the community and teaching the adult Sunday school. he is organizing and attending a weekly Bible study in Louisville to investigate church planting there as well as serving as moderator of the Dayton TGB. He's preached five times in the last year and served on a mission team to Enid/Stillwalker, OK.

N.B.- In the schedule of exams, we are recommending Gary skip the evidence of progress sermon and give his first expository sermon exam at this meeting of presbytery. Unlike the typical seminarian with little preaching or teaching experience, Gary has been a ruling elder leading in worship, preaching occasionally in his capacity as a ruling elder, and teaching in church settings for many years. Therefore, in light of his experience, we believe he is ready for his first sermon exam without need for the initial "evidence of progress" baseline.

Zachary Smith "We praise God for His sustaining grace through a year of change for the Smith family. In the spring of 2017, I completed my first year of seminary at RPTS via distance

learning. On the last day of classes, my family (Zach, Beth, and 1-year-old son Isaiah) boarded a plane and went to serve with Cush4Christ in South Sudan, Africa from May-August. The invitation to come was an answer to prayer for us, as we desired to obtain some overseas missionary experience as a family in preparation for our future. Both my wife and I had been to South Sudan to serve in our single years, and our mutual desires to serve Christ in overseas service is something that we feel God's calling to do as a family. We came back from that summer with a deepened joy and excitement for what God is doing to build His Kingdom around the world, and also a more realistic perspective for what capacities God might use us to serve in similar ways in the future. We are praying towards that end and asking the Lord to continue to direct as we finish seminary.

We relocated from Indianapolis to Pittsburgh in September, 2017 to continue on-site training through RPTS. I am currently in my second year. We enjoy worshipping with the saints at North Hills RP church and participating in mid-week Bible studies during our time in Pittsburgh. My time is primarily spent between taking full loads of classes each quarter, renovating our fixer-upper house, and spending time with my family. Beth works at keeping things in order on the home front and raising our active toddler. Together, we are enjoying developing relationships both with the seminary community and our local community within our neighborhood. We are thankful for the way God has sustained us this past year and look forward to His continued faithfulness in our remaining time at seminary."

Ministers without pastorates (active)

George Gregory (last pastoral appointment with RPC of Columbus, ended on 12/31/16) – George preached 26 times in 2017 including at Christ Church RPC on 1/28/18) where he also last administered the Lord's supper. George is still working at Second RPC as the Facilities Manager. The Gregory's 2-year-old son Jonathan passed into glory on December 8, 2017. George is currently waiting on the Lord for a pastoral call in the RPCNA. The committee recommends that George's status be Active

Frank Smith (last pastoral appointment, with Northminster RP Church, ended on August 31, 2013) — Frank and his wife Penny have been active in the presbytery's urban ministry in Atlanta. Their church membership is held by presbytery, but would be transferred to the roll of Atlanta Presbyterian Fellowship upon its becoming a mission church. He preached 48 times in 2017 and last preached at the Atlanta Presbyterian Fellowship on January 7, 2018.

He last administered the Lord's Supper in July at First RPC, Cambridge, MA. Frank continues to teach history full-time at Georgia Gwinnett College. Frank also serves as President of Tyndale International University, a Korean-language seminary in Los Angeles. This past year, he contributed a book review to The Confessional Presbyterian, a peer-reviewed academic journal

for which he is an assistant editor. He is nearing the completion of a book-length biography of his later father.

Frank's status is "Active."

David Whitla (last pastoral appointment, with the RPC of Southside Indianapolis (SSRPC) ended in August 2016) – After 8 years as pastor David moved to N. Ireland to pursue his doctoral studies (2016-2019). Last year he preached 44 times and delivered 24 lectures. He last administered the Lord's Supper on June 12, 2017 at the Southside RP Church. For the duration of his doctoral studies (2016-19), he is retaining his membership at Southside RP Church, and thus his credentials within the GLG presbytery and the RPCNA, whose ministry he intends to return to at the end of his studies, DV. In meantime, David worships regularly as an adherent of Trinity RP Church, Mossley, Northern Ireland where his family is actively involved in all aspects of congregational life. He preaches at Trinity and lectures for their adult class 2-3 times per month, as well as at various other RPCI congregations and conferences in the RPCI and RPCS upon request.

David's status is "active"

Ministers without pastorates (inactive)

Godfrey Franklin - Following his retirement from the University of West Florida in 2009, Godfrey's church membership continues to belong to our presbytery (was never transferred to another RPC after the Multiracial RPC was disorganized in 2005) but he worships at McIlwain Presbyterian Church (PCA) in Pensacola. Though Godfrey has not participated in ministry activities this past year, he is in relatively in good health and is available to preach if pastors need someone to cover for them. He feels very isolated and would appreciate contact and news from our Presbytery. He is not actively seeking a call in the RPCNA but wants to continue his ordination.

We recommend that Godfrey's status be changed to "inactive."

Ministers without pastorates (retired)

Roy Blackwood (last pastoral appointment ended 12/31/2007) — Roy continues to attend services faithfully at Second RP Church in Indianapolis. Roy was active in pastoral counseling, mentoring and provided support as an evangelistic witness to his neighbors and to the nursing staff at the Hoosier Village Retirement where he lives. Roy ministers in prayer for pastors in the RPCNA and for those at Second RPC. Please pray for Roy's energy and health, and for God's continued blessing on his ministry to those around him.

Roy's status is "Retired."

Richard Johnston (last pastoral appointment, Second RPC, ended on July 2, 2017) Rich and Beckie and their son Stephen remain members of Second RPC. Though retired from active pastoral duties after 24 years of pastoral service at Second RPC, he continues in many involvements in the congregation, presbytery, synod and the Indianapolis community. Some of these involvements are chairman of the Disabilities Ministry of the R. P Women's Association, pulpit supply in the past six months, as needed: Lafayette, Elkhart, Belle Center, Topeka RP and Shawnee RPC, chairman of the Board of the Biblical Counseling Center of Indiana, director of the Friendship Bible Study, and member of Second RPC Mission's Committee.

Rich writes: "Because of these and other family involvements I feel sure that the Lord wants me to stay in Indianapolis. My wife, Beckie, travels at least weekly to minister to her parents (92 and 93 years old) in a nursing home in Marion, Indiana. Our special needs son, Stephen, has many deep roots here, in Indianapolis, with medical t professionals, deep friendships and in employment. I am 69 years old, but still healthy and active. I don't feel called to another full-time church pastorate, but I find the Lord using us in many ways and with many people here in Indianapolis. I am also finding extensive overseas ministry in India and Liberia. What is my status? In many ways I feel as active as ever, but I am not seeking a call to another church pastorate. I am writing to help you know where I best fit-- active, inactive or retired status. Thank you for your assistance."

We recommend Rich's status to be "retired."

Gordon Keddie (last pastoral appointment, Southside RPC, ended on 6/30/2014) — Gordon retired after 10 years of serving as Senior Pastor at Southside Indianapolis RPC on June 30, 2014. He expects to be involved in church life as able. He is not seeking a new call in the RPCNA but hopes to be available to write and preach as pulpit supply as needed and called upon. Gordon also desires to retain an active involvement in the work of presbytery and attend as he is able.

Gordon's status is retired.

Ray Lanning (last pastoral appointment, with First RPC in Grand Rapids, ended 10/2010) As of the sending of this report we have not received updated information from Ray.

Ray's status is retired.

Keith Magill (last pastoral appointment, with the Elkhart RP Church, ended on September 30, 2015) – Keith preached 11 times in 2017 including preaching at Sparta RPC on December 17, 2017. He administered a baptism at Harvest OPC in San Marcos, CA on July 16, 2017 and last administered the Lord's Supper at Sparta RPC on November 12, 2017. Keith and Becky continually are seeking the Lord's direction about how to best serve Him in this next season of their lives. Keith is not seeking a call in the RPCNA, but desires to continue his ordination. They currently live in Lafayette and are members worshipping at Immanuel RPC. Presbytery

appointed Keith the provisional moderator of the Sparta RPC in August 2017 and he plans to attend this meeting of Presbytery.

The committee recommends that Keith's status be changed to "Retired."

R. Paul Mathews (last pastoral appointment, ended June 30, 1965, with the W. Monroe St. Mission Church in Phoenix AZ). Paul & Janet have been nonresident members of the RP congregations to which they have belonged since 1992. They currently worship with the Gaylord Evangelical Free Church in Gaylord, MI, where they now reside and where their daughter and family are members. At Hetherton Session's request, the GLGP AIC appointed Paul to serve as provisional elder on their session until the Spring 2018 GLGP meeting. He attended all nine constituted meetings of session, two observances of the Lord's Supper, preached there once, and attended Sabbath worship 16 times during the year. He considers this responsibility a personal blessing.

Paul's status is "Retired."

Robert McCracken (last pastoral appointment ended in 2002) — Bob continues to be active in ministry, both in the Columbus RP congregation where he is a member and of the Presbytery. He preached twice last year. He last preached on 9/3/17 at the Dayton RP Mission Church in Tennessee and last administered the Lord's Supper on 5/7/17 at the Columbus RPC.

Bob's status is "Retired."

Glenn McFarland (last pastoral appointment, with the Santa Ana RP Church, ended 6/19/1989) — Overlapping as pastor and after leaving the pastorate, Glenn was the Principal of an OPC Christian School in southern California and taught school for 30 years. Glenn and his wife Jean are members of the Orlando RP Church. They worshipped there for 6-7 months and then at Providence RPC in Pittsburgh for 3-4 months and Christ Covenant RPC in Lawrence, KS and an OPC in Vienna, VA during the summers. Glenn is recovering from an extensive 41/2 hour knee surgery with some complications.

Glenn's status is "Retired."

Marion McFarland (last pastoral appointment, with the Ogemaw RPC in Michigan, ended in 1987) — Marion and Shirley continue to volunteer with SOWER (Servants On Wheels Ever Ready), a ministry that does repair work for Christian ministries throughout the United States. They have been now in all 50 States. They travel with this group in their RV to various youth camps and adult conference centers. Their work is mainly building and maintenance. Marion led devotions each month and completed 102 projects which included painting and various maintenance jobs.

Marion's status is "Retired."

Jim McMahon – (last pastoral appointment, with Greeley RPC ended May 1991). Jim is a member of the Sparta RPC where he preached there five times in 2017. Jim reports that he has also preached 22 times in the last year in other situations. His passion is to proclaim Christ whenever and wherever God gives him opportunity and strength. He would like to occasionally preach in the pulpit as needed. Please pray for Jim as he currently struggles with some health issues. He is hoping to move to Indianapolis sometime in the future to be near his daughter and close to an RP church. Jim is planning to be at this spring Presbytery meeting.

Jim's status is "Retired"

Robert Morrow — Bob continues to serve as a ruling elder of the Sparta Session. He preached once this past year at Sparta RPC, and has been active in visiting senior citizens and people in need. Bob, like many seasoned pastors, still have a lot to offer the church body and her servant-leaders. Bob is 85 and about 3 months ago, suffered a concussion which blurred his vision at the time and he continues to have headaches. His legs hurt when standing but when sitting he is okay and when he is laying down is even better. He is hoping to attend the Spring Presbytery meeting.

Bob's status is "Retired."

Jim Pennington (last pastoral appointment, with the Living Way RP Mission Church in Bryan, TX for the month of April 2017. Before that it was with the Kasumigaoka RPC in Kobe, Japan, that ended in May 2005). Jim preached 8 times in 2017 including occasional pulpit supply in Orlando RPC where Jim continues to serve as a ruling elder, oversees a shepherding group, presides for morning worship in rotation schedule, and teaches Sabbath School class and small group.

Jim's status is "Retired."

Dr. Dennis (Denny) Prutow – (last pastoral appointment ended in 2001 with Sterling, Kansas RPC). Dr. Prutow retired in 2013 from serving 12 years as RPTS professor of Homiletics and Pastoral Theology. Denny and his wife Erma are members at Second RPC and his credentials are held in this presbytery. He preached 20 times last year and continues to teach seminary-level classes for our Presbytery at Second RPC. He taught Covenant Theology in the spring and Genre Specific Interpretation in the fall. Denny administered the Lord's Supper at Second RPC on October 16, 2017. Denny and Erma continue to be grateful for their membership and active participation at Second RPC. Denny also taught two series of Sabbath School classes last year: 1Corinthians 13 in the spring and Worship in the fall. Dr. Prutow was also the main speaker for the Covfamikoi family conference last year. He was installed as Ruling Elder on 1/8/17 at 2RPC. Denny continues as administrator for Westminster Evangelistic Ministries.

Denny's status is "Retired"

Frank Schutz (last pastoral appointment ended in 1992). Frank worships regularly at Grace OPC Church in Columbus, Ohio, and is on the membership role at Belle Center RPC. Frank has suffered from some environmental allergies that have plagued him for several years now. Thus, Frank has not been very active in Ministry nor has he been able to attend Belle Center once a quarter as he would like to do.

He has conducted one wedding this past year. The marriage of Laura Schutz to Licentiate (OPC) Brian Guinto. Laura and Brian now reside in Olympia WA where Brian is working with an OP church. Frank also taught the Spring quarter of the Adult Sabbath School at Grace OPC on Sanctification. Frank continues to work in IT supporting Human Resources applications for Nationwide Insurance Company.

He desires to worship and sing the Psalms with the Belle Center congregation, teach more in the church and serve in whatever ways he is able. He also desires to get back to the writing he was doing before his health issues.

Frank's status is "Retired"



Appendix D - Communication from the South Asia Commission

South Asia Commission of the RPCNA

February 9, 2018

Dear brothers of the Candidates and Credentials Committee of the Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery,

The South Asia Commission of the RPCNA Synod requests the help of your presbytery. We have been given authority by synod to plant churches in India and develop men for pastoral service. To this extent, we've been given the power of a presbytery in the process of establishing a new denomination unique to the nation of India that will be a sister denomination. Jay Dharan is the first student under care of the South Asia Commission (SAC).

We are asking GLGP to lend help in preparing this man for ministry by administering exams to him. It would be a great aid to the SAC, and, we hope, a joy and encouragement to the GLGP to be part of the process.

Jay is from Trivandrum, Kerala (India's southwestern-most state) but is now in Bangalore serving as a pastoral intern at Anugraha RP. He is enrolled full time at RPTS in the distance learning program where he is in his second quarter. We plan to bring him to the United States to take up his studies in Pittsburgh for the third quarter this year which begins in March. Jay will be serving as an intern at Second RP in the summer of 2018 and at Southside RP in the summer of 2019. Lord willing, he will be here for the GLGP 2018 spring meeting. He is a competent man who is of excellent character. We are very excited that the Lord has raised him up. He is an answer to our prayers. His CV is attached, and we hope that you will hear his testimony.

We want his membership and credentials to remain with Anugraha and the SAC. We will be ultimately responsible to see him pass his exams, license, and ordain him, Lord willing. However, we would see great benefit in Jay being examined on the floor of presbytery in the North America. It would give him robust exams and show him what we believe the best exam system looks like. Lord willing, he will,be involved in helping to create a presbytery that will administer such exams in the future. We'd like him to have a very similar experience to what Venky had.

Here is our request, would the GLGP/CCC be willing to be serve the SAC by scheduling and administering all of the regular floor exams for Jay over the next two-plus years?

This would include two preaching exams, two theology exams, personal godliness, pastoral and evangelistic gifts, and church history. Our hope would be that the presbytery would vote on these exams just like regular exams (with the SAC men in India watching online, if possible), with the end result that the vote would serve as a recommendation to the SAC. The SAC would be the party to formally sustain the exams and would administer the written exams and papers. Finally, the SAC would license Jay at the appropriate times.


Would the GLGP CCC please consider this request? First RPC (Grand Rapids, MI) Visitation July 8–9, 2017

Report to Presbytery at Its March 1–3, 2018 Meeting

Fathers and Brothers,

Below you will find our report on the church visit we completed on your behalf to First RP Church in Grand Rapids, MI.

Summary of the Visit

The committee's visit to First RPC began Saturday evening over a fine Italian meal with Craig Scott (TE) and Doug Nadeau (RE) at Pietro's, followed by coffee and discussion in a quiet corner of Baker Book House. This time enabled us to learn more of how the Lord led Mr. Scott to Himself, into the ministry, and to Grand Rapids, and it afforded us the opportunity to discuss one of the key challenges facing the congregation at this time (outlined below). After adjourning for the night to our separate host families, our visit continued on the Sabbath at morning worship (which included the Lord's Supper), followed by a fellowship meal with the congregation and further discussion with Mr. Scott and Mr. Nadeau. The committee met privately in the afternoon before joining the congregation for evening worship, which closed our visit.

Strengths

The Lord has certainly blessed the Grand Rapids congregation with a number of strengths.

- From our visit we learned that *the congregation is hungry for the meat of the Word*, which Mr. Scott is eager to provide, as he did at Sabbath worship in the morning (John 12:20–32, "Christ's Conquering Chariot") and evening (Psalm 149, "Christians Beautified by God"). Christ's finished and ongoing work was extolled with much edification. It was noted by one, without exaggeration, that the Lord has blessed Mr. Scott with the ability to preach beyond his years.
- It was demonstrable following both worship services and in the afternoon meal that *the congregation enjoys a strong sense of fellowship*. Though there is a challenge facing the congregation at this time with regard to the Lord's Supper (below), there is general *peace in the congregation, as well as a love and support for Mr. Scott and his ministry by the congregation.*
- The Grand Rapids church is to be commended for *its zeal in outreach*. Mr. Scott has done street preaching in Grand Rapids and has been joined by another in efforts to evangelize at various events in the Grand Rapids area.

Challenges

The Grand Rapids congregation needs prayer and counsel for a number of challenges (listed here), the most pressing of which is a lack of unity around how the Lord's Supper is to be administered.

• *The Lord's Supper*. It is the conviction of Mr. Scott, through much study and deliberation, that the right administration of the Lord's Supper requires the use of the common cup—i.e., communicants are to drink from a single cup, not multiple cups, at the Lord's Table. A minority of members and adherents are not willing to participate in the Lord's Supper if the common cup is used, namely because they find it unsanitary, according to the session. Mr. Scott, seeking unity within the congregation, has on one occasion administered the Lord's Supper with multiple cups but became so struck in his conscience that he said he could not do so again. Because of this impasse, and out of sensitivity to the congregation's needs, Mr. Scott has considered resigning and returning to Scotland.

Complicating the matter is that the session provided assurances to Mr. Scott—when he was considering whether to accept the pastoral call by First RP—that the common cup would be allowed. After he arrived it became apparent that further teaching on the sacrament was needed before that could be the case, which Mr. Scott subsequently provided. (The session later apologized to Mr. Scott for providing such assurances.)

In our visit Mr. Scott sought counsel from the visitation committee (our recommendations are below) on whether he should proffer his resignation. Some providences in his family's circumstances are making the decision even more difficult. These include the following: an approaching deadline to apply for a green card, an expense Mr. Scott is not willing to pass along to the congregation if he plans to return to Scotland; an expired lease on their rented home, which the Scotts are concerned about renewing if they are unable to stay; and an offer by a church in Glasgow to be an assistant pastor, which would enable Mr. Scott (after a three-month separation) to bring his U.S.-born wife to Scotland.

Our counsel on how to navigate these congregational and providential circumstances are listed below.

- *Building a Reformed Presbyterian identity*. First RP has had challenges embracing a more robust Reformed Presbyterian identity. Some in the congregation yet wish to retain "hold-overs" in worship practice, including the reading of the Ten Commandments (morning) and Apostles Creed (evening), and some desire to retain the 1912 Psalter. There is an abiding sense by the congregation of disconnection from the other churches in the presbytery and denomination.
- *Location/relocation.* The session believes that the church's location of worship at Puritan Reformed Theological Seminary could hinder growth for a couple of reasons. While the seminary offers a strong facility for worship and fellowship meals at a very reasonable cost, its location is detached from the surrounding community. Furthermore the session is concerned that the facilities of PRTS could be a point of congregational pride. Furthering the session's concern is that the church is still identified in terms of its former pastor—not in terms of its identity as a Reformed Presbyterian Church. The session has considered whether a change in location would be beneficial for the growth, influence, and identity of the congregation in Grand Rapids.

- *The eldership*. Since Mr. Scott's arrival, elder Richard Bonner has retired, and elder Doug Nadeau has expressed the desire to retire as well for personal health concerns. The church is reaching out to Presbytery at this time for provisional elders.
- *Finances*. The church did not meet its budget in the last fiscal year. While the Lord has blessed them with a strong savings account, a lack of support for the local ministry will no doubt be a burden on those funds.

Recommendations

The committee offers the following recommendations for First RPC:

1. That Mr. Scott remain at least one more year at First RPC. It is clear there is an impasse between the shepherd and some of the sheep as to the practice of the Lord's Supper. It's also been expressed that if Mr. Scott leaves, others would leave. It is hard to deny the concern that the doors of First RPC would be closed (eventually) in his departure. The session is willing to pursue whether the congregation would fund Mr. Scott's green card even in light of his possible departure. Given that possible funding and the strong support the congregation has for Mr. Scott's ministry already, the committee believes another year would allow more time for the pastor and the congregation to work on the practice of the Lord's Supper.

One concern remains—the ability for everyone to participate in the Lord's Supper this next year. To address this concern, the committee recommends that Mr. Scott administer the Lord's Supper three out of the next four times (the church practices quarterly communion), with one Lord's Supper administered by another pastor using multiple cups for those unwilling to commune using the common cup. The hope is that in this year unity might be built around the administration and participation of the Lord's Supper, and that Mr. Scott's ministry may continue unhindered there.

- 2. That the congregation explore a different venue. While the congregation has been able to maintain itself with the help of PRTS' affordable facilities, the committee believes that it would be beneficial to look for a new location of worship, if affordable and suitable for their ministry. This would not only allow opportunities for inroads into Grands Rapids that are yet unreached by current Reformed churches, but it also could help with building a fresh identity in the community.
- 3. **RP Identity**. The committee encourages the church to take advantage, when possible, of events going on with sister congregations in the Presbytery—such as the family camp, International Conference, and TFW/CYPU. One way to build a stronger connection is through prayer—i.e., praying for other congregations in public worship. Yet another opportunity for building a connection between the congregation and other RP churches—and other RP churches to the Grand Rapids congregation—may be through occasional pulpit exchanges, or through a delegation of one or two families from a church visiting Grand Rapids and vice versa.

Conclusions

We see strengths within the Grand Rapids RP congregation that are encouraging, including the relationship between the congregation and Mr. Scott and his wife. We hope, therefore, that the relationship between pastor and church will continue and that differences of conscience might be worked out in time. Whether Mr. Scott should pursue ministry back in Scotland, should he find himself better fitted for that context, is not a decision we find necessary to be made at this time. Another year of ministry together, along with love and respect for respective consciences, will hopefully bring both pastor and congregation to a more informed decision in the future.

Please join us in praying for Craig Scott and the Grand Rapids congregation.

GLG Presbytery Spring 2018 Meeting Congregational Report

Dear Fathers & Brethren,

In soccer they say it is a game of two halves. For First RP, 2017 was certainly a year of two halves. The first six months were filled with various challenges, while in the second half of the year the congregation grew both spiritually and numerically.

Difficulties

We have continued to face many challenges at First RP. Disagreements over Psalter translations, the use of the Apostles' Creed, and battles from 2010-11 were still prevalent in the first half of 2017. In addition to this, an issue with the Lord's Supper arose (see Presbytery Visitation Committee report). This was a difficult time for all concerned. Pastor Craig Scott offered his resignation to the congregation for the sake of unity. The congregation desired that Pastor Scott remain and continue his ministry at First RP. Pastor Scott said he could not remain and go against conscience but could only administer by common cup. After meeting the Presbytery Visitation Committee, Pastor Scott decided that he would remain and minister in the congregation. The session decided to honor its original promise to Pastor Scott and would administer by common cup. Individuals would partake or refrain as determined by conscience. At present the majority of communicant members partake while five members refrain. Those who refrain do not think the common cup is unbiblical or unconstitutional but do not like it for hygienic reasons. Though certainly not ideal, this arrangement permits both the Pastor to remain with conscience intact and members free to partake or refrain. Since this decision, the congregation has partaken of the Lord's Supper on three occasions and peace has been maintained.

Peace & Growth

The second half of 2017 was very much a contrast. Attendance grew from 25 to 40 as new people started to visit and remain in the congregation. We received 4 into communicant membership and one into baptized membership. The new attendees and members were hungry to learn and serve. They attend faithfully and contribute to the life of the congregation. For most of 2017 there was no adult sabbath school. Many asked session to implement sabbath school so they could learn and study the reformed faith. We happily obliged. The women were desirous of a women's study for fellowship and prayer. We happily obliged. Our own members and the new attendees have merged into a vibrant and hungry congregation. For the first time in years there is a spirit of fervency and unity. Fellowship & hospitality has also increased as many host open homes and get togethers.

Evangelism

First RP has been active with evangelism in both jail ministry and open-air witnessing. Four members are active in prison ministry. The Pastor leads a monthly worship service in the local Kent County Jail. We have seen a few visit church but many go back into the world. We are eager to learn how we can improve as a small congregation involved in prison ministry. Our open-air evangelism takes place every Tuesday and Saturday. We also do outreach for large gatherings in the city such as Art Prize. In 2017 thousands of tracts, DVD's, and Bible's were given out. Every week we are engaged in profitable gospel conversations. Approximately 10 unchurched people have come to our church through this witness. Members are meeting weekly with people we have met on the street. God is certainly working! It is our sincere prayer that the Spirit of Christ will convert and bring all to saving faith in our beloved Savior.

Discipleship

We have many discipleship meetings in the congregation. 5 men and women are receiving weekly evangelism training throughout the winter period as we break from Tuesday street evangelism. Puritan Reformed Theological Seminary have asked if their students may accompany us in our evangelism. Due to this link 8 students help with our evangelism. Most of the students have never done evangelism so it is a privilege to disciple young men training for the ministry in practical evangelism. Two men are currently being discipled in fortnightly one-on-one studies with the purpose of, Lord willing, serving as ruling elders.

Objectives for 2018

Our main objective for 2018 is to have local ruling elders. We currently have Pastor Craig Scott as the only active local elder. We are thankful to have Stephen Rhoda serve as provisional elder. With the increase of work, and many opportunities available, more co-laborers are essential for the session. We hope to have at least 1 ruling elder this year. We are currently in discussion with Rev. Namsik Yang to see how he could further serve in First RP. Other objectives include furthering the peace and unity in the church, fostering a love and relationship with the RPCNA in the congregation, and improving our own personal witness to family, friends, and work colleagues.

Conclusion

We are truly thankful to God for His mercy towards us. In June 2017 all looked dark and lost. Since then, His presence has been manifested and felt. We believe that First RP can be used by our Lord in building His kingdom in the city of Grand Rapids.

19		friends and with workmates.
20	•	One of our young men hopes to start a Bible Study to build up the other young
21		men in our congregation and to give evangelistic opportunity.
22	•	Several of our young people have been getting more active with CYPU. In addi-
23		tion, one of our high school girls hopes to be attending TFY this summer.
24	•	Our minister has begun a wider ministry, becoming part of the Mary Rutan Hos-
25		pital Chaplain staff. This is the local hospital in Bellefontaine, one of the best of
26		its size in Ohio. It is a volunteer position for a week most months. Phil finds this
27		delightful and in line with his gifts.
28	•	Unexpected financial gifts for our building fund from outside sources. We now
29		have more than enough money, if we have purely voluntary labor, to finish the
30		building. There may be enough, in fact, to engage a contractor to do some of the
31		work, or perhaps even finish it. Should the building be completed as we anticipate,
32		it will be without incurring any debt, due to God's favor and the kindness of many.

34	•	We anticipate a wedding this summer of one member to an adherent, who is inves-

45	Bump, Jim McDonald, and Paul McDonald. This has hindered our progress in this

Teaching and Preaching

We have maintained our normal teaching schedule. In the adult/family Sabbath School class we have been studying church history with DVDs from Ligonier. The teacher is Dr. Robert Godfrey. Before that, we had used Ken Golden's *Presbytopia*, as well as some additional material that our minister supplied, as a refresher for all our members and as a communicants' class for some inquirers. It is through that study that we gained one communicant member from the United Methodist church (not our hosting congregation) and ongoing inquiry from our anticipated summer bride.

In the first worship service, we continue in the Gospel of Matthew. The second service preaching series continues in the *Shorter Catechism*. There have been other texts used, as well, at special occasions. Our pastor has preached at the Dayton RP Mission Church in Dayton, TN, twice. We have experimented with using the preaching of other RP ministers via SermonAudio when our minister is absent or ill, using the Probsts' home sound system while we were meeting at their house, and then the sound system at the Mt. Zion Methodist Church's building, and it seems to have worked well.

Fastor's Excense

Report of the Bloomington Reformed Presbyterian Church to Presbytery

2018

"Witnessing for Christ in Bloomington for 196 Years"

[Paul] planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase. - I Cor. 3:6

As the session looks back on 2017, we rejoice at how the Lord continues to move in the congregation, strengthening, growing, and adding to us.

When we review the events of the past year, we are most cognizant of the number of ways that God has used the people of the congregation to minister to one another and adorn the gospel of Christ. The work of administering and coordinating the gifts of the Spirit among us has grown over the years through the various committees that were set up in response to the loss of the deacon board approximately 20 years ago. Now that the congregation has a strong deaconate, we still find these structures to be an invaluable help in incorporating the congregation into the ministry of the church. We are truly thankful for the hard-working people that make up these committees, and maintain their individual ministries. We also see how the Lord has given a spirit of hospitality and helpfulness that pervades the congregation. We are so thankful for the way we see the congregational ministry growing through the initiative of individual members pursing the work as the Spirit lays it on their hearts and in their minds. A most striking example of this concerns the range of Bible studies that go on from week to week, as the Lord puts the desire among us to gather together around His word. He is at work among us in such obvious ways, and we are very thankful for it.

The last year has seen an unusual number of changes in the congregation. Among the greatest joys we have as a session is to talk with new members about how the Lord has brought them to faith, and then into the congregation. While a number of people have left the congregation over the last year, the Lord has brought others to join us, and their active work among us is real testimony to God's provision for the congregation and for the community of Bloomington.

The most striking development, though, concerns the changes to the session. Although we are saddened with the loss of Adam and Anne Niess, we rejoice in their benefit to the Lafayette congregation, and the Lord has compensated us with the addition of two elders to the session. We have been discussing the need for a larger session, and praying for it over the last four years. To see the Lord's work come to fruition in the election of CJ Davis and Stephen Shipp is a real encouragement, and we trust will enable the congregation to continue to grow, and provide the needed attention for this larger congregation. We examined these men in the January, 2018, session meeting, and not only sustained the call of the congregation, but have also been able really to appreciate the way God has raised these men up, with just the right disposition and gifts for us at this time. These men were ordained and installed on February 4, 2018. The Lord provides richly.

Concerning the overall congregational membership, the following data are particular to calendar year 2017.

- 1. The average morning worship service attendance was 164, an increase of 17 over 2016.
- 2. The average evening worship service attendance was 105, an increase of 10 over 2016.
- 3. The average SS class attendance was 110, an increase of 13 of 2016.
- 4. The total communicant (119) and baptized (43) membership on December 31, 2017, was 162, a net increase of 2 over 2016.
- 5. Ten new communicant members were added.
- 6. Two communicant members were transferred to other confessional reformed churches, two were transferred to other non-reformed churches, and seven were removed from the rolls due to their involvement in churches with no discernable membership recognition.
- 7. Communicant membership at the end of 2016 was at 116, and rose to 119 at the end of 2017. The number of baptized non-communicant members at the end of 2016 was at 44 and fell to 43 at the end of 2017.

The session continues to contemplate how to provide for the continued growth of the congregation, especially on two fronts. The most important concerns development of leadership. We continue to pray that the Lord will call more individuals into ordained leadership, and see Him continuing to work in this direction with various individuals in the congregation. More particularly, we continue to actively pursue a second pastor by working with men in various positions around the denomination who we can envision being called to a dual pastorate in our context. We envision this being a major focus during the upcoming spring, depending upon the Lord's leading.

The second way concerns the infrastructure of the congregation. Part of this is what was involved with a move last year to incorporate the congregation. The more tangible area of concern, though, is the facility. The session has been monitoring the use of the facility, and its capacity. With some of the special events that we have seen this last year, the Thanksgiving Psalm Sing and three weddings, we have been able to ascertain the remarkable ability of the sanctuary to house a congregation of a larger size. However, we are keenly aware of constraints on facilities and classroom space, as well as the long-standing problem of accessibility. We have continued to seek to purchase property adjacent to the congregation, in advance of making a specific plan to expand the congregation's facilities.

The session met 14 times in formal court, only 10 of which were regular monthly meetings. Each of these meetings begins with the privilege of praying for the

congregational members, each by name over the course of the year. We also spend much time considering some of the needs and challenges of the individuals in the congregation in the context of giving counsel. Other meetings were conducted for the purpose of interviewing individuals for membership and communion, and one of them was combined with a congregational meeting to elect new ruling elders. In addition, the session again took the better part of the day last spring to go to Nashville and spend time together, talking through the larger issues facing the session and the congregation. The day continues to be very valuable for focusing our thinking about the direction of the congregation, and we plan on continuing this pattern.

With respect to the church beyond our congregation, our session members have fulfilled various responsibilities. Adam Niess, among other things, has been a member of the Selma oversight committee. Ken de Jong has been appointed to the Trustees of Geneva College, and is currently chairing the academic affairs committee of the college. Rich Holdeman is a Trustee of the Reformed Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Rich is also an active member of the candidates and credentials committee of the presbytery. Rich, Ken and Eric Cosens all are members of the Temporary Governing Board of the Terre Haute congregation. Finally, Wendell serves on the board of the Alliance of Confessing Evangelicals, a large coalition of individuals seeking to develop an appreciation of Reformed doctrine among a broad variety of churches.

We are so thankful to our God who gives us such tangible unity in Christ. This year has been a joy to us, we continue to give praise to him for you all, and pray that He will richly bless each one of you in Christ.

Fathers and Brothers of the Great Lakes—Gulf Presbytery,

In the Lord's providence, 2017 was a year where blessing and rejoicing was intermixed with trials and hardships for many of the members of Christ Church in Brownsburg. We rejoiced in May as seven covenant children publicly professed their faith and took the vows of church membership. Throughout the year, four families were blessed with new babies, and we continue to see evidence of spiritual growth in our members and our youth. We mourned as Rutledge Etheridge, Jr. succumbed to ailments that had beset him for many years, and died in August. We continue to pray for other members who continue to suffer from chronic medical conditions. Furthermore, several families are facing challenge or transitions in their employment situations. We pray that Jesus would minister peace and hope to the members of the body and to our surrounding community through the efforts of this branch of the church.

At the end of 2017, our Communicant membership stood at 64, an increase of six over the previous year. We received the transferred membership of one family (two communicant members; one baptized) from Lafayette RPC due to a relocation. As noted previously, seven covenant children publicly professed faith and joined the church. One member was transferred to another local church, one was dismissed at his request, and one was separated from us by death. Two covenant children were baptized in 2017, leaving us with 32 baptized members. There were no new members by profession of faith. The net change in total membership in 2017 was three. We are also blessed with the presence of two families who regularly participate in the life of the congregation, but have not yet joined the church. Christ Church has not taken regular attendance counts at worship services, but the Session is considering ways to implement the practice.

The weekly ministry of the Word continues to be the focal point of our congregational life, and we are blessed to sit under Michael LeFebvre's continued faithful preaching. The preaching in the morning services has been focused on the book of Acts. In the evening services, Pastor LeFebvre concluded a short series on a selection of Psalms before beginning an exposition of Deuteronomy, the final book of our Pentateuch series. A Psalm sing is held on the first Sabbath evening of each month in place of a preaching service. In addition to his preaching duties, Michael meets regularly to counsel members of the congregation and is active in denominational and presbytery assignments. In July, Michael traveled with his wife Heather to Malaysia to deliver a series of lectures at the Pilgrim Church Family Conference. The congregation was blessed by the preaching of George Gregory during Michael's four week absence. Additional guest preaching was provided by Rut Etheridge, III, Gordon Keddie, James Faris, Stan McKenzie and David Hanson over the course of the year. Christ Church practices weekly communion and observed the sacrament of the Lord's Supper 53 times in 2017.

The Session typically meets twice monthly -- once for a business meeting and once for a prayer meeting -- and was constituted in court 25 times over the course of the year. The Deacon board (three deacons) meets monthly and is actively engaged in the ministry of mercy both within the congregation and to the community at large. The Session and Deacon board periodically meet jointly to discuss the needs of the congregation.

Our Sabbath School program is conducted for nine months of the year, pausing for a break over the summer. Classes are provided for the primary, middle school, high school, and adult age groups. Fellowship activities are regularly planned for the middle school and high school students, and many participate in Presbytery youth activities. Two high school students were able to participate in the Theological Foundations for Youth program at the Seminary over the summer. We continue to hold midweek small group meetings in four locations: Avon, Brownsburg, Zionsville and West Indianapolis. These groups have been working through studies on Leviticus, Ruth and Esther over the course of the year.

Our building situation continues to be a matter for prayer. While the Seventh Day Adventist building we are meeting in meets our needs in a number of ways, we are stretching the capacity of the auditorium and classroom/fellowship space. Solutions to this issue are not apparent, so we continue to pray for the Lord's direction in the matter.

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law."

It has now been a full year since Pastor McCracken and his family returned from four months of sabbatical away. The stated purpose was for pastoral renewal. From the vantage point of a year later we are convinced that all the preparations, planning and writing were worth it. It was a time which revitalized several aspects of pastoral ministry and the fruit has been a year of formulating and preparing to implement a new vision for our congregation.

The year has been one of purposeful preaching on various aspects of this vision, taking a break from many years of expository preaching to address topically the church's calling to ...

"offer help, hope and a home by proclaiming the word, living out the gospel by investing in relationships and making disciples of Jesus Christ."

and this by intentionally seeking the Holy Spirit to work in us the fruits He bestows upon those who trust in Christ [Gal. 5:22-23].



The session began formulating this vision in the spring, and three teams of layperson were then recruited, each representing one of the three

main elements therein. These teams then worked for several months to present proposals to the session of ways to implement the vision. In November, those proposals were presented to the session, which then prioritized, filtered through them and coordinated them to lay out a plan for ministry together with necessary budgetary adjustments to begin following this congregational meeting. We are excited to see how God will use us in the coming year.

The congregation was thrilled to elect, ordain and install a new Deacon this year. Sean Mathews brings a caring heart, a craftsman's skill and an insightful mind to the board.

Pastor McCracken remains very busy with pastoral duties, administrative and teaching duties on the Paideia Co-op Board, serving the presbytery on the TGB of Dayton, TN and the denomination as secretary of the Home Mission Board. He looks forward to the help of elder Gary McNamee, who has just begun a year-long internship of about 10 hours/week (more during the summer months) while he continues his online studies at RPTS.

The Lord has increased counseling opportunities this year so that it is not unusual to be meeting with two or three people a week in this capacity. In November the session invited Pastor Barry York to come and address the topic of Pornography and Sexual Purity with the men of our community and congregation. This time was extremely helpful and a great many expressed how necessary this frank conversation is in the church today. A number of men both from within the congregation and from the community have begun meeting for regular discipleship as a result of this seminar.

One of the initiatives that flowed from our new mission teams is an effort to explore church planting possibilities in Louisville, KY. Both a single man and a couple from this area have become members in the Columbus RP Church and their contacts led us to begin an investigative Bible Study at the public library downtown, using Pastor McCracken's Commentary/Study-Guide in Luke that he edited for publication during the sabbatical. The group consists of about six or seven regulars who drive down

from Columbus and a combination of ten others from Louisville. The Columbus congregation commends this work to either the Northern or Southern Church Extension Committees.

Other new ministries that are in the works for 2018 are:

- Good News Club (Child Evangelism Fellowship) at a local public school.
- Companionship Ministry at *The Greentree Assisted Living Center* where we have a monthly worship service.
- Development of an ESL ministry in this city which is second only to Seattle in the nation for H-1B visas (a non-immigrant visa that allows US companies to employ foreign, graduate level workers in specialty occupations that require theoretical or technical expertise).
- New discipleship small groups.
- A welcome table with small gifts for visitors.
- "Children's Quiet Worship Bags" for use during the worship service or Sunday School.
- *Guess Who's Coming to Lunch* teams of families ready to prepare and share a meal with one another and with any visiting guests at the church.
- Mission Teams being sent out (one went to Stillwater, OK this past year).

In the last several months the Lord has brought in several new families that are currently undergoing the church information classes with the intent of joining with us. These are not reflected in the statistics shown below. For God's good care and provision of our church, we thank Him!

Congregational Report for First Reformed Presbyterian Church of Durham 2018 Presbytery

Psalm 145:6-7 Men shall speak of the might of Your awesome acts, And I will declare Your greatness. They shall utter the memory of Your great goodness, And shall sing of Your righteousness.

2017 has witnessed many blessings of the Lord. We have seen growth in grace and membership. We thank God for His care upon FRPCD.

This past year we have been blessed with our first intern, Drew Pressoir, from Greenville Theological Seminary. Drew came to us from the PCA, and we greatly enjoyed his teaching and his friendship. It was a blessing for Pastor Butterfield to have someone to mentor and help prepare for future ministry. Having an intern allowed for time for formal visitations with the membership.

We have three Sunday School classes, studying Church history, the Bible as literature, and a small children's sabbath school class. The Book of Genesis was the subject of the preaching series for the year. Now we are back in the Book of Hebrews. At Wednesday prayer meetings we continue through the Psalms for our meditation and have time for singing and praying for the needs of each other. This past summer, we started a Thursday night dinner and Bible study in our neighborhood to reach out and share the gospel. We have covered The Beatitudes, The Lord's Prayer and presently the Parables in that study. It continues to grow in momentum. Attending the study are neighbors, Christians from outside of our congregation, as well as our own people. The Lord has sent many visitors for Lord's Day worship our way, and some of them continue to worship with us. Among the new people is a family originally from Colombia, South America. Our Psalm Sings are not as numerous this past year as hoped but still very inclusive with christians from all backgrounds joint us. We are in the process of organizing our first conference sharing the riches of the reformed faith to both the wider church community in our area and to the lost.

The Lord has been gracious to give us Eric and Denise Hallfors to serve as our new Treasurers. On the financial front we have taken in more in tithes and offerings that we anticipated. Our expenses were higher than expected due to the three HVAC systems that were replaced this summer, and still we ended the year in the black!

Although we were saddened by our loss of Carolyn Walters, we rejoice she is blessed forever more in the presence of her great God and Savior. It was an honor and privilege conducting her funeral, grave side service, and memorial service for her family, friends and co-workers. One member we have taken off the role for lack of attendance and four others are inactive due to various circumstances. Two professions of faith were made from our baptized members and we received three others by profession of faith and another by transfer. We end 2017 with 22 Communicant members, 4 of which are Inactive members, and 17 Adherents. This is an increase of 5 Communicant members from 2016. Three people are in a membership class presently. The Session met nine times in 2016.

A new dynamic has developed within the congregation: people attending here, both members and adherents are reaching out to help, encourage and minister to one another, which adds a beautiful new dynamic to the life of the congregation. In ways both spontaneous and scheduled, we are in each others lives and homes with great consistency.

Denise and Eric Hallfors continue to bring brothers from Orange Correctional Center to worship and fellowship with us; twice Pastor Butterfield was honored to preach there in 2017. Pastor Butterfield also preached at two evening services at First Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church of Burlington and preached at an ordination service for an ARP Missionary.

Behind the scenes, Pastor Butterfield is providing counseling to both members and nonmembers. Those outside of the congregation are often introduced to biblical teaching at greater depth. The congregation is not only praying for the many prisoners we know, but writing letters, and witnessing gospel hope to them. Lord willing with the many prisoners the Lord has given us, we desire to develop a ministry to help them prepare for life after prison. We also are hopeful about developing a Spanish ministry, or participating with other churches in their ESL program. We wait for further developments and guidance from the Lord as to how better minister in Durham.

We thank the Lord for his goodness towards us and His blessings to the congregation. The Lord builds his house through the faithful works and prayers of his people. We rejoice to see this evident blessing working in our midst.

CHURCH HISTORY PAPER EXAMINATION & REVIEW

SECOND RP CHURCH (INDIANAPOLIS, IN) March 1-3, 2018

Student: Andrew Battiato Examiners: Shawn Anderson and David Carr

Title of Paper: Justification & the Council of Trent: Semi-Pelagianism in Roman Catholicism and Protestant Response

Thesis: "An examination of the historical circumstances and the teachings of the Council of Trent reveal how it solidified the RC position on justification, which, in effect, reinforced the PT outlook that the RC Church had become and remains an enemy of the true gospel of Christ."

General Observations:

This paper fulfills all the Presbytery requirements for a history paper, including grammar, punctuation, and annotation. This thesis a vitally important subject for the contemporary church.

First, we would like to commend this paper for its strengths. The topic is relevant to the contemporary Church. Many Evangelical churches that have descended from the Protestant Reformation can undermine many of the tenets of the Reformation in their theology and ecclesiology, including the preaching of a Gospel that sounds more semi-Pelagian than Biblically Reformed. The thesis relates directly with the message and the ministry of the Gospel. Further, the salient points of the Council of Trent's doctrine of Justification are distilled from the much larger work in a clear and helpful way. Andrew has helped his readers engage with the statements from the Council. It is also clear, looking through the Bibliography, that Andrew has not only researched from sources that would speak polemically for "the Protestant side", but has investigated from multiple perspectives.

Second, we believe that there are a number of weaknesses that do not negate but detract from the thesis. The only primary sources cited are from the Council of Trent. When any Protestant view is cited, it is not from Calvin, Luther, Evangelical Roman Catholics, or any contemporary with the Protestant Reformation, but instead only and always from historians. Further, the paper contains historical generalizations, such as, "Christian humanism, with its movement toward an Augustinian theology that emphasized the grace of God, was destined for a momentous conflict with scholasticism, with its movement toward a Pelagian theology that emphasized the merit of man." To identify and judge Scholasticism, or Medieval Scholastics as Semi-Pelagian is "to bite off more than one can chew" in this kind of paper, especially given the resurgence in study of the diverse intellectual movements within Scholasticism. More importantly, to read this paper, one would think that the Augustinian influence was lacking in the First Council of Trent, which is unintentionally misleading. Even the secondary resources cited in the paper would verify this internal debate. Finally, it was thought that a lack of clear definition and consistent usage of terms detracts from the paper. In other words, if any reader were occupied on the wrong side of the Semi-

Pelagian debate, this lack of primary sources, hasty generalization, and the lack of interaction with the internal debates of the Council of Trent on the topic of Justification from the Augustinian party, would all distract said person from the sound thesis and conclusion of the paper.

Conclusion: While there are significant areas for Andrew to work on in both research and argumentation, we believe that he has sufficiently established his thesis statement. Andrew takes the pertinent historical content provided in multiple volumes and makes it accessible to his audience in a brief paper. Finally, while this paper falls short of "refuting the debater" it does exhort in sound doctrine (Titus 1:9) and provides a foundation for anyone interested in further study of the topic.

<u>Recommendation</u>: That Presbytery sustain this paper for the Church History Exam.

We have much reason for which to give thanks to the Lord as we reflect back on 2017! He is faithful and He has sustained and prospered ERPC through His everlasting mercy in Jesus Christ. While we acknowledge the challenges we rejoice in the blessings, trusting that our Lord will build His church and the gates of hell will not prevail against it. (Matt. 26:18).

This past year during the morning worship services Pastor Mann completed studies through 1 & 2 Thessalonians, and selected psalms (Pss. 65, 67, 110, 126). In addition, multiple mini-series were presented including Psalm 89, John 15, church vitality, and the offices of elder and deacon. In December we began a new series on the Ten Commandments. Evening gatherings have focused on study expanding on the topics of the morning sermons. We have also met bimonthly on Lord's Day evening for worship with the Lord's Supper. Three testimony and sharing evenings were a blessing, as well as joint services with Michiana Covenant Presbyterian Church for Reformation Day and at the Marion, IN RPC for a Thanksgiving Psalm Sing. We are thankful for the preaching ministry of Pastors Rich Holdeman, Ray Lanning and Rich Johnston, who also filled our pulpit this year.

In January, 2017, we launched a men's discipleship group which studied *The Hole in Our Holiness*, by Kevin DeYoung through the spring. After a summer break with an enjoyable outing to see the South Bend Cubs, we began a monthly ABC study through 1 Timothy in the fall. The women also were strengthened by a 1 Peter Bible study early in the year and began a plan for one-on-one accountability in the fall. Four recreation nights at the church in the summer provided a great time for fun and fellowship as we gathered for volleyball and Ultimate Frisbee, as well as horse shoes and croquet with brief devotions following. In September we also kicked-off two small group Bible studies on Proverbs and parenting. It has been a blessing to spend time in the Word and prayer together in these settings. Prayer continues to be an emphasis with biweekly meetings the first half of the year and monthly the second half interspersed with the small group schedule. Some of the youth of the congregation have taken advantage of various ministries: Presbytery CYPU, TFY, SonRise Party, COVFAMIKOI, Winter Conference, short-term international ministry through a local Christian school. We hosted a CYPU Fall Ministry Project team in October and are thankful for their good work. We were blessed by various fellowship gatherings (ice skating, picnics, Resurrection Psalm sing/brunch, mission night on Pakistan, Christmas dinner) during the year.

In 2017, Session met 20 times in constituted court. We are thankful for the committed elders and deacons God has provided for ERPC, and that He has raised up an additional elder and two deacons to minister in answer to our prayers. The elders have sought to visit each household in our shepherding groups during the course of 2017 in TE/RE teams and very nearly reached that goal.

God has abundantly blessed financially in 2017, allowing us to pay off the building mortgage three years early. In addition, several major building and grounds renovation projects have been accomplished – HVAC upgrade and repair, new linoleum floor by the west entrance, parking lot resealing, repair of steps at three outdoor entries, and replacement of interior doors with windows.

We continue the Thursday Fresh Lunch outreach to the community and the monthly Lord's Day evening ministry at Faith Mission, serving the meal and seeking gospel conversations with diners.

The Session has sought to faithfully shepherd the following people through the transition of their status in the church. We were saddened to excommunicate Rochelle Moore after repeated efforts to reconcile her with her husband. We rejoice in the baptism of Olivia Dean born to Eric and Jessica Dean, and are blessed by the presence of Keith and Courtney Lorenz and their children Rudy and Jackie who were received as new members by transfer. Lauren Daniels also was received by transfer while she is attending college at Moody. We praise God for the professions of baptized members Jonathan Daniels and Jonathan Dean who were received into communicant membership. We miss Kevin and Patty McClintock, who were dismissed to a church near them upon their request, and Kelly McClintock who was transferred to the Marion RPC. Care was also given to inactive and out of bounds members: Alex Dean and Colin McClintock were removed from membership as indifferent members after several efforts to reach them; Charlie Dean was dismissed at his request.

We give glory to God who has protected, preserved and richly provided for His people in the Elkhart RPC over this past year, and pray for His grace and power to be demonstrated through the advancement of His church here in 2018. "But thanks be to God, who in Christ always leads us in triumphal procession, and through us spreads the fragrance of the knowledge of him everywhere." (2 Cor. 2:14 ESV)

Southern Church Extension Committee Report to Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery 2018

Our committee has not fielded requests for or pursued any new Southern works in the past year. Church planting in this region has been historically and continues to be a challenge for our presbytery and denomination. The reasons for this are not all clear to us, though one factor we believe will likely be a significant contributor to successful church planting in the future is the strengthening of our existing Southern congregations. So, our committee plans to meet monthly this year to pray for the strengthening of our Southern congregations and to ask God for wisdom and vision for his Kingdom in this part of the country.

We have had communication with the Birmingham Bible study group and would like to share both our perspective on that and our recommendation regarding the Presbytery of the Alleghenies Home Missions Committee's proposal to our presbytery (which is also appended to this report).

In 2016/17, we oversaw Sam Ketcham's leading of a Bible study in the Birmingham area for about 7 months. Though we had some concerns about moving forward with this group, we were prepared to do so in light of the Ketchams' plans to move to Birmingham. When that did not happen last spring, we decided not to continue the Bible study by some other means. Several households began again to meet in the summer of 2017, and one contacted us concerning the possibility of moving forward in church planting with our presbytery.

Following are some reasons why we continue to believe that pursuing a work in Birmingham is unwise for our presbytery at this time. Some of these reasons also support our recommendation regarding the POA Home Missions Committee's proposal.

- Distance from existing, vibrant churches in the presbytery: We have noted both from our presbytery's recent history and the counsel of synod's Home Mission Board that "parachute" plants have seen far less success than "daughtering" plants and the support they receive, and this caution is heightened in the absence of a local church planter. It would be very difficult to provide adequate shepherding at such a distance from the rest of our presbytery.
- Strained resources in the presbytery and strength of existing Southern churches: The results of our planting efforts across the South over the last 35 years are stark; as a presbytery, we have yet to plant a congregation that is not reliant on at least one of the following: a temporary governing body, financial aid, provisional elders, and outside preaching/pastoring. We do not see Birmingham as having a significantly better set of circumstances and resources than areas where there are existing-but-not-yet-stable new works. Rather than begin a new

effort, we sense that it would be wise to invest our resources in present efforts and ask the Lord to show us more blessing in bringing existing works to stability.

- The absence of a local church planter: 12 months ago we believed that Sam's eagerness to go to Birmingham (a place he was from and familiar with) and that the energy and giftedness he seemed to have for the work was a significantly compelling factor in moving forward despite the 2 bullet points above. Part of our failure in planting thriving churches in the South might be attributed in part to the fact that we have rarely had a Southern church planter.
- The group itself: There are certainly encouragements and strengths to speak of among these saints, but in terms of church planting and given the concerns above, the drawbacks are significant. These concerns relate to geography, leadership potential, and philosophy of ministry, among others.

Our committee is grateful for Paul Martin's ministry to this group on a couple of occasions and for his committee's interest in seeing a church raised up to the glory of God in Birmingham and our presbytery. However, we are not in favor of this proposal at this time, for the reasons outlined above, particularly with regard to distance, limited man-power for preaching/TGB/etc., and the many presbyters already serving provisionally in the South (without strong, established congregations).

Recommendation 1: That we thank POA for their willingness to serve but return their request and wait for clearer leading that church planting work in Birmingham should proceed.

If recommendation 1 is not the will of the presbytery and fails, we offer this alternative:

Recommendation 2: That the GLGP petition Synod to allow the POA to lead church planting efforts in Birmingham with the expectation that the POA would take full responsibility to bring the congregation to maturity. At such a time, the Birmingham work would be enfolded back into the GLGP. Such maturity would mean that the congregation would be defined by the congregation there meeting the following requirements:

- The congregation is fully organized (not Mission Church status).
- There are at least 2 resident ruling elders and no provisional elders.
- There is a resident installed pastor.
- The congregation is fully self-supporting (no longer receiving HMB reducing aid, presbytery subsidies, etc.).

Greetings Co-Laborers,

Recently, Paul Martin, the Regional Home Missionary (RHM) of the Presbytery of the Alleghenies (POA), visited Birmingham on two occasions, where he met with the families which had gathered monthly with Sam Ketcham for Bible study. Since his departure, the group has continued to meet and made special arrangements to enjoy Paul's ministry. Paul visited with the permission of SOCHEX on each occasion. Paul was also following up particularly with two families in the group, one he knew when ministering in the Pacific Coast Presbytery years ago and another led by a former member of Grace and Truth Mission Church in Harrisonburg, Virginia.

The POA desires to see an RPCNA presbytery develop in the southeast, with congregations from Trinity in Maryland to Orlando in Florida, drawn from both the POA and the Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery (GL-G). At present, four RPCNA congregations exist in this region, plus three mission churches and one preaching station. Thus, if the POA worked in Birmingham through its RHM and Home Missions Committee (HMC), we would be taking a constructive step toward the creation of a new presbytery out of parts of the two existing presbyteries.

Part of Paul's job description, approved by the POA in 2016, includes helping the presbyteries adjacent to us in church planting. As a result, the HMC of the POA, which has oversight of Paul's work, was also involved in pre-approving his ministry in Birmingham. We encouraged Paul to meet with the Birmingham people to assess where they are with respect to the RPCNA. He is impressed by the quality of the families there and believes that there is real potential there, if God would be pleased to bless the efforts of helpers like Paul. Therefore, the Home Missions Committee of the POA at our most recent meeting unanimously encouraged Paul to talk with members of the Birmingham group to see if they would welcome the following initial plan for a viable ministry there. We present the plan to SOCHEX for your consideration, and for the committee to present it to Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery's approval.

- 1) The HMC of the POA will oversee the work in Birmingham, in order to relieve the heavy burden presently carried by the Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery in helping scattered groups of Reformed Presbyterians in the southeast.
- 2) RHM Paul Martin will be particularly responsible for the development of the work in Birmingham.

3) The HMC will work with the group in Birmingham to establish a bank account, to permit those in Birmingham who wish to contribute to the ministry expenses of a church plant in Birmingham to send their tithes to a central place.

4) Paul will go to Birmingham for nine days each month, from a Saturday through a Monday, so that he will be there for two consecutive Lord's Days.

5) Paul will work during his week in Birmingham to cultivate community among the families invested in seeing an RPC established. During his first trip to Birmingham, he will contact NAPARC denominations active there in keeping with the Comity Agreement.

6) The RHM will coordinate sending teaching elders who will lead worship on the Lord's Days when Paul is not on site. We will be glad for elders of the GL-G to join in this ministry. (For instance, the group has used Gordon Keddie's studies in their meetings and would welcome his ministry among them.)

7) The HMC will keep SOCHEX informed regularly about the development of the ministry in Birmingham.

8) In a year's time, a careful assessment of the ministry will be made by the HMC of the POA and plans made or adjusted accordingly.

9) If a congregation is eventually organized in Birmingham, it will be a member of the GL-G Presbytery, because it is within the usual boundaries of GL-G, unless a southern presbytery has been organized by that time.

ADDENDUM TO THE SOCHEX REPORT SOCHEX PROPOSAL TO STRENGTHEN CHURCH EXTENSION IN THE SOUTH February 2018

The Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery has struggled to plant and sustain churches across the south. Over the last half century, great investment has led to little visible fruit in these organizations.

Here's a brief summary of the churches in the south:

- Pensacola, Florida: Opened and closed.
- Lynchburg, Virginia: Opened and closed.
- North Atlanta, Georgia: Opened and closed.
- Birmingham, Alabama: Ministry possibility explored last year, SOCHEX recommends not moving forward with efforts there at present.
- Atlanta, Georgia: Commission-led ministry seeking strength to apply for mission church status in 2019.
- Dayton, Tennessee: Mission church requesting a downgrade to preaching station in 2018.
- Pageland, South Carolina: Mission church requesting its pastor have his status changed to stated supply in 2018.
- Selma, Alabama: Congregation rejoicing in signs of new life and the hope of a new pastor, but this after many years of aging and decline. Provisional elders serve on session.
- Durham, North Carolina: Congregation rejoicing in renewed growth. Provisional elders serve on session.
- Orlando, Florida: Congregation stable, with local leadership.

In sum, only Orlando has sufficient local leadership. Note that, in spite of many efforts, we have yet to plant a single church in the south in the last half century that is self-sufficient in finances and/or leadership. By contrast, other parts of the denomination have seen significantly greater fruit through the daughtering of congregations. For instance, in Indiana, there were about 120 RP members in the early 1960s. Over the next nearly thirty years, by 1990, there were about 575. Today, almost thirty years since then, there are about 1300 members in Indiana, which has come about through the daughtering method. In 1990, the first extension work in the south was begun in Pensacola. Over these thirty years, there is far less fruit that we would like to see in the south, and we believe that the hope of daughtering churches around existing churches is our best hope. We think there would be much greater fruit in the long run if we could see three congregations in the Triangle area, for instance, and so we believe that focusing our energies to such ends.

The remit of SOCHEX is to oversee church extension in the south, rather than support existing churches. However, until we see at least one "new" congregation reach a level of sustained

success, we believe that the best way to extend the church in the south is to strengthen existing churches and daughter from there.

SOCHEX plans to shift to strengthening existing churches as the medium-range strategy for extension. Thus, we plan to say "no" to exploring new parachute works, and instead will focus on strengthening existing churches through the following means (which is just our start for now):

- 1. Call the presbytery to greater prayer for the churches currently in existence.
- 2. Establish a grant program for current churches to strengthen outreach (see below).
- 3. Seek other funding/resource options to strengthen outreach efforts in existing churches.
- 4. Seek co-laboring help for the existing congregations from retired/available pastors, insofar as help would be welcomed by the congregations.
- 5. Seek funding options to secure more laborers to help these churches and explore local outreach (RITP, interns, retired pastors/elders).

To fulfill the second of these commitments, we propose that a fund be established for non-competitive grants to be given to existing Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery congregation and mission churches for outreach. SOCHEX would review the grant-requests and grant the resources.

Funding could come from the following sources:

- Presbytery funds (in place of exploratory funds for other new works)
- Remaining funds from works closing in the south (in the event any ministry closes)
- Vital Churches resources (proposals to this committee of synod would be necessary)
- Personal gifts

SOCHEX would also seek to help locate other local sources of income for these churches, such as local grant programs.

Only existing congregations and mission churches would be eligible, which we expect would be four congregations at the end of presbytery. The grant-process would require that these existing congregations show a plan for how the funds would be used to reach out into the community in new ways. The funds could not be used to simply cover existing costs; extension efforts would be required. A maximum of \$2,500 would be granted to any one congregation in 2018-2019.

Finally, congregations would be required to submit an evaluation of the ministry-efforts enabled by the funding. Our hope is that accountability in planning and review would also help to develop the leadership and vision of these churches ministering in their local communities. This proposal is designed to focus our outreach efforts in the south more narrowly and more deeply. To this end, we ask for renewed support in prayer and finances from the presbytery.

SOCHEX acknowledges that these plans will need to be tweaked, and we desire your counsel as a presbytery. However, we do believe that there should be a fundamental shift in our approach to church planting for the next few decades until the Lord establishes stronger bases of ministry around the south.

Recommendations:

- That Presbytery establish the SOCHEX Existing Churches Fund
- That Presbytery give \$10,000 to this fund.

Candidates & Credentials Committee Great Lakes/Gulf Presbytery

Dear brothers of the Midwest Presbytery's Candidates & Credentials Committee,

Greetings in the name of the Lord. Pastor Koller contacted us through our Candidates and Credentials Committee, asking us to clarify the status of Brian Schwertley. We thought it wise to interact directly with your committee. As you know, Mr. Schwertley left our presbytery many years ago. His credentials were transferred to the RPCUS on February 17, 2001 by our Ad Interim Commission. Later, in 2006, the Covenant Reformed Presbyterian Church asked us for his "papers of commission", to which our minutes state "Mr. Schwertley was never charged with any offense or received any discipline in the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America and therefore we have no relevant documents to send."

Despite his being transferred without discipline, as the rest of this letter will show, we have grave concerns about Mr. Schwertley's history and reputation, which we believe render him unqualified for ministry in our denomination. We are not interested in building a case against him and going through the incredible effort of cataloguing the offenses and wrongs left in his wake. Therefore, we do not believe his visiting our presbytery would be necessary or helpful. This is especially true since the problems we see in his eligibility extend far beyond the concerns of our presbytery. Should he at some point come under the conviction of the Holy Spirit, being bowed low under the weight of his actions, we trust he will show the marks of a changed man in a life of repentance.

The Scripture says that those who are office-bearers in Christ's church must be men of good repute. All of us have developed a reputation, whether good or bad. Mr. Schwertley has developed a consistent reputation from his days in the Great Lakes-Gulf Presbytery and since then. It is our judgment and counsel that Mr. Schwertley's reputation is so negative that he should not hold office in the RPCNA, and that it would require many decades to rebuild the kind of reputation needed to be biblically eligible. We do not believe that he is eligible now, and we do not see that gaining eligibility would be possible in the span of a normal life time for someone of such age as Mr. Schwertley. We are glad that the session in Dallas has found him kind and courteous, and perhaps he could someday be a good member of an RPCNA congregation. However, there are behaviors

and patterns of life that do render a man ineligible for ordained service. Repentance should be appreciated but is not always or necessarily followed by restoration to office or position.

The following examples are parts of how his reputation has been shaped:

- When he was originally examined by the GLGP, there were many concerns about his character and manner. We voted to ordain him by a narrow margin. Later events confirmed the fears of many.
- As a church planter in Lansing, Michigan, he was ineffective. After a presbytery visitation, the presbytery voted to discontinue HMB decreasing aid funding in light of Brian's ineffective work and inability to wisely focus the resources at hand on the work he was called to do.
- Brian was then considered for a pastoral call in Southfield. After a very difficult election process, presbytery was called in to sort out the results. The presbytery nullified the whole election and asked the congregation to start again. Immediately, Brian left the congregation, effectively and divisively taking 38 members with him, ignoring our presbytery's counsel and invitations to return. He immediately went to the RPCUS, and the presbytery, disappointed in his response, but at as loss as to what else to do, transferred his credentials.
- Since then, Brian has lived for nearly two decades in the world of micropresbyterianism. He has not been able to establish a healthy congregation anywhere in that time.
- Brian has publicly written and spoken against the RPCNA and her doctrinal positions in books, on the internet, and in sermons posted online.¹ Even if these have been removed, these have built his reputation, and it is not a reputation of love for this branch of Christ's church. Indeed, his reputation is not good in many parts of the denomination and beyond due to his argumentative spirit and quarrelsome attitude. These stand directly opposed to the Scripture's requirements for teaching elders.

The first deacons were to be "men of good repute, full of the Spirit and of wisdom" (Acts 6:3), and we have not found Brian to be this sort of man over the last quarter century. Second Timothy 2:24 says that "the Lord's servant must not be quarrelsome but kind to everyone, patiently enduring evil, correcting his opponents with gentleness." Again, we have not seen this fruit in Mr. Schwertley. God requires in 1 Timothy 3 that the elder must be "above reproach" (3:2), and this man has not conducted himself in such a way,

instead being known for his abrasiveness. Paul also says that "he must be well thought of by outsiders so that he does not fall into disgrace" (3:7), but indeed his name, as a leader, has been a disgrace in the church over time.

We would note that our Constitution gives clear direction from Scripture on this matter. The Directory for Church Government (1.4) states concerning communicant membership that "No one should be admitted who... assumes an attitude antagonistic to the principles set forth in the standards of the Church." We would further note that Mr. Schwertley's antagonism toward the RPCNA is not a past matter but a current one. In a lecture (or sermon) posted online from December 31, 2017, he clearly and specifically impugns the RPCNA and our own presbytery in particular!² Given his long-standing antagonism toward our denomination, we can't understand why he would even want to be a part of us, nor why he would be allowed to.

We will give thanks to God if Mr. Schwertley bears sorrow and the fruit of repentance for the kind of spirit he has evidenced over the years. We rejoice when those who go astray in spirit come to understanding and when those who murmur accept instruction (Isa. 29:24). The church belongs to such as these. But the qualifications for leadership are far higher. Even in cases where leaders have fallen and been restored, there is not merely a "reset" but a long season of repentance, humility, and repudiation of error. Having not seen such evidences or interest from Mr. Schwertley, we counsel you to oppose the RPCNA receiving his credentials as a teaching elder. We believe that acknowledging him as an elder would be bad for the denomination and bad for your presbytery as well.

Please be assured that the strength of this letter is only meant to communicate clearly and not to communicate any disrespect or lack of love for you men and your presbytery. We understand this situation is likely difficult for you as well and have the utmost respect and love for you in your services to the Lord.

Although Ben will be assuming the responsibilities as the Youth Secretary of Presbytery (see **Recommendation 1** below), we are thankful that he and Anna will continue their faithful and tireless leadership over the Winter Conference.

At the time of this report, we just concluded a successful Theological Foundations Weekend (TFW), with Pastor David Hanson and myself as the speakers. This year marks a transition in TFW leadership, because Pastor Hanson will be assuming responsibility of administrating the

program. David Whitla faithfully piloted TFW for many years, but seeing as David Hanson appears to be "the New David" all things GLG Presbytery, it is only natural for him to shoulder this responsibility as well! I am excited for the program to be in Pastor Hanson's more-than-capable hands, and look forward to future years.

Additionally, SONrise Party is quickly approaching on March 30-31, 2018, and aims to be a fun evening for inviting friends, in order that they might hear a testimony with a Gospel focus. We will be returning to Covenant High School in Indianapolis for the normal lock-in format. This is the first year that Andrew and Lauren Saunders will be taking over leadership of the event from Zachary and Flo Blackwood.

On October 6-8, 2017, Second RP hosted the Fall Ministry Project, where students heard from Pastor George Gregory on the topic of "Service in the Church". Then the next morning, students traveled throughout the Presbytery to engage in service projects and stayed overnight to worship with the respective congregations that Lord's Day morning. We are thankful for Kevin and Bethany Mauser's faithful leadership of FMP, and are excited to see Aaron and Mary Murray shadowing the Mauser's to prepare for a possible future transition of FMP leadership.

Once again we made it a priority to offer significant scholarships to churches outside close proximity of Indiana. As a Presbytery spanning the Great Lakes to the Gulf, it is important to ensure that more distant churches have an opportunity to participate in the CYPU events as well, and we are thankful for the Presbytery's financial support to make this a possibility. This year, students and administrators alike have noted a desire to see more youth attend the Covfamikoi youth program. While a good number of students do attend with their families, few attend Covfamikoi when their family is not attending. Therefore, the Team desires to offer additional CYPU Scholarships, aimed at students unable to attend Covfamikoi with their families. The goal is to significantly offset conference. As it stands presently, the CYPU funds are at \$2,020. In order to offer a "pilot" year of Covfamikoi Scholarships, it is estimated that \$500 more than normal would be needed from Presbytery. Therefore, in **Recommendation 2** below, we are requesting a total of \$2,000 for the 2018-19 program.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve your youth for the past handful of years. It was a privilege and a blessing; and I will greatly miss my work with these godly young people. However, the CYPU Leadership team and events will be in excellent hands in Ben Larson; of that I am confident!

2017 Conference

Recap

The 2017 COVFAMIKOI Family Conference took place June 17 to June 22 at Lindsey Wilson College in Columbia, Kentucky.

The attendance for the 2017 conference was 340 representing 27 congregations. The attendance was down 15% from 2015 likely as a result of the conference being held in a new venue and in June. The 2017 conference was also maiden voyage of online registration with an option to pay online. These options were well received and extremely helpful for conference administration.

We were blessed to have Dr. Dennis J. Prutow, Dr. Calvin L. Troup, and Joel Hart as speakers for the conference. Dr. Prutow served as the main speaker walking us through the first 38 questions of the Westminster Shorter Catechism under the title of "The Glory of God in the Gospel". Dr. Calvin L. Troup served as the High School speaker, and Joel Hart served as the Junior High Speaker.

Conference Staff

The 2017 conference staff was a hard working group that can certainly be credited with the success of the conference. Anna Larson managed the nursery. Melanie Sturm taught the Pre-School aged children with help from Heather Kessler. Barb Mann led the 6-8 year olds with help from Natalie Faris and Cariann Spirydovich. Phil and Sharon Joseph lead the 9-11 year olds. Zachary and Flo Blackwood assumed overall leadership of the High School and Junior High Program activities and counselors. Ben Larson took responsibility for Psalm precenting. Jonathan and Michael Sturm managed the recreation program.

Conference Leadership

The executive committee of the conference consists of Charley Moore (Conference Manager), Zach Blackwood (Youth Director), and Erich Baum (Conference Director). The committee would like to recognize Beth Moore, Flo Blackwood, and Bobbie Baum as being invaluable to the effort.

The advisory committee appointed by the Presbytery serves as a sounding board for the leadership. The committee consists of Jeff Kessler, Ben Larson, and Jonathan Schaefer. The Conference leadership thanks these men for their counsel.

Financials

The financial report for 2017 is attached for your review. We started the year with a checking account balance of \$11,255 and ended the year with a balance of \$15,257. Typically, conference leadership

attempts to break even year to year. However, this year saw a net growth despite only taking one offering during the conference. This increase is attributed to the following reasons.

- 1) The generosity of the conference attendees.
- 2) The conference rates were increased 7% from 2015 for unknowns associated with a new location.
- 3) The Presbytery allocation increased from \$2,000 to \$3,000.
- 4) Lindsey Wilson College waived several of the facilities and support fees that were budgeted.
- 5) Football field rental and golf cart rent were not required.

2018 Conference

Times and Dates

The 2018 COVFAMIKOI Family Conference will be held June 9 to June 14 at Lindsey Wilson College in Columbia, Kentucky. The time was moved to earlier in June to obtain exclusive access to the main dorms at Lindsey Wilson College. Conference registration for 2018 will only be available online, with an option to pay online or directly to the conference manager. The cost structure for 2018 will be the same as 2017.

Speakers

We are pleased to have Kyle Borg as the keynote speaker for this year's conference. Kyle Borg is the pastor of Winchester Reformed Presbyterian Church in Winchester, KS. He will be speaking on the topic "The God of Glory and the Glory of God". This year the High School group will join the adults for the plenary sessions. David Hanson has kindly agreed to serve as the Junior High speaker.

Conference Staff

Conference leadership is still in the process of gathering a staff for the 2018 conference. We hope to have the staff put together by the end of March.

Challenges

The conference director, Erich Baum, has taken a job in Cambridge, MA and will be starting there in mid March. He agreed to serve as conference director for a 3 year term (2017-2019) and will honor this commitment if the Presbytery so desires.

Recommendations:

1.) That Presbytery approves \$3,000 for conference expenses.

The Pattillos have struggled with various health and financial issues, which have been a major factor in their sporadic church attendance; at the moment, they are not settled in a congregation.

Recommendation: That this report be approved.

2018 Report of Presbytery's Nominee to the Board of Corporators of Geneva College

Dear brothers:

I am reporting to you as your nominee to Synod to serve on the Board of Corporators of Geneva College. I currently serve as the Board's Secretary and, consequently, upon the Executive Committee of the Board. I am delighted that I now serve with two other Corporators from our Presbytery, elected by Synod: Dr. Kenneth de Jong of our Bloomington congregation and Session, and Mr. Scott Reynolds, also of our Bloomington congregation. Dr. de Jong also serves as a Trustee.

I here repeat a paragraph that I place in every year's report, because some delegates to Presbytery may not be familiar with the governance of Geneva College. To refresh you, the Board of Corporators has twelve members, all elected by Synod. Each of the North American Presbyteries have nominees to Synod, with Synod's Nominating Committee nominating the others. All must be members in good standing in the RPCNA. We each serve four-year terms. The Corporators are the legal owners of the College. They are the members of the Corporation chartered by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Corporators' main tasks, under the Bylaws it originates, are to govern the College through a Board of Trustees it has created and whose members it elects, to elect a President of the College, to steward the Bylaws, and maintain a strong connection to the Synod of the RPCNA. The Board does its governing through the Trustees, who operate the College on the Corporators' behalf. Half of the Corporators serve as Trustees, as well, thus maintaining useful liaison between the Boards and allowing Synod, in effect, to have direct placement of some Trustees. Dr. de Jong is an example of this.

Since my last report, the Board has met twice. The first was on 1 July, 2017, at the Baymont Inn and Suites near the Indianapolis airport, the day after Synod. Trustee Chair Joye Huston reported that the Trustees were working well together, and that the goal of board members to raise \$100,000 for the College was more than realized. She also informed us that there was an ongoing weekly prayer meeting for increased enrollment. College President Calvin Troup reviewed his presentation that he had given at Synod, "The College as Mission Station". He had attended or would (and did!) attend all the various Presbytery family conferences, either giving presentations or teaching high school students. He spoke about the new Shanghai Pathway program that has been developed. Finally, he expressed gratitude to Synod for its two position papers on sexual orientation in 2011 and on gender identity, adopted at last Synod. At this summer meeting, we have our normal time for elections. New or re-elected officers of the Corporator Board are Steven McMahan, chairman; Matthew Filbert, vice-chairman; and Philip Pockras, secretary. We elected or re-elected Trustees, as well.

Our most recent meeting was a few weeks ago, on 10 February, 2018, at Geneva College. Before the meeting, we had been invited to join the Trustees, as well as some administrators, staff, and faculty, for dinner and a presentation on the evening of 8 February given by Dr. Carl Trueman on possible cultural threats to Christian institutions, followed by a response from ADF Attorney Greg Baylor. Then, on the morning of 9 February, we met with the Trustees for breakfast, prayer, and an additional presentation

by Mr. Baylor with additional comments by the College attorney, Mr. David Porter. Their presentation was somewhat of a follow-up to the previous evening, along with comments on the social/political climate in Pennsylvania that might affect Geneva.

At our actual meeting on Saturday, 10 February, we had the pleasure of being joined by two new Corporators: Mr. Chris Huggins, nominee of St. Lawrence Presbytery, and Mr. Scott Reynolds. Mr. Huggins, who has previously served as a Corporator, replaced the now-deceased Dr. Peter Howe. Mr. Reynolds replaces Mr. James Tweed, who wished not to be re-elected, to give more time to his family and to the Winchester, KS, congregation and Session. Trustee Chair Huston spoke of the concern of the Trustees with the pressures of societal and governmental threats. The strong tie of the College to the Church is seen to be hugely valuable and useful. Trust and unity on the Trustee Board has largely been restored. President Troup had a useful presentation on several topics. The first topic was "financial and other College health matters". One of the most important matters Presbytery should know is that the College is emphatically not in financial crisis. While things could be better with a billion-dollar endowment, Geneva is better placed, financially, than many smaller liberal arts colleges. The second topic was "New Programs", including nursing, a Master's degree in cybersecurity, and a men's volleyball team. As well, interest in the Bible and Philosophy department has grown quite a bit. The third topic was "Relationships". Things with the CCCU are better and more unified, particularly on social and political matters. In case the NCAA starts harassing the school on such matters, already exploration is being done toward a possible affiliation once again with the NCCAA. Lastly, in "Spiritual Work", Dr. Troup noted that a fund endowed by Roy and Bob Blackwood has provided for many new discipleship groups springing up on campus.

There is something else I want to repeat from last year, because it is very important to keep before Presbytery: some of you may remember that there was a reorganization of the governance of the College, as well as extensive Bylaw revision in recent years. This was all in order to the stronger ties with the RPCNA. In all the talk about social and political pressures, the big one now has its own abbreviation that I just learned at this meeting, and you'll be seeing it more and more: SOGI. It means "Sexual Orientation and Gender Issues". The college's strong tie to the Church is coveted by many schools, now. Our strong stands at Synod on SOGI, with much of that work done by men of our Presbytery, are a huge help to Geneva.

College enrollment numbers are up somewhat, and our Trustees continue to exercise financial prudence. Geneva continues to be rated well by *US News and World Report* as a good value in the eastern part of our country and is rated well for its beauty.

Our next meeting is to be, D.v., on the afternoon of 1 July, 2018, the day after Synod's adjournment, again at the Baymont Inn and Suites near the Indianapolis airport.

For your information, the website for the College is at <u>www.geneva.edu</u>. Much information is there on all sorts of matters pertaining to the College.

I again thank you for your confidence in me, which you have shown by your nominating me again to Synod. I am happy to continue this service as long as you desire.

NORTHERN CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE Report to GLG Presbytery - Spring '18

Largely due to my negligence, this committee has not met this year and therefore has nothing official to report. As chairman, I would like to mention however two things:

I received an email from Phil Jones requesting information regarding our presbytery's ongoing interest in church planting in Fort Wayne, IN. His letter is below for information:

"We belong to the only reformed and Presbyterian church in Fort Wayne, which is a PCA. Over the last three years, I have seen a growing interest in reformed theology in Fort Wayne. There is a young family in the PCA here that believes in exclusive Psalmody, and would be interested in an RPCNA work here. While he loves the PCA church family, he would enjoy being in a denomination that holds to a stricter subscription to the Westminster Standards and practiced exclusive Psalmody. There is a CREC congregation 28 miles west of Fort Wayne; a couple of young men who were once associated with the PCA, and who believe in exclusive Psalmody, attend there. There is at least one CREC family who live in Fort Wayne and attends the CREC but wish there was another reformed church option in Fort Wayne. There may be others. Lastly, Jared Olivetti's father-in-law is a ruling elder in the PCA here. He is actually a graduate of RPTS. Again, I have no idea of he would be interested in an RPCNA work or not."

Secondly, as you saw in the Columbus congregation's report, there is an organized and intentional effort being made by that congregation to investigate the possibility of a church plant in Louisville, Kentucky. While there is a strong Reformed Baptist church there, the Associate Reformed Church there has been in serious decline and is seriously having to consider closing. The Columbus RPC is currently conducting a weekly Bible Study at the downtown Public Library in Louisville made up of three or four family units from that area. The Lingerfelt family (formerly of Rochester RPC in NY are attending that study) as are two other family units that have joined or will soon join the Columbus RPC membership.

Sparta Reformed Presbyterian Church Report of the Session to Presbytery – March 1-3, 2018

2017 was a challenging year for us. We began with a settled pastor who was starting his fourth year with the congregation. We ended with no pastor and a provisional moderator. The Hemkens desired to begin the adoption process but Daniel and Kim did not see any way they could afford the costs on the income which our congregation was able to pay them. Consequently, in December 2016 the Session gave its blessing (with some sadness) to Daniel's request to pursue a call in a larger congregation. On July 31 they completed their ministry with us and began to minister at the RP Church in Clay Center, Kansas.

In the first half of the year Daniel preached Malachi and I Timothy in the morning worship service and in the evening he taught on exclusive psalmody and a cappella singing, a survey of Ezra and a topical series on apologetics.

Public ministry

Since Daniel's departure, God has graciously and kindly provided Frank McGuigan as our regular pulpit supply. Frank is a graduate of Covenant Seminary who is searching for his place of ministry. The Sabbath School class for both adults and older children has included sermons from Rich Ganz and a powerful seminar on church revitalization by Pastor Harry Reeder. There has been a regular Wednesday evening prayer time at the church led by Bob Morrow. Communion was observed on three Lord's Days. The fourth Lord's Day of the month we continue our ministry at Cedarhurst Retirement Center under the leadership of Jack Vink.

Provisional moderator

In August, at our request, Presbytery appointed Keith Magill to be our provisional moderator. Beginning in September he has made monthly trips to Sparta to not only preach God's Word on the Lord's Day but also to get to know our people and to understand our financial situation including the four properties we own. Each weekend included a lengthy and hopefully productive Session meeting on Saturday afternoon.

Session meetings

The first two Session meetings of the fall were given mostly to bringing our provisional moderator up to speed on the families and the circumstances of the congregation. We also began an evaluation process of the congregation's ministry in the past and up to the present. How has God used us in this community? Why, in recent years, have we not seen conversions and new people to whom we can minister? Why is God not entrusting some of his precious, elect children to our congregation to be discipled and equipped for ministry? What could another pastor do that has not already been tried by the previous two pastors to have a more effective ministry in the community? Why should the Sparta RP church continue?

Membership

Some uncertainties about our roll have been resolved. We have 18 communicant members, (a loss of 4) and 5 baptized members (a gain of 2). 5 of the communicant members are either inactive or non-resident. Average morning attendance was 16 and evening attendance was 12. No baptized members professed faith and there were no new members by profession of faith.

Properties

Our provisional moderator and Robert Finley have examined the four properties which belong to the congregation. The house at 512 Maple St. is so damaged that it is unlikely that anyone would want to rehabilitate it. Therefore, it is a candidate for demolition. The property at 516 Maple St. is where Jim McMahon lives. Jim is planning to move to Indianapolis as soon as there is an opening in the retirement center that he believes will work best for him. That will leave that house vacant. The Session is beginning to address once again what to do with these two houses.

The church building is in good condition with only a few minor maintenance issues that need to be taken care of. For this we are very thankful.

When we first visited the parsonage at 411 Vine St. last fall we saw quite a few issues that needed to be addressed

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if anyone was to live there. Thankfully, Bob Finley took the initiative to prepare the house for what we thought would be an unoccupied winter. However, God had other plans for our parsonage.

Finances

Our provisional moderator has worked with our treasurer, Eric Morrow and his faithful assistant, Mary Morrow, to review and update the church's financial record-keeping. This has led to a new form for the financial statement. We ended 2018 with a surplus of about \$2,300 for the year.

Our clerk

James Odom and his family have done valiant work in carrying out many things which had been done by Pastor Hemken and Elder Morrow. James has been Clerk of Session since January 2016. He and his daughter Clara prepare the bulletin every week, which is no small task. He coordinates securing the men to fill our pulpit on the Lord's Day. And most recently he has initiated an early morning Bible study for the men of our church and others who are interested. The Odoms also run the "Odom's Guesthouse" which has been a wonderful provision for ministers coming from out of town and many other friends traveling through. The Odoms minster in many other ways for which we are thankful.

Joshua Hall

The most unexpected development of the year has been the coming of Joshua and Amy Hall into our midst. Pastor Hemken met Joshua a couple years ago through an area pastors' fellowship. Joshua has preached at least two times for us. He is currently the Assistant Pastor for Students and Families at nearby Marissa PCA. However, his position at Marissa will come to an end on May 31, 2018. Last fall Joshua presented a plan to our Session which involved the Halls moving into our parsonage and exploring the possibility of a longer-term relationship with our congregation. After an extensive interview in our December 2017 Session meeting, we decided to accept the Hall's offer after which we entered into a written agreement with the Halls. The Halls moved into the parsonage the third week of January and are doing extensive renovations on the parsonage in exchange for rent.

The future

Joshua Hall is interested in being hired as a part-time interim pastor of our congregation. Before we can recommend to the congregation to enter into this relationship, we are contacting references which Joshua provided us. He will be preaching four morning worship services in the next few months and maybe some evening services as well. With our help, he is exploring what is required to be received by our Presbytery as a teaching elder in the RPCNA.

If we believe that the Lord is leading us toward hiring Joshua as our interim pastor, we will have another congregational meeting where we will have Joshua present his vision, where he will be interviewed by the congregation and where we will present a revised budget. The congregation will then decide if we want to enter into this relationship. If we do, we will request that Presbytery continue appointing a provisional moderator for our Session. This arrangement would be similar to the one Presbytery approved for Steve Rhoda to be interim pastor at Westminster RPC several years ago. Session anticipates bringing any such request to the Synod meeting of Presbytery in June.

We anticipate that Joshua Hall will be present for most of this Presbytery meeting. Please take the opportunity to meet him.

St Louis Ministry

Several years ago Sparta initiated ministry in the greater St. Louis area. We were given a grant from the HMB and a commitment from Presbytery funds. Also, at the request of Presbytery, the Trustees of Synod approved making available some of the proceeds from the sale of the Oakdale church property. Unfortunately, the ministry in St. Louis was ended in about 2011. Sparta is holding funds left over from the Oakdale property sale. We intend to ask the Trustees to allow Sparta to use those funds for its local ministry. We may need some help from Presbytery in our appeal to the Trustees.

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Conclusion

In conclusion, we rest on the fact that Jesus promised, "I will build My church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." (Matthew 16:18). He did not promise anything about specific congregations at specific times in history, but He did promise that whatever we see happening, He is about the work of building His church and we are part of it. Further, he promised that, "I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my eye upon you." Therefore, " Be not like a horse or a mule, without understanding, which must be curbed with bit and bridle, or it will not stay near you. (Psalm 32:8-9). And further and most reassuring, is that the Lord tells us, "The heart of man plans his way, but the LORD establishes his steps." (Proverbs 16:9)

Recommendations:

- 1. That Keith Magill be reappointed provisional moderator of Sparta RPC.
- 2. That Joshua Hall be allowed to participate in the Travel Fund for this meeting of Presbytery.

Sparta Reformed Presbyterian Church Addendum to the Report of the Session to Presbytery – March 1-3, 2018

Sparta is presenting an additional recommendation.

3. That Presbytery endorse the Sparta Session's request to the Trustees of Synod that the remaining funds originally designated for new work in St. Louis and Southern Illinois by the Oakdale RPC be granted to the Sparta congregation to be used exclusively for capital investments in the congregation's property in Sparta.

Background:

In late 2005 the Sparta congregation began a concerted effort to develop new work in the St. Louis area. In 2008 the Home Mission Board granted us \$4,000 for ongoing exploratory expenses in this effort. The HMB asked the Presbytery to match that amount. Presbytery put \$2,000 in its 2010 budget and another \$2,000 in is 2011 budget.

In 2008, as the Oakdale congregation was in the process of closing, they requested that the Trustees of Synod, with the endorsement of our Presbytery, make available 33% of the proceeds from the sale of their property for "evangelistic and church planting work in Southern Illinois and the St. Louis area." In February 2009 the Trustees of Synod granted this request of the Oakdale congregation. The Trustees noted that, "Typically, the funds would be distributed to the Building Loan Fund of the Trustees, unless the funds are requested for a new work in the general area of the disorganized congregation." As a result, about \$8,000 came to the Sparta congregation from the Oakdale property sale for work in the St. Louis area.

In 2011 the work in St. Louis was disbanded. The congregation had spent the \$4,000 from the HMB as well as some of its own funds in the earlier stages of the work. They also spent about \$4,000 of the funds from the Oakdale congregation. They never received the budgeted funds from the Presbytery because, with the ending of the ministry, there was no longer a need. About \$3,800 from the Oakdale property sale remains in a Sparta account today.

It is this \$3,800 that the Session is petitioning the Trustees to be granted to Sparta for capital investment in its properties.

Support for this petition:

- The Sparta and Oakdale congregations were yoked closely together especially after Oakdale lost their last full-time pastor in 1991. Ray Morton was installed as their part-time pastor in 1998. Ray preached in both places and moderated both sessions for more than 12 years until Oakdale was disorganized in 2010. Oakdale paid a significant percentage of Pastor Morton's compensation. Although there is no way of knowing for sure, it would seem reasonable that the Oakdale congregation would have been supportive of more of their funds going to the surviving congregation in Sparta if the outreach efforts did not materialize.
- 2. Sparta will use these funds only and exclusively for capital investments in their property. For example, we are in the process of significantly upgrading the parsonage which has many deferred maintenance issues. The funds could be used toward replacing the roof and gutters which are in disrepair. If the Sparta congregation did not survive, an eventuality we are not contemplating at this point, we are confident that the Oakdale funds would have increased the value and salability of the Sparta properties. This might result in an increase in the value of the Oakdale funds that would then be returned to the Trustees. In our view, this would be a better return on these funds than simply adding more money to the Building Loan Fund of the Synod.
- 3. At this time the best means of increasing outreach in the Southern Illinois and St. Louis area is to strengthen the Sparta congregation which would be the supporting base for any such outreach.

The central question for consideration was: Has APF reached an organic level of community life 15 and profession required to become organized? This is a typical question asked of each of our 16 church plants over the years and always requires much discernment. APF is unique. It has unique 17 challenges but also an abundance of opportunities, gifts, blessed fellowship and love experienced 18 19 by adherents and visitors alike. Due to this uniqueness, we implore the Lord for an increase of wisdom and discernment as we move forward with the work of APF in "The Bluff." 20 21 This Commission asked for and received your endorsement to go to Atlanta to investigate the 22 viability of Mission Church Status in 2017. Altogether, four of the five members were able to 23 visit APF on October 6-9 and interview all those interested in joining a local mission church in 24 the "Bluff". The Commission placed all those interviewed into following categories; 25 26 27 1) Those the Commission is willing to receive into communicant membership without 28 reservation; 29 2) Those the Commission is willing to receive into communicant membership but would have 30 to work through various pastoral issues prior to being received; and 31 32 3) Those the Commission is not willing to receive into communicant membership at this time. 33 34 The total number of those who fall into the first category are 7 individuals. The second category 35 36 is comprised of individuals who are facing a variety of pastoral issues ranging from seeing APF 37 as a place to serve, but not to be served to fiancés who are members at another church. Finally, the third category is comprised of individuals, who in the opinion of the Commission lack 38 credible professions of faith or are precluded from membership based on current life experiences. 39 40

B) Challenges

The Commission believes that the most significant challenges to the above goals are (1) life in the "Bluff", (2) need for additional leadership, (3) Dr. Smith's leadership, and (4) lack of a morning worship service.

The APF ministry is challenged intrinsically by life in the "Bluff". The community is influenced by matriarchy in the family structure. Additionally, the welfare system promises the community money and resources but perpetuates circumstances so that the mothers raise kids who continue in the same path. Finally, there is a lack of stable men in the "Bluff". Consequently, there is a lack of any local model of a Christian home and associated family life, there are is minimal male presence to mentor young men, and local giving is unable to meet the budget.

70

The APF ministry is also challenged with the need for additional leadership. There is no local ordained leadership living within the "Bluff". This challenge is not only present for APF, but also of other churches in the Bluff community. About 98% of the congregants from congregations in the area consist of families living outside these neighborhoods. Related to this is that the ministry seems predominantly tied to Dr. Smith and there is the question of what would happen if he were no longer there. Finally, there is some 1:1 discipleship going on (Amy Work), but there is much need and there is currently no formal or informal midweek contact.

Furthermore, Dr. Smith's leadership presents the APF ministry with an additional challenge. Dr.

79 Smith is known throughout the presbytery for his committed optimism. He has acknowledged

80 that he would greatly benefit from more local leadership gifted with a realistic wisdom for the

81 urban context of English Ave/Vine City (beyond the gifts and support of his wife, Penny).

82 Considering this enthusiastic tendency, in addition to the somewhat strained relationship that Dr.

83 Smith has had with the Presbytery, it is apparent that the question of the church planter's

- 84 limitations of skill and ability in this setting has directly affected the viability question of the
- 85 church plant. Commission members have counseled with Dr. Smith on these issues.

Finally, there is the lack of a morning worship service. It is challenging to have a sense of who would truly make up the membership of this mission church without using the discernment that an AM service provides.

89 <u>C) Strengths</u>

90 Positively, the Commission identified many strengths and gifts in APF.

- A diversity of people, with an obvious spirit of fellowship and love, gather weekly for
 worship, where the clear preaching of the Gospel as well as catechizing is present. We
 expect to see the morning services, begun in February, to increase the shared partnership.
- 95 2) The supportive core is healthy, service-oriented, transparent and willing to talk about
 96 struggles. There are many willing servants, to include mature and competent women who
 97 are mentoring other women and teens.

- 3) The children currently attending are joined and overseen by parents. Transportation is
 available and supplied weekly. It is clear that APF's ministry continues to be respected and
 appreciated in the community.

- 103 4) Dr Smith's idealism energizes him in many ways, culminating in a sacrificial ministry.
- 105 5) Significant financial giving is provided so that budget is met annually.

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122 Though we have identified the most significant challenges, we are eager to tell you of the 123 developments of APF that have, by God's Providence, recently transpired:

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1) Robert Lebus will step into the position of "Local Diaconal Care Leader" and plans to live 125 in the apartment complex where APF meets for worship. Robert has previously lived in 126 the "Bluff" and owned a bike shop in the neighborhood 23 years ago. Robert is a very 127 visible and active "handyman" who is able to encourage and guide others who serve with 128 him. Moreover, Robert picks up people from the "Bluff" and brings them to church. He is 129 burdened for the lost and cares deeply for the neighborhood. He was attracted to APF 130 because of the uniqueness of the ministry but ended up staying to deeply connect himself 131 to the work because he feels like this is a "real" church. He has been drawn closer to the 132 Lord because of, (in his words,) "seeing the fruit of people repenting". His functions and 133 duties will now also include: 134

a) Giving temporal relief and spiritual care to those in need as directed by the APF Board
of Advisers, in coordination with the Minister;

- b) Assisting the Minister in transportation of families to worship;
- 141 c) Living at the APF building several days during the week to provide building security 142 and a local contact;
- d) Maintaining the APF facility;
- e) Providing formal and informal reports to various oversight bodies; and
- 148 f) Assisting Treasurer in annual budget plan for mercy, maintenance, and janitorial items.
- 150 2) APF has begun morning worship services as of February 2018.

3) In February 2018, the request for Mission Church Status was put to the Commission by 151 152 Dr. Smith. The Commission advised Frank to wait at least another year, given the above developments so that as a Commission and Presbytery we could further see, evaluate, and 153 understand the growing care, love, and fellowship at APF. Dr. Smith chose to take the 154 counsel of the Commission and voluntarily put the request on pause, asking for some 155 156 brotherly assistance. Therefore, in this spirit, we ask of our brothers take some time to advise Dr. Smith on how to encourage those who currently want to be baptized and 157 celebrate the Lord's Supper at APF. 158

- 4. The goals that we had presented to, and were adopted by, Presbytery were reviewed and Dr. Smith gave an update on each. No progress has been made yet regarding local leadership living in the immediate area. There has been a small increase in the local giving, but it is still below the levels that are needed.

- 9. Regarding the present facilities, Dr. Smith indicated that there were 62 in worship recently (with 42 of them children) and that the facility was tight. He discussed the plans that Rev. Howard Chou's congregation in California has to purchase a building and provide access for AFP, indicating that AFP would only have access to one quarter of that building. So instead they are considering looking for a different church building (such as the North Avenue Baptist Church) to rent for now.
- 10. It was moved, second and passed to change Dr. Smith's yearly compensation, at his request, to \$19,800.00 and that we then budget a yearly contribution of \$4,200.00 to the RPCNA pension fund in his name.
- 11. There was discussion regarding how AFP can exercise "crowd control" with the large number of young people in attendance.
- 12. It was moved, second and passed to adjourn. Shawn Anderson adjourned the court in prayer at 2:20 p.m.

The Atlanta Commission met on Friday, July 17, 2015 at 12:50 p.m. at the Tree of Life meeting hall in Marion, IN.

- 1. Present were the Moderator John Hanson, Phil Pockras, Shawn Anderson, Jon Hughes and Jason Camery and by phone: Dr. and Penny Smith, Chris Meyers and Amy Work.
- 2. The Moderator constituted the court in prayer.
- 3. It was moved, seconded and passed to appoint Shawn Anderson as Moderator.
- 4. Dr. Smith gave a report on recent activity:
 - a. Latest worship had 39 (of which 34 were children) 10 (9 children) at recent youth meeting.
 - b. He explained how the new facility is working logistically.
 - c. They are working on more structured "pre-worship" activities with the children.
 - d. Short-term they will explore better use of the space in the new facility.
 - e. There had been the possibility of someone living in the "apartment" part of the building.
 - f. Update that Mark Brown is probably not moving to Atlanta.
- Shawn Anderson gave an update on his talk with Harriet Morton, 37 (whose husband is Stacy, 44):
 - a. They are a core family in the area.
 - b. However they have been inconsistent in attending worship (desiring a more emotional experience in worship).

- c. Harriet has problems understanding answers to her questions by Dr. Smith and the RP distinctive doctrines and practices.
- d. Shawn explored her other concerns and ways to minister to them.
- 6. Shawn Anderson requested that Frank and Penny start reporting a more complete breakdown of who attends worship. They do keep records based on local/remote (i.e., suburban) and adult/children (older and younger) and gave a more complete report of attendance for the month of June.
- 7. Dr. Smith's most recent assessment of how the goals set by Presbytery were being met was reviewed. There is an expectation that at least one individual will begin tithing to the work. There was discussion about how to encourage people at worship to contribute to the work.
- 8. Shawn presented the Treasurer's Report:
 - a. Actuals for 2014 compared with 2015 budget and income/expenses so far this year.
 - b. The rent has increased (almost doubled).
 - c. There as discussion regarding quarterly contributions to the pension fund for Dr. Smith.
 - d. Local tithes and offerings are not currently separated from other gifts to the work.
- 9. A report/assessment from H.P. McCracken based on his recent visit to preach was received.
- 10. Correspondence from Chris Myers' was discussed. There was a suggestion that there be a local steering committee. This was based on a comparison with the work in Harrisonburg, VA. However the Commission members felt that the two works are at very different stages with Harrisonburg being more mature with more families committed to joining with the church when it is organized. Such a committee is desirable at a later stage as things continue to develop. It was moved, seconded and passed to table the implementation of a steering committee until a future time. The suggestion to Chris was that he could spearhead the organization of a group of men in the Atlanta work to take on some of the things that Dr. Smith currently does on his own and are not necessarily seen by the congregation. It was moved, seconded and pass that Christ Meyers be authorized to informally organize this activity.
- 11. In line with a suggestion from Presbytery to try to have other local churches support the work, Dr. Smith submitted a draft of a letter that could be sent to other NAPARC churches in the Atlanta area to try to form a "consultative committee" to assist Frank with some of the immediate ministerial concerns that it's difficult for Commission members to deal with at a distance. Dr. Smith stated that he (or other Commission members) would speak with some representatives in those other churches to see if there is any interest in assisting APF and then the letter would be a follow-up to those conversations. More work will need to be done in this area and which churches we might contact.
- 12. There was discussion regarding strategies for the fellowship to better manage the number of children that attend. Amy Work explained some ways she and others have been teaching and training the children and has seen progress among some of them in terms of paying attention during worship and even taking notes. Dr. Smith indicated that he sees the possibility of the parents of some of the children beginning to come as well.
- 13. John Hanson gave a positive update on the one young person from Atlanta that went on the recent trip to ECHO in Florida.
- 14. There was discussion about another trip by the Commission members to Atlanta.

15. It was moved, seconded and passed to adjourn. Jason Camery adjourned the court in prayer at 2:55 p.m.

- 1. Present were the Moderator Shawn Anderson and Jason Camery and by phone: Phil Pockras, Jon Hughes and Dr. and Penny Smith.
- 2. The Moderator read from Psalm 106:15 and Phil Pockras constituted the court in prayer.
- 3. New Business:
 - Dr. Smith presented for approval a child-care policy (which has already been reviewed for completeness and suitability by Scott Hunt, an attorney in the Marion congregation). The policy follows this set of minutes. It was moved, seconded and passed to approve the policy.
 - b. Jason Camery and Shawn Anderson gave an encouraging report on their recent trip to Atlanta. They had the opportunity to meet with the various workers in the congregation and see their commitment to the work. It was noted that Dr. Smith continues to engage in training the men in the congregation. Some constructive feedback was given to Dr. Smith. Dr. Smith talked about the possibility of beginning an adult classes. He also continues to reach out to other congregations for assistance. There was further discussion of various issues and concerns within the congregation.
 - c. There was discussion regarding the possibility of the Commission asking, at the June meeting of Presbytery, for Presbytery's approval to be able to organize APF as a mission church at an appropriate time. It is still the consensus of the Commission that we are not yet be at that point. One of the more significant concerns currently is that if the congregation was to have the Lord's Supper then many of the current "staff" who attend from outside the community, having consistent lives and professions, would come to the Lord's Table but many who attend from the local area would not currently be welcome since they may not have lives that conform to their profession. In addition there is still not "leadership" and a significant number of consistent adherents living in the community who are committed to giving to the work and to joining the RP Church. The question of having worship services Sunday mornings was also considered and whether people would be committed to being there week-by-week.
 - d. Dr. Smith has requested that there be a local treasurer and indicated that he has spoken to Paul Struwe about his willingness to serve (Penny Smith would do the actual bookkeeping work). It was moved, seconded and passed to appoint Paul Struwe as the Treasurer of the Atlanta Presbyterian Fellowship. It was moved, seconded and passed to appoint Penny Smith as the Financial Secretary of the Atlanta Presbyterian Fellowship. It was moved, seconded and passed to appoint Penny Smith as the Financial Secretary of the Atlanta Presbyterian Fellowship. - f. Phil Pockras and Jon Hughes will try to coordinate plans for a visit to Atlanta in the next four months or so.
- g. The report for the next meeting of Presbytery will be prepared by Shawn Anderson and will be circulated by e-mail to the Commission members for concurrence.
- 4. It was moved, seconded and passed to adjourn. Jason Camery adjourned the court in prayer at 3:10 p.m.

Atlanta Presbyterian Fellowship Childcare Policy

Atlanta Presbyterian Fellowship (APF) seeks to provide a safe and secure environment for the children who participate in our programs and activities. By implementing the below practices, our goal is to protect the children of APF from incidents of misconduct or inappropriate behavior while also protecting our staff and volunteers (workers) from false accusations.

Definitions

For purposes of this policy, the terms "child" or "children" include all persons under the age of eighteen (18) years. The term "worker" includes both paid and unpaid persons who work with children. The term "volunteer" means anyone involved in a day care or school, in overnight activities involving minors, in counseling of minors, or in one-on-one mentoring of minors.

Selection of Workers

All persons who desire to work with the children participating in our programs and activities will be screened. This screening includes the following:

a) <u>Six-Month Rule</u>

As a general rule, no volunteer will be considered for any position involving contact with minors until he or she has been involved with APF for a minimum of six (6) months. This time of interaction between our leadership and the applicant allows for better evaluation and suitability of the applicant for working with children.

b) <u>Written Application</u>

All persons seeking to work with children must complete and sign a written application in a form to be supplied by us. The application will request basic information from the applicant

and will inquire into previous experience with children, previous church affiliation, reference and employment information, as well as disclosure of any previous criminal convictions. The application form will be maintained in confidence on file at APF.

c) <u>Personal Interview</u>

Upon completion of the application, a face-to-face interview may be scheduled with the applicant to discuss his/her suitability for the position.

d) <u>Reference Checks</u>

Before an applicant is permitted to work with children, at least two of the applicants' references will be checked. These references should be of an institutional nature as opposed to personal or family references, preferably from organizations where the applicant has worked with children in the past. Documentation of the reference checks will be maintained in confidence on file at APF.

e) Criminal Background Check

A national criminal background check is required for all employees (regardless of position) and volunteers as defined above. Before a background check is run, prospective workers will be asked to sign an authorization form allowing APF to run the check. If an individual declines to sign the authorization form, he will be unable to work with children. A disqualifying offense that will keep an individual from working with children will be determined by the Atlanta Commission on a case-by-case basis in light of all the surrounding circumstances. Generally, convictions for an offense involving children and/or for offenses involving violence, dishonesty, illegal substances, indecency and any conduct contrary to our mission will preclude someone from being permitted to work with children. Failure to disclose a criminal conviction on the application form will also be a disqualifying event. The background check authorization form and results will be maintained in confidence on file at APF.

f) <u>Waivers</u>

The six-month rule and the criminal background check may be waived if a congregation that is known to us attests in writing to the good character and abilities of the individual.

Two-Adult Rule

It is our goal that a minimum of two unrelated adult workers will be in attendance at all times when children are being supervised during our programs and activities. Some youth classes may have only one adult teacher in attendance during the class session; in these instances, there should be no fewer than three students with the adult teacher.

Responding to Allegations of Child Abuse

For purposes of this policy, "child abuse" is any action (or lack of action) that endangers or harms a child's physical, psychological or emotional health and development. Child abuse occurs in different ways and includes the following:

- Physical abuse any physical injury to a child that is not accidental, such as beating, shaking, burns, and biting.
- Emotional abuse emotional injury when the child is not nurtured or provided with love and security, such as an environment of constant criticism, belittling, and persistent teasing.

- Sexual abuse any sexual activity between a child and an adult or between a child and another child at least four years older than the victim, including activities such as fondling, exhibitionism, intercourse, incest, and pornography.
- Neglect depriving a child of his or her essential needs, such as adequate food, water, shelter, and medical care.

Childcare workers may have the opportunity to become aware of abuse or neglect of the children under our care. In the event that an individual involved in the care of children at APF becomes aware of suspected abuse or neglect of a child under his or her care, this should be reported immediately to the Atlanta Commission for further action, including reporting to authorities as may be mandated by state law.

In the event that an incident of abuse or neglect is alleged to have occurred at APF or during our sponsored programs or activities, the following procedure shall be followed:

- 1. The parent or guardian of the child will be notified.
- 2. Any worker alleged to be the perpetrator of the abuse or misconduct will immediately be placed on leave from working with children, pending an investigation, and instructed to remain away from the premises during the investigation.
- 3. Civil authorities will be notified, and APF will comply with the state's requirements regarding mandatory reporting of abuse as the law then exists. APF will fully cooperate with the investigation of the incident by civil authorities.
- 4. Our insurance company will be notified, and we will complete an incident report. Any documents received relating to the incident and/or allegations will immediately be forwarded to the insurance company.
- 5. The Moderator of the Atlanta Commission will be our spokesperson to the media concerning incidents of abuse or neglect, unless he or she is alleged to be involved. We will seek the advice of legal counsel before responding to media inquiries or releasing information to the congregation. All other representatives of the church should refrain from speaking to the media.
- 6. A pastoral visit will be arranged for those who desire it.
- 7. Any person who is not found innocent of the alleged abuse or misconduct will be removed from his or her position working with children or youth.

Medications Policy

It is the policy of APF not to administer either prescription or non-prescription medications to the children under our care. Medications should be administered by a parent at home. Exceptions to the medications policy may be granted to parents of children with potentially life-threatening conditions (such as asthma or severe allergic reactions). Parents of such children should address their situation with the minister to develop a plan of action.

Accidental Injuries to Children

In the event that a child or youth is injured while under our care, the following steps should be followed:

1. For minor injuries, scrapes, and bruises, workers will provide First Aid (Band-Aids, etc.) as appropriate and will notify the child's parent or guardian of the injury at the time the child is picked up from our care.

- 2. For injuries requiring medical treatment beyond simple First Aid, the parent and/or guardian will immediately be summoned in addition to the worker's supervisor. If warranted by circumstances, an ambulance will be called.
- 3. Once the child has received appropriate medical attention, an incident report will be completed in the case of injuries requiring treatment by a medical professional.

Emergencies

The minister shall designate a person who will be responsible, under the minister's direction (unless he is unable to give direction), for calling the police, the fire department, and/or medical personnel in the case of an emergency.

Discipline Policy

It is the policy of APF not to administer corporal punishment, even if parents have suggested or given permission for it. There should be no spanking of children. Workers should consult with the minister if assistance is needed with disciplinary issues.

All workers and volunteers are to sign this document, indicating their agreement to abide by it.

Policy on Emergencies

The person designated as "Emergency Coordinator" by the minister will be responsible, under the minister's direction (unless he is unable to give direction), for calling the police, the fire department, and/or medical personnel in the case of an emergency. In case the Emergency Coordinator is not present or is unable to act, an Assistant Emergency Coordinator will take action.

The Emergency Coordinator will always have a cell telephone ready in order to call 911 if necessary.

The Emergency Coordinator should be familiar with the following:

(1) the streets near the building

(2) the compass directions (North, South, East, West)

(3) the places where the fire extinguishers are kept

(4) how to operate the fire extinguishers

- 5. Dr. Frank Smith addressed the Commission:

 - b. Seven individuals have left the area and so attendance is down some, but there are also a few new regular attendees.
 - c. Also the current group seems to be more stable than before.
- 6. Regarding the work of the Board of Advisors:
 - a. Dr. Smith spoke about Sean McPherson (an ordained deacon from Meadville RPC) that has moved to the area. Sean has been leading the adult class (in the Confession and Catechisms) and his wife Anne has been leading the singing. They live near the "Bluff" area. The recommendation is that Sean be added to the Board of Advisors. Shawn Anderson has also spoken to Pastor Lucas Hanna in Meadville about Sean and his character and qualifications.
 - b. It was moved, seconded and passed to add Sean McPherson to the Board of Advisors.

May 26, 2017

The Atlanta Commission met on May 26, 2017 at 1:02 p.m. by conference call.

- 1. The meeting was called to order at 1:02 PM by TE Shawn Anderson.
- 2. Commissioners present at the appointed time were RE Erich Baum, TE Shawn Anderson and RE G. Scott Damerow. RE Jon Hughes joined the meeting at 1:14 pm.
- 3. Also present were Dr. Rev. Frank Smith and Mrs. Penny Smith.
- 4. Proceedings were opened with prayer by TE Shawn Anderson.
- 5. The current finances of the APF were added to the docket as item #2.
- 6. Docket/Agenda was approved by common consent.
- 7. Mrs. Penny Smith gave the financial report: Bank balance as of end of May was \$17,953 with \$3500 funds designated for building fund.
- 8. Pulpit supply was discussed. Pastor Chris Strevel is scheduled for July 16 2017 with July 9th supply TBD. Possible pulpit supply included Wayside PCA intern Mike "Hutch" Hutchinson.
- 9. Renewal of lease of current APF meeting place discussed: It was noted that the APF board is in favor of renewing the lease for one more year until 2018.
- 10. RE Jon Hughes joined the meeting at 1:14 PM
- 11. The possibility of a different future meeting location for APF was discussed with a view to enabling more people to move closer to the work.
- 12. By common consent the commission voted to allow the APF board to renew the lease for the 472-B Paines Ave location through 2018.

- 2. Shawn Anderson constituted the court in prayer at 2:10 p.m.
- 3. The proposed agenda was accepted by common consent.
- 4. There was discussion regarding Robert Lebus taking on a role as "diaconal assistant". He has been:
 - a. Entrusted with special responsibility for administration of temporal relief and spiritual care as directed by the APF Board of Advisors in coordination with the Dr. Smith
 - b. Assisting Dr. Smith in transportation of families to worship
 - c. Living in the church building several days during the week providing building security and being a local contact for APF

d. Doing maintenance for the APF facility

He would also assist the Treasurer in yearly budget plan for the mercy ministry, maintenance, and janitorial line items. For that he would be compensated as shown in the proposed budget later.

- 5. Budget for 2018: Dr. Smith gave a few comments on the budget. It was moved second and passed to approve the budget. The budget will be made available to the Presbytery in the report to the upcoming Spring meeting of Presbytery.
- 6. Visit of October, 2017: The assessment is as follows:

- The APF needs to know how to delegate better, and would benefit from a delegator
- There is little 1:1 discipleship currently
- There is little to no formal or informal midweek contact currently
- APF lacks stable men who are willing and able to mentor teen men
- There is a lack of local modeling of Christian parenting / homes
- Dr Smith's idealism has demonstrated an inability to realistically assess significant needs and situations
- The Bluff survives in a welfare system that promises money & resources only to perpetuate circumstances so that the moms raise kids to continue in same path
- APF Core living in bluff is unhealthy but sincere
- Some are living in voluntary scandal
- There are unequally yoked relationships
- The African-American community is influenced by matriarchy in the family structure, seen in some APF families
- Some believe that they can serve at APF, but not be served, or shepherded
- Local giving is unable to presently meet budget

We can see the following families able to join APF tomorrow if progressed to Mission Church status

- William McCoy

- Harriet Moton
- Miyoshi Robinson
- Amy Work
- Robert Lebus

It is possible that these family units could be taken into membership if some issues are sorted out

- Sean & Anne McPherson would they want to become members. It is unclear especially with the statement made, "We do not see this as a church for us, but a place to serve others. If Sean was not so pulled to the ministry we probably would not be present as often."
- Stacy Moton it is unclear if he has a profession of faith. His behavior health diagnosis poses serious challenges to the church's time and ministry for this family.
- Tawana Franklin she says that she desires to be involved, but has left multiple times for a season. We think Dr Smith should file for PoA (Financial).
- Andrew Jubera eager to ask questions and willing to talk about many spiritual things. Concern for a possible unequally yoked relationship with Jemika Crayton.

We do not believe that these individuals qualify for communicant membership at APF at this time, based on our interviews.

- Bob & Patty Shapiro Of course Bob & Patty demonstrate a credible profession, but in the
 providence of God they are facing serious challenges with Bob's health. Bob admitted that if
 he had been a member of an APF mission church before he became sick, they still would not
 have been present at APF, nor been able to contribute financially, which is very
 understandable. We think that they need to be counseled in preparing for Bob's passing, and
 Patty's connection with a local church that she will receive support from when he passes.
- Abby Shapiro She appears to have a credible profession of faith, but works on the Sabbath, making her unable to keep her vows.
- Felson Harden living in voluntary scandalous sin
- Jenario Robinson does not know if he is a Christian. Believes that he is living a worldly, godless life.
- Jemika Crayton member of another church, and it is reported that she is presently unwilling to join APF.

Full assessment cannot be accomplished until after November when the Myers' plan comes to fruition.

The Commission members plan to write up a summary (*within 7 days*) of each person interviewed, answering the following questions, and sharing them with each other and Frank:

- What does this person know well? (Doctrinal Practical Shepherding)
- What does this person need to work on? (Identify tangible plans & goals to help articulate faith and grow in Christ)
- 7. Shawn Anderson covered the essential points of the assessment and then opened the floor for discussion:
 - a. Bob Shapiro's health has improved somewhat but is still undergoing chemotherapy
 - b. We don't want to count people as "there" who are not actually "there"
- 8. There was discussion of the status of many of the other persons at APF.

- 9. It was noted that APF has recently begun having a morning worship service as well as the evening (total attendance was 37 distinct people).
- 10. Recommendations to Presbytery 2018 (March 1-3) were discussed:
 - a. The possibility of petitioning Presbytery for Mission Church Status was discussed
 - b. Shawn Anderson presented the two prevailing views on it. One of the prior objections was the absence of morning worship services, which has now begun (and the plan is for that to continue). Another objection was the absence of "leader" living in "The Bluff". That seems to be partially resolved with Robert Lebus being regularly in the area.
 - c. Things appear to be strengthening the position in favor of Mission Church status but perhaps we should still give these new evidences time to develop more
- 11. There was discussion of the report that will be written up to present to the Presbytery at the Spring meeting.
- 12. It was moved, seconded and passed to adjourn. Jason Camery adjourned the court in prayer at 4:40 p.m.

DAYTON REFORMED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH (MISSION) REPORT TO PRESBYTERY MARCH 2018

"Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing." James 1: 2-4

Due to our weaknesses, it is good that we do not face trials continuously. But it is also good that we do meet them from time to time, for these times of trials produce growth in the body of Christ. Praise God that He promises to be with us through them all.

This past year has been an up and down one for the DRPC. Throughout the first half of the year, attendance was growing and fluctuating at the same time. The year started with five member families, of which 15 people were communicant members. One of these families transferred to a PCA church early in the year. The average attendance was around 40 people at its highest and sometimes higher depending on how many Bryan College students were in attendance. Unfortunately, of all the Bryan College students who attended in the spring, only one returned to worship at the DRPC. Some of this was due to graduations and non-returning students. Several other families were also attending but never joined the church. Two of these were families of the reformed persuasion that had moved to Dayton because of their work with Bryan College. Four other families were also of the reformed persuasion driving from forty-five minutes to seventy minutes away. There were 22 people in number from these nonmember families.

The church seemed to be stable for the first part of the year, but there was not any growth in numbers coming from the Dayton community. There was also not a significant outreach effort to the community. The finances of the church had begun to improve due to increased tithing of the member families and to the giving of the non-member families attending worship.

Members of the TGB visited the DRPC every other month. Pastors Pockras and McCracken preached and provided the Lord's Supper to communicant members when they were in Dayton.

We are thankful to God for all the men who filled the pulpit during the year. Along with members of the TGB, Rev. Bob McCracken and Rev.Tom Reid both served as pulpit supply. We also had pastors from the RPCGA, and the PCA preach as well. Kevin Clausen, a member of the church and former elder in the OPC also preached on occasion.

Dr. Matt McMahon, an ordained minister in the RPCGA, and his wife were one of the nonmember attending families. They had been visiting for over a year. He also was one of the ministers who filled the pulpit on occasion. In September, to provide a more consistent pulpit supply, the TGB asked Dr. McMahon to be the 'regular pulpit supply.' With the approval of his presbytery, Dr. McMahon accepted this invitation. He served as pulpit supply until 12/31/17.

In November, the TGB invited the Rev. Matt Filbert to come to Dayton as a candidate for the Church Planting Pastor position. The TGB believed that Matt's gifts and skills would be very beneficial to the DRPC. In November, the TGB extended a call to Matt who turned down the call. It was during this time of Matt's visits that the evidence of a division within the body became apparent. Many of the nonmember families who were attending the church made it known that they would not be coming back. There was also one member family (Goodpaster) who decided that they too would not be back.

They have yet to transfer their membership. Three member families were very much in favor of calling Matt as the church planting pastor. As of 12/31/17, there were three families remaining with the DRPC, (Ecarma x 4, Clausen x 4, Campbell x 4)

On January 19, 2018, all three members of the TGB went to Dayton to assess the situation and personally visit each remaining family. The families that left the church were offered a visit but did not desire to do so. During these family visits, the TGB sought to discover the intentions of the remaining families and their desire for the continuation of the RPCNA work in Dayton. While each family is committed to Presbyterian and reformed principles of faith, they are not all committed to the same degree that the RPCNA is the only way to keep a reformed faith work going in the Dayton community. They all agreed that they want a local Presbyterian and Reformed work to remain in Dayton. They also were all willing to keep working at their current level of service to the church. One family, the Campbells, genuinely want to see the RPCNA work continue. One family, the Clausens like the RPCNA church and is very glad to see it continue, but they could also attend another reformed church if necessary, and one was available. But they know one is not available other than the RPCNA, so they are eager for the RPCNA made it difficult to reach other families and students at Bryan College. On 2/12/18, the Ecarmas informed the TGB that they would be leaving the church if it is reduced to a preaching station.

It is with the above information, and after many days of praying about this situation that the DRPC TGB comes to the GLGC Presbytery with the following recommendation:

"The DRPC TGB recommends the GLGC Presbytery reduce the Dayton Reformed Presbyterian Mission Church to a Preaching Station, and appoint the current TGB members to be an oversight committee for up to six months. After the six months, or anytime before that if it should appear necessary, the committee shall re-evaluate and report either to Presbytery or its Ad Interim Commission to decide whether to re-erect a Mission Church, to maintain as a preaching station, to reduce further to an exploratory work, or to close the work."

Please pray for these saints in Dayton, who are going through a difficult time. Even those who have left are in need of prayer as they seek to find a Biblical place of worship and fellowship.

JUDICIAL COMMITTEE TO ADDRESS PAPERS 18-04, 18-06, and 18-08 Fathers and brothers,

Per Presbytery's directive our committee met to discuss and return a recommendation concerning papers 18-04 ("A Comity Agreement regarding the 'taking of exceptions' for Ordination Vows"), 18-06 ("On 'Taking Exceptions' and the Ordination Vows"), and 18-08 which discusses the issue of subscription raised in the previous two papers. **Our recommendation is that Presbytery vote on paper 18-06, which was submitted by Mr. LeFebvre**.

Rationale

Our committee is sympathetic to the reasons that gave rise to paper 18-04 and its aim to form a basis for greater unity and ecumenicity following the matter of Sam Ketcham. However, the committee does not believe the route it proposes is viable—in part (1) because it appears irregular to have a single Presbytery setting standards for interdenominational comity; and (2) because granting automatic exceptions involving originalist positions allows little room to discuss said exceptions and doesn't appear to acknowledge the special notice the Testimony gives to these things.

Furthermore, we are sympathetic to those who think our "system" is adequate and wish to maintain the status quo, as proposed in paper 18-08. Should the recommendation on 18-06 fail, we are prepared to suggest all three papers be returned, with thanks to their authors, effectively maintaining the status quo.

However, our recommendation to vote on 18-06 suggests to Presbytery that there may be value in seeking clarity on the "system of doctrine and manner of worship" in vow 4 and the relationship the WCF and RPT sustain to one another, should Presbytery deem the cost worthwhile. Our hope is not to see a list of "allowed" or "disallowed" exceptions but guidance for assessing exceptions taken by ministerial candidates/ordinands and transferring elders.

Respectfully Submitted, Rich Holdeman Stan McKenzie (Ch) Jared Olivetti In paper 18-07, Mr. David Carr, requested of our committee "to review, and modify where necessary, this paper for Presbytery endorsement and submission to the 2018 meeting of Synod." However, upon review of the paper and consultation with Mr. Carr, it was determined that there was perhaps a better path forward to accomplish Mr. Carr's goals. It is our Committee's recommendation to return the paper to Mr. Carr, a course of action that he is agreeable to, in hopes that the second recommendation of this committee will be a more expedient course to his ultimate ends.

Recommendation 1

That Presbytery return Paper 18-07 to its author.

Rationale:

For this paper to have any impact on the proceedings of the Hemphill appeal hearing at Synod 2018, the paper would had to have come to Synod *prior* to the 2018 meeting. Therefore, the paper fundamentally cannot accomplish its desired end. Additionally, there is a very real possibility that when Synod takes up this paper, it would accomplish the exact opposite (i.e. further hangups in deliberation and debate over procedure) of that which it seeks. Lastly, the way the paper understands Synod proceedings up to this point, and the way it calls for *further* repentance from Synod, seems to demonstrate some confusion about what our Synod has done and is procedurally preparing to do. In light of the above, our committee and Mr. Carr believe it is best simply to return the paper to its author.

Recommendation 2

That the GLG Presbytery communicate with Synod's procedural committee (the committee charged with leading Synod through hearing the Hemphill appeal) our desire for an efficient and streamlined procedure for hearing the appeal, and to call for a significant season of prayer (such as: 1 hour) prior to the proceedings.

Rationale:

In consultation with Mr. Carr, it was made clear that the two main objectives of his paper were: 1) to see a more efficient use of our time in navigating the Hemphill appeal at the 2018 Synod, in contrast to the inefficiency of the 2017 Synod; and

2) to call us to a significant time of prayer to ask the Lord's blessing for a faithful execution of mercy and justice in the proceedings.

Presbytery Policy Reminders

1. The policy of the Presbytery is that the mileage reimbursement rate is the standard IRS rate in effect on the date the reimbursable mileage was incurred (2018 = \$.545)

2. The meal allowance is \$6/meal for travel to/from Presbytery meetings.

3. Normally the congregation pays the expenses of its provisional moderators and elders.

4. Congregations are to remit not less than one fourth of their assessment each and every quarter. If needed, the Presbytery treasurer is authorized to send reminders quarterly to congregations.

5. Up to \$750 is offered to congregations which host the annual meeting of Presbytery to help with their hospitality expenses.

6. That Presbytery offer to congregations to reimburse them for pulpit supply when their pastor is away for non-visitation Presbytery business.

7. For calculating the annual Presbytery assessments, the income amount used for each congregation shall be the same as is used by Synod for calculating Synod's assessment.
